TOMMY DUNN: At this time I'd like to call the regular Anderson County Council meeting of November the 12th, 2020 to order. I'd like to welcome each and every one of you here today, or this afternoon. Thank y'all for coming and participating in your local government. We'll have a few housekeeping announcements here to make in a few minutes. But to start, I'd ask us all to please keep your mask on, observe social distancing the best we can and be mindful of others and respectful. And at this time I'll ask Councilman Jimmy Davis if he'll lead us in the invocation and pledge of allegiance. Let's all rise, please.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY JIMMY DAVIS

CLIFFORD SHIFLET: My name is Clifford Shiflet. Mr. Chairman, members of council and fellow residents, I appreciate the opportunity to speak this afternoon. I'm speaking about the Confederate monument. To explain my profile, my name is Clifford Shiflet, 125 Carlin Drive, Anderson, South Carolina. I was educated in the public schools here in Anderson. I went to Anderson College and graduated from Clemson in 1980. I served my country for six years. My family history came from Virginia to Georgia and then in about 1920 we immigrated across the Savannah River to Anderson. So we've lived here roughly a hundred years.

I want my history, my heritage, that sits in the downtown square of this town left alone. The Heritage Act of South Carolina was put in place to protect things like that, and I want them left alone. There's some talk about a petition with thousands of signatures. And if that's just a bunch of names on a list, then I want a copy of the list and I want the name and address, and I want to confirm every name on there to see if they're an Anderson County resident or property owner. I think if they want to make that a public document, that I should get a copy if I want one. And we shouldn't have nobody voting outside of Anderson County or signing that petition. It shouldn't mean anything. I've talked to people in Columbia; they even signed.

I appreciate the time. There's some talk about a statue for Mr. Boseman because he was from Anderson and a famous actor. If they want a statue like that, fine. Put one somewhere. You can hide it behind the behavioral science building like you did the monument for our veterans. Here we are stuck behind a building over there and people can't even come to town to find the thing. And so to take that Confederate monument

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     over your agenda today, I see quite a lot of important
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     stuff. There's one item on your list, in my opinion,
     that can save lives. And I'm here to encourage you to
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     pass an ordinance for face masks to mitigate the spread
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     of this virus. Just as the city has done. Some time
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 ago I talked with each of you about this subject and you expressed -- five of you expressed a rejection of doing so.

Now, upon reflection of these rejections, I think your reasons fly in the face of one of the most important health crises that we have in this country at this time. And your position does not seem to support your mission statement. Your mission statement states that you will provide the highest public service for safety of the county. Saving a life would be pretty much in line with your mission statement.

Now, one of the reasons that people reject -- seem to reject this is -- or one of the reasons you gave is a common sense. Just let common sense prevail. Well, common sense doesn't always work. And common sense to one person is not common sense to another. Which leads us to the need for a mandate for a mask. It is clear that people transmit the virus. It is clear that masks work to slow the spread. It is clear that we cannot rely on everyone to use common sense. It is clear that it will be some time before we have a vaccine. And just like a seatbelt law, we need to mandate a mask. It is past time to make a more aggressive move.

MICHAEL VANDIVER: I'm Michael Vandiver. I was born and raised here in Anderson, South Carolina. I served as a United Methodist minister for my professional career and I am now back in Anderson, retired and living on Lake Hartwell, 5016 Cross Pointe, Anderson, South Carolina.

I appreciate the opportunity to come and speak to the item number 6, presentation of relocation of the Confederate monument. During my years of growing up in Anderson, I am sorry that I have to admit that I was very racially prejudiced. It took quite a bit of change in my life for me to come to the point where I

felt that I could no longer keep the vision, attitude that I had held for people who had skin color different from my own. When that did happen, I was deeply grateful. And it moved me to spend the rest of my life, I hope many people would say, trying to rectify that view and to create a country, a state, a city, where the views and beliefs and rights of all people would be recognized.

I have looked at the monument in downtown Anderson that we're thinking about relocating and I realize, not only from my own personal change, but from the statements of many of my brothers and sisters of all different races and colors, that there's a different way of looking at that monument than the one I held early in my life.

I think that monument needs to be moved so that we as Andersonians and those who would join us across the state and nation might look forward to the day where we could all feel that those things that find physical representation in our community are not offensive to some who now enjoy far more rights than they did when I was growing up here in Anderson, but yet need to know that we, in this day and time, want for anything that appears as a physical monument in our city to represent all of us and all of our rights.

DYKE SPENCER: Thank you for this opportunity to talk to the full council. You have several items about ordinances change that are, I think, pretty much all tied to growth in this county. And I'm Executive Director of Powdersville Water, the fastest growing area in this county. We know what growth looks like up there. And we're probably having to do some things that the rest of the county is not having to do.

I want to commend the council for your forward thinking and looking at the ordinances and looking at things that need to change, because they do. And if you don't believe that, drive to Powdersville and ride around. Jimmy will tell you, it's on every corner.

At the same time I commend you, I caution you. It's an all-inclusive process when you make changes like we're proposing right now. I'm all behind what you're doing; don't get me wrong. But you've got to include everyone that's impacted by these decisions.

And I think that will fare very well for you if you do that.

One of the requests that I want you to look at, and I'm being told by the staff of the county that this is an ordinance change that will require this, but let me just describe a situation that we're dealing with in the water system. Any given time we have ten to twelve subdivisions under construction. They require a water permit and a wastewater permit for all those houses to be able to operate. I'm asking the building codes to not issue building permits for houses so they can start building before there is a water and wastewater permit available for that subdivision. And I've got one, if you want to look one up, Yorkshire is one that's happening right now, it's got five or six houses going up. And when this happens you create havoc for the water systems out there because what's happening is people are monkeying with the plumbing, they're causing cross-connections with possibilities for contaminations in the water system. They're stealing water from the water utilities. It just creates chaos.

But I just ask that the council look at that. I really need an answer on that fairly quickly. Because, again, we have several of these subdivisions that are underway right now.

But again, I commend you for what you're doing, the way you're thinking. You've been very proactive about growth and we need to do that in this county if we want to preserve what we have here.

TOMMY DUNN: Thank you. Mr. Harmon. LEON HARMON: Next speaker is Dean

Allen.

DEAN ALLEN: Mr. Chairman, Cindy, gentlemen, thank you for the opportunity to be here and speak to you. I do appreciate that. I'll start off by briefly telling you I'm opposed to this face mask wearing ordinance. I think it's unconstitutional.

But the reason I came down here this afternoon is item 6 on your agenda. My great great grandpappy fought for the Confederacy from Manassas to the day we surrendered Vicksburg and he became a prisoner of war. When he was paroled, he went back to Arkansas and raised cotton and ten children, one of whom became my great grandpappy. And three of his grandsons fought for the United States of America in World War II, one of them losing his life in defense of this nation.

That's what the monument in front of the courthouse means to me. Now, twenty years ago when we took the Confederate flag off the statehouse and put it at the

soldier's monument, they worked out a deal. They said, well, we're going to pass a law and say that we're not ever going to take down another flag or monument that represents the culture and heritage of the state anymore and we'll leave the status quo as it was once they moved that flag. It's against the state law, gentlemen, for y'all to move that monument. And I mean no disrespect, but if you do, I will sue you, and some of you are good friends of mine.

I thank you for hearing from me, and I'll leave it and talk to others. And I hope I get a chance to talk to some of you one on one. Thank you and God bless you.

TALIN KEYFER: Thank you for letting me speak. I'm here on behalf of my daughter who is fifteen years old and a sophomore at Hanna High School. My name is Talin Keyfer. I'm a resident of the city of Anderson.

After George Floyd's death, we were enjoying our downtown like we always do. But this time we went up to the Confederate monument and she read the plaque. She read it out loud and it was the first time either one of us had read it out loud. And the meaning meant something deeper than we ever realized after George Floyd's death. And I will read it to you now.

The Confederate monument which stands in the heart of downtown Anderson has been -- I'm sorry. Let's just read the subscription.

The world shall yet decide and truth's clear far off light, that the soldiers who wore the gray and died with Lee were in the right. And when she read it out loud, I asked her how she felt about that. And she said she felt sad and she felt that our city was living in the past and not including all the marvelous diversity that we have living here, residents, today. And then she said it made her more sad about how it would make her black brothers and sisters and students at her school. And I'm coming here today for her. She can't be here. And all the kids of the future can't be

here because they're in school. And we're making a decision on how we want them to feel when they come into our city. Their city. Their downtown. And I think it's time to make a change that shows the diversity, includes every resident of our great city. It's time to move forward. Thank you very much.

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WAYNE WHITFIELD: Good afternoon, county Thank you for letting me speak this council. afternoon. Cindy, good to see you today. My name is Wayne Whitfield. Again, I'm from Anderson County. Lived in Anderson County all my life. I'm a retired I spent a year in Vietnam in a rifle company. I've got a great great uncle who was captured after the Battle of Gettysburg. And he was sent to a Yankee prison up on the Jersey Shore. He died there about a year later. And he's buried with three thousand Confederate soldiers in a mass grave. We found out this information because my uncle went to the New Jersey Shore in an attempt to retrieve his remains. And they said, that's impossible; said we can't get his remains. He said, he's buried with three thousand men.

My point is this. These monuments were put up all around the southeast in these towns for one reason primarily, and that was to honor the men, Southern men, who never came home. Most of them were buried in mass graves on battlefields and never had the privilege of a funeral back home. So these monuments represent those men who never came home.

I think that monument is in the right place. I hope to God it's never moved. Now, this is not a perfect world we live in. We know that. And we're not trying to create a utopia here. We can't do that either because of our own condition. But I hope and pray that that thing remains. If it was wrong to put it up a hundred and twenty years ago, it would be wrong now. It wasn't wrong to put it up then because they put it up to honor those men that gave their lives for this state and for the southeast.

NELSON WALLER: Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. You know, I want to thank you for all the good things that you do involved in running the

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county. I know it's a huge job. And I know it's a responsibility to become a councilman. However, if it becomes a matter of your special agenda or somebody else's special values or program that you're serving instead of the public, something is radically wrong there. And I fear that's what's going on here.

There is no such thing as a monument or a symbol that represents everybody. Let me tell you something. If you put up a statue of a TV star, any TV star of any race, it is not going to represent me because I despise modern TV and what it's doing in terms of public morals and values. The content is decadent beyond belief. (End of audio) ... to have here the agenda from your website, may I ask why this meeting is not on it? It says there's another one on the 17th. Is that the case? Here we have a map of part of the town containing Washington Street and Jefferson Avenue, including the Jefferson Avenue Park. Are you prepared to change the names of everything that existed before the Civil Rights Era? Because that's where this political correctness is going. If you change one, you take the monument down, well then the rationale becomes well, you did this for us, you have to do this to be consistent here. Hey, we're offended. We're still offended. This thing over here is racist. It's a slipper slope. Please do not go anywhere near it.

Why do they want the monument down? Because they call it racist. There is nothing racist about it. As I've said before, it stands for Andersonians of every color of the period of time who in any way fought against the Yankee onslaught, which is comparable to the communist invasion of Hungary in 1956. I have a petition here for you. It is sealed and symbolically representing our desire for you to keep this information, be discreet with it. We don't need cancel culture going after the signers. There aren't many names on it. But it's what we had the resources to collect. We passed over a thousand petitions out amongst our fellow citizens. I wrote to each one of you -- Mr. Graham did not receive his, but I brought it today for him and gave it to Lacey -- asking your stand on the monument issue. Is there a reason that none of you replied? Until I do get a reply, I'm going to assume that you, ---

I came to Anderson because I felt like this was a very diversified county. I came here to help give my children a chance to thrive and to grow, and for the most part they have. However, we've not allowed that to dampen our spirits, our hope, our projections for the future.

I have a job where I go into the courthouse on many occasions. For about three years I frequented the courthouse for work. I saw the statue and thought, okay, interesting statue outside. Never thought much about it until one day I had some time in between hearings. And I walked over to that statue and what I read on that statue broke my heart. Broke my heart for my children and their children and my black brothers and sisters that live in this town. There is no way that anyone can tell me that it's okay to have a statue in front of the county courthouse that is to stand for liberty and justice for all of our people that says that Lee was right and the south should have won. need to move. We need to grow. We do not have to destroy things in order to do that. We have already destroyed. It's time to rebuild. It's okay to change. It's time to change.

If anyone wonders what the statue -- we talked about what it says. Someone read for us what it says. But I want to just briefly tell you that the likeness of the image is William Wirk Humphreys. He did not die in the war. He came back and lived a pretty much prosperous life. But I want to share with you a quote from Mr. Humphreys. He was a pastor in this area, I do believe. For ages to come slavery as it now exists must be profitable and beneficial in the cotton states. Yet if not sooner the remaining slave states must unite with us in a few years. And it is wise and proper to

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               I've been up here a couple of times the last
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     couple of meetings. This is more of the same reason.
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     Going through the agenda and noticed there's at least
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     seven; two of them have been pulled, thankfully.
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     second reading, the rest are first readings of
     ordinance changes. And this goes back to the concern
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     that I've had when we brought up changing the square
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     footage from eight thousand to fifteen thousand square
     feet. Again, it's just a piecemeal way of going at
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     fixing issues that we do have in the county. The
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     biggest concern being that it doesn't address all the
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     issues. Now, I know we have an ad hoc committee
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     meeting tomorrow that my hope was that that committee
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     was going to kind of pull back and address all the
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issues the Planning Department is having with development in the county as a whole. I've already mentioned in previous meetings some of those issues in ways that can be addressed. I've yet to be, you know, asked how to do that. Hopefully we'll have some opportunity at the ad hoc committee meeting tomorrow.

But with the agenda items today, there's some serious concerns with the preliminary plat process. I've actually sat in on some of the meetings where we've had to now have a meeting ahead of time with the council member and the district representative for the Planning Commission, then that's got to go to a community meeting. The meetings have not been extremely helpful, simply because there's no guidance as to what the ultimate goal of those meetings is supposed to be.

So before we go adding to requirements on developers and making it more difficult for them to get approval for people to develop their land, we need to sit down and think through what that process is actually supposed to accomplish.

Additionally, the requirement now to try to switch summary plats from seven to four lots and in five years, it's just another attack on the individual property owner and what they can and can't do with their property.

So that's just a couple of them. There's more in here. Hopefully at some point we'll be able to have a sit-down and address the entire development ordinance, chapter 38 and 70, as opposed to this piecemeal approach. Thank you.

TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Harmon.

LEON HARMON: Next speaker is Luciana

Strathem.

LUCIANA STRATHEM: Thank you, Mr. Dunn and council, for allowing me speak today. I am Luciana Strathem and I live at 2208 East North Avenue. And I'd like to speak on item 6.

My fellow Andersonians, I have lived in Anderson for most of my life and the Confederate monument downtown has always embarrassed me. Most obviously this monument is un-American. The Confederacy was a legally separate nation from the United States and was defeated in the American Civil War. The Confederate dead memorialized in this monument are the defeated enemies of the United States and to not be glorified as heroes. For those who say that their heritage lies with these men, I argue that this is a shameful heritage. These men fought to keep the institution of slavery, which is the deepest and most shameful aspect

of American history, an example of the worst inhumanity in the history of the world. Slavery violates the Godgiven dignity of every human person and has been a source of intergenerational oppression and trauma in our country for over four hundred years. The preservation of this unchristian system is not something that anyone should be proud to claim as their heritage. And this monument to slavery defenders and the enemies of our great nation is an embarrassment to our country.

Among other economic issues the Confederacy fought primarily to keep the institution of slavery in the United States. The descendants of the people owned by these Confederate dead continue to live in our country today. The black population of Anderson should not be further tormented with a monument glorifying the oppressive masters of their ancestors. Additionally, this monument was not erected until 1901, over thirty years after the defeat of the Confederacy. Statues like this one were often used to proclaim public opposition to the Civil Rights Movement, which sought equal opportunity and an interracist treatment for African Americans.

Therefore, this monument was likely not erected as a memorial to the family members of the Andersonians who died fighting against the United States, but as a symbol of white supremacy and opposition to equality for black Americans in this town. For those who claim this monument is a piece of history and should not be removed, I argue that monuments themselves are symbols of community values rather than sources of history. Sources of history include community institutions such as the Anderson County Library or the Anderson County Museum, which themselves are both wonderful places to which we can relocate this monument. Monuments and statues are a symbol of what a community upholds as most important to its citizens. In its place I recommend erecting a statue to the many brave men and women of Anderson who have fought to defend our freedoms as Americans.

The veterans of Anderson County, including metal of honor and purple heart recipient Freddie Stowers best exemplify the ideals of patriotism and bravery that we should all honor as Americans.

LEON HARMON: Time, Mr. Chairman.

And since moving here we have been 16 proud to call Anderson home. We have met some 17 incredible people we call family and love this small town atmosphere filled with decent, hardworking people. 18 19 Sadly, when I walk downtown, I don't see that 20 reflected by the Confederate monument located in front 21 of the courthouse in the heart of this city. Instead 22 what's communicated to me and my family is that I am 23 less than because of the color of my skin. You might ask how did I reach this conclusion? 24 It's after 25 reading the inscription on the side of the statue that 26 says, the world shall yet decide in truth's far off 27 light that the soldiers who wore the gray and died with 28 Lee were in the right. Now, what right is that? 29 What's the main issue? We're talking about what 30 they're talking here. I look no further than Alexander Stephens, the V.P. of the Confederacy, who wrote in 31 32 1861, after discussing why the old union would split 33 and why they would indeed fight, he said, quote, our 34 foundations are laid, its cornerstone rests upon the 35 great truth that the Negro is not equal to the white 36 That slavery subordination to the superior race 37 is his natural and normal condition. That's why I'm 38 proposing the relocation of this monument. I have no 39 political slant. I have no ax to grind against the men 40 who have fought and died, the sons, the fathers of the 41 gentlemen that were speaking earlier. I think they 42 should be remembered. I just don't believe that this 43 monument should be glorified in the center of my city. 44 I believe that there simply should be more to be -reflect the beautiful, hardworking people of Anderson 45 that includes thirty-one percent of African-Americans 46 47 that also live here. With that I will pass it on to 48 Sam and Daniel Wagner, individuals I've been working 49 with as we've been championing this cause as he speaks 50 about this agenda. Thank you so much.

Whereas, Director Baker has more than twenty years of law enforcement and incident command experience, having previously served as Commander of the Sheriff's Office's Narcotics Investigations Unit and Gang Task Force as well as serving as Chief of Police for the Town of Williamston; and,

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County's emergency readiness, response and recovery efforts, working to ensure that all emergency operations plans are up-to-date along with mutual aid agreements with municipalities and neighboring counties; and,

Done an outstanding job. We appreciate you continuing to serve Anderson County, and the citizens of Anderson County and are very fortunate to have you as our director. Thank you very much.

RAY GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Graham.

Moving on to item number 6, presentation on relocation of the Confederate monument. Mr. Brooks.

SAMUEL BROOKS: Thank you so much,

county council, for allowing me ---

TOMMY DUNN: Hold on a minute. Turn it up a little bit. Try it now.

SAMUEL BROOKS: Test. Thank you, guys. Thank you so much, County Council, for allowing me to come and talk to you today. I really do appreciate it. My name is Sam Brooks. I am a lifelong Andersonian. Born here. Concord, McCants, T.L. Hanna. And I've grown up loving Anderson County. And I've been working over the past few months with the conversation around the Confederate monument in downtown Anderson.

The monument itself is made in the likeness of William Wirk Humphreys, which you guys have heard everyone come up here and talk. But the original destination for this monument was not in front of the courthouse in downtown Anderson. This can be found on the Anderson Observer. This monument was made for Old Silverbrook Cemetery and then after the money was raised and everything for it, it was changed to the heart of downtown Anderson. And on that monument it says the world shall yet decide in truth's clear far

off light, that the soldiers who wore the gray and died with Lee were in the right.

What I would like to say today is that monument, that quote itself, does not -- is not history. That is opinion. That is an opinion of what the Confederacy stood for and whether they were right or wrong. And that opinion that is located on that monument actively oppresses African-Americans in our community. You've heard stories from Matthew. You've heard stories from other people here. But that monument and what says is telling them that they are less than.

GRACIE FLOYD: Uh-huh (affirmative).

Uh-huh (affirmative).

SAM BROOKS: And with that monument there in the heart of our city, I want us to also consider the future economic impacts that could have for our community. Right now we haven't had a business say, hey, I'm not going to come here because you guys are supporting this idea and this ideology in front of your courthouse in the heart of downtown. But I believe that day is coming. We have seen that before where businesses have chose not to come to places because of views like that. So I would like us to consider that.

And then also I have two petitions that I have available to you guys. I did not print them out. Didn't want to waste the paper. It's a lot of paper. But I can make that available. And on those petitions you can see area codes for all the people from where they signed it. Our first petition had over thirty—three thousand signatures. And I can verify five thousand being directly in Anderson, along with a lot that aren't from and then people who didn't put their area code. And then I have one of three hundred and thirty thousand signatures, again, asking for the relocation of the monument. That one I don't have an exact number just because it's so big the file wasn't able to sort that for me. But with time I can be able to do that.

And so today I would like to say that as a white man in South Carolina who has grown up in this wonderful city, there's been a lot of times in my life where I can look back and know that there were things that I did not speak up about when it comes to racial injustices in my own town. And the time of that when we can turn a blind eye is gone. It is time for us to step forward and take these issues on head on.

And I know the councilwoman mentioned the Heritage Act earlier, that -- and you say that you don't have any power. And I understand what you're saying. But

this committee, this council, does have the power to submit to the S.C. Legislature to have that monument relocated.

GRACIE FLOYD:

SAM BROOKS:

And so what I would ask is that you would submit that monument for relocation. I'm asking you to make a decision for the unity of Anderson. I'm asking you to make a decision to fight oppression of African-Americans in our own hometown. And I'm asking you to decide if those that fought for Robert E. Lee, those who fought for slavery, were in the right. Because if they're right, Ms. Gracie should not be on y'all's council. If that's true, if that's what we believe, then Mayor Roberts should not be our mayor. If that's true, then Matthew shouldn't be able to be a pastor in our community.

And so as the town of Anderson, is that the ideals that we want to lift up and say we believe in? That we want to say we'll stand behind this; we don't want it going anywhere. If it's a financial issue -- I know that relocation is not a cheap thing, I would ask that you allow me to get the funds necessary to do that. Allow me to work with my committee to do that. And as far as a place for relocation, that part, the old Silverbrook Cemetery, as much as it was destined for that place, I don't necessarily believe it's the best place for it. I would love to put it in the old Confederate Battlegrounds in Anderson; a place where it can be properly contexturalized and put in the right place. Because right now it's sitting in front of a courthouse that's supposed to stand for freedom and liberty for all. And that does not stand for freedom and liberty for all.

So as I conclude, I want to thank you guys so much for allowing me to speak. I'm asking you to be bold and I'm asking you to do what's right. But I'm asking you to be accountable for your decision. If it's going to be a no, then we deserve to know why and why that's what we want to hold up. And if anyone here -- I know there's a lot of people talking back and forth. If you have an issue with anything like this, please come talk to me. Don't bother anyone else here that came up and spoke. We can have a peaceful conversation about it. I would love to talk to you. And thank you so much for your time, again, today. Thank y'all.

TOMMY DUNN: Moving on to presentation on issues of George Brock Road. Ms. Murdock.

JUDY MURDOCK: I'm sorry. I had made a

-- I put these on screen because I know it's hard to look at print. I gave y'all an orange folder. I'm presenting a couple of documents, so I want you to be able to see them with your eyes, but I have them there if that's helpful. Are we good?

TOMMY DUNN: I'm good.

JUDY MURDOCK: All right. Thank you. I'm Judy Murdock, and my husband Brett and I run the U.S. Seedless Plant Breeding and Research Station at the corner of Trail Road and George Brock Road. I wanted to present a few points that the council maybe needed to have considered before they voted to keep George Brock Road under county maintenance.

Closer? Can y'all hear? Is that better? TOMMY DUNN: That's better.

JUDY MURDOCK: Good. If you refer in your packet to -- I've not labeled the things -- there's number 1, some letters, the Anderson County Fire Chief had asserted that George Brock Road is a shortcut needed for emergency response. The fact is, George Brock Road is one of three roads that are available for emergency response to those points. The fire department, however, has not given any numerical or statistical data to substantiate that claim.

If you look at handout number one, it's a letter to the Anderson County Fire Chief from the county delegation which states, and I'll quote it, and it's up there, we the delegation are asking if you could please provide us with data as far as times and route distances and the number of calls in that area for the need of using the George Brock Road shortcut. Also, if you would provide data showing time added or saved by closing George Brock Road, plus the number of times you have used George Brock Road shortcut to answer fire calls on the other side, unquote.

So the fire chief never responded with any actual data whatsoever to the county delegation on that point. Why can't the fire department provide real data to prove that George Brock Road is necessary or that it increases response time if it's a shortcut? I think it's because there isn't data to support that.

If you'll look at handout number two, it's the colorful one. I like pictures. I want to introduce you to a company called Enza Zaden. Enza Zaden is a Fortune 500 vegetable breeding company that develops and sells new vegetable varieties around the world. Their breeding activities are non-GeoMode. They are environmentally responsible.

They have -- if you would move on to the third slide. They have over two thousand employees in

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twenty-five countries and they represent forty nationalities. Now, two years ago, Enza Zaden began a scientific collaboration with our research station, which is called U.S. Seedless, like I said, and we're located right around George Brock Road and near Trail Road. Nine representatives from Enza Zaden have visited our research station in the last two years.

So if you'll look at slide four. I'm sorry. We're a little bit behind there. And maybe even move on to the next one. You can see, Enza Zaden is not Monsanto. They're an independent family-owned company, but they are pouring seventy-five million euros into research annually. That's eighty-eight million dollars.

If you'll point to the next letter, the next -thank you. If you'll look at your handout number three, it's a letter from one of Enza Zaden's breeding research managers, and he says -- his name is Robert Barham. And I'll quote something he wrote in the letter. He says at this time we are negotiating to extend the Enza U.S. Seedless collaboration for at least three more years. Hopefully more. We're impressed with the dedication and output of the U.S. Seedless professional and support staff. It's pleasing to see U.S. Seedless be a force of good for the local youth in providing summer and extended jobs and training in horticulture and agriculture, unquote. over the next three years Enza Zaden is looking to pour maybe a million dollar investment into the research activities in the community right down where our research station is at.

Now, if you'll still refer -- can you flip to the next one. The next portion of his letter I highlighted in green on your sheets there. And I quote Mr. Barham again. At Enza Zaden we always take stringent measures, and this is the point I want to get to, to protect our proprietary resources. I cannot overstate the importance of security for a plant breeding research station. I urge the governing bodies of South Carolina to consider the unique security requirements of agricultural genetic research and lend their aid and protection to the U.S. Seedless in their efforts to secure safe fields for their research and for Enza Zaden's consideration of the potential to establish a presence in South Carolina, unquote. Which is being done as we speak.

If you'll refer now to item number four in your little packet. It's a letter from Dr. Gilbert Miller from Clemson University, and that's slide seven there. Thank you. And I'll quote him, as a vegetable researcher at Clemson's Edisto Research and Education

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Center in Blackville, South Carolina, I understand how 2 detrimental the consequence of theft, invasion and 3 vandalism of my research fields could be. EREC 4 comprises over two thousand five hundred acres of 5 fields where research is conducted on a wide assortment 6 of vegetable, cotton, corn, soybean, peanut and other 7 There are several county roads which cross the 8 research station. Fortunately, we have been allowed to gate these roads and access is limited to EREC 9 10 personnel. The entire parameter of the station is 11 fenced and gated, unquote. Okay. Well, U.S. Seedless 12 owns a one hundred fifty acre research field that is 13 completely bisected by George Brock Road. It cuts it 14 right in half and runs local traffic right through the 15 middle of some of our most valuable and sensitive 16 research material.

Now, we experience repeated vandalism and destruction of our breeding material because the isolation of George Brock Road and the easy access provides, you know, just an easy in and out for intruders. Nobody sees them because nobody lives down Vandals profit from the isolation of the road to break through our security barriers. Unlike soybeans or grain crops, watermelon makes an especially vulnerable target. The road also increases the hazard to the young people who work for us. Over twenty-five years, we've employed and mentored more than two hundred young people from all over South Carolina. These young people get to work in plant breeding, horticulture, crop production, green management -greenhouse management and life experience. And we've got crews of five to twenty-five kids working most days in the summertime.

If you'll go to the next. That's it. Thank you. If you'll look at your handout number five, it's a letter from Dr. Timothy Cowan. He's the President of the South Carolina Governor's School for Agriculture at John de la Howe. I'll just make a note of some things that he wrote in the letter. Says over my lifetime there have been several people that had a huge impact on my love and passion for agriculture. My dad, my high school ag teachers, my Clemson agriculture profession and Dr. Murdock, which is my husband. I can still recall when I first met him as a twelve year old child and listened intently about his plant breeding Now, as an adult, I realize the impact he research. unknowingly had on my career path. Whether privately and publicly funded, the research conducted at farms like Dr. Murdock's ensures that mankind has a viable plan to feed and clothe our rapidly growing world

population. A dollar amount cannot be placed upon the value of their developments and for engaging and exposing our youth to the science of agriculture, end of quote there.

Just let me restate what he said. A dollar amount can't be placed on the value of their developments in engaging youth to the science of agriculture. This is important, what we're trying to do. I submit George Brock Road cutting right through the heart of our research field creates a real and present danger to both or highly valued scientific research and to the safety of our student workers, of which there are many. This is a serious consideration and should not be disregarded without supporting data.

The council should reconsider these concerns and demand that the fire department allies which are informing the council, rightly so, should justify with hard data, the veracity of any opinions or assertions they may have made about the necessity of George Brock Road. There should be data for this.

If you'll go to the last one here. This statement came to me yesterday in an email from our representative at Duke Energy that's wanting to put a battery collection site out in our area. And he says, quote, Duke is in favor of the road closure and lends our support. We have plans for the battery site and closing the road would help us keep the site more secure, unquote.

Well, I just ask you, why would the county not have wanted to help a science station protect their research from vandalism? Why would the county not have wanted to support a science research station that's educating youth and doesn't cost the taxpayers anything? would the county have ignored the professional recommendations of Clemson University and other research professionals to secure scientific research that has a global impact? Why would the county have ignored the state's precedent of closing roads in other areas to protect scientific research. Why was the county eager to maintain a road that is one of three -three -- emergency response routes available to that area? Why, with so many county roads demanding taxpayer upkeep, would the county want to maintain a redundant road with so many other reasons why closure would be beneficial? And finally, why would the county not want to support the security needs of Duke Energy's battery site? Unlike the one that's out here near the Civic Center, it's not sitting very close to the watchful eye of the sheriff's department. security problems that plague our business on George

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Brock Road will be an ongoing plaque to Duke Energy's

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 that there were a hundred and forty-eight thousand new cases. One hundred and forty-eight (verbatim) new cases of the coronavirus. And there were two hundred and forty-two thousand deaths because of it. What's going on? Okay. And yesterday, sixteen thousand four hundred and seventy-six people died.

We need to do something. We need to do something. I listened to the man who said that he would sue if we did this because it's unconstitutional. Well, so are seatbelts, but you wear one. So are seatbelts for babies, but you put him in one. You have to pay your taxes. Now if you're going to go down and say that paying taxes is unconstitutional, I'll go with you because I pay more than seven hundred dollars. Driving on the street, it tells me that there's a light there that says if it's red I have to stop. I am not going to leave this to my understanding. I'm going to ask some people in the audience, the Anderson Hospital staff, headed by Michael Cunningham. Are you there? Are they there?

MICHAEL CUNNINGHAM: Yes.

GRACIE FLOYD: Thank you. I'm going to ask these people to come up, and I want them to tell you what they have told me about this pandemic. Let me tell you this. I am home today. I do not have the virus. God, please. I do not have the virus. But I have been exposed to someone with it who called me and told me the problem. So I am home. I will not come out there among you because I don't want to be the one to make you sick, to make your family sick, or to make your seat at the dinner table empty. So I chose to stay home and get this done with Graham and the other help that I received to get it done that way. But I wanted to be here.

Mr. Cunningham, would you please introduce your guests and tell us what they're going to -- and let them say what needs to be said, but help me -- Lord Jesus, help me to tell me these people what danger we are in. Thank you.

MICHAEL CUNNINGHAM: Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman, and ladies and gentlemen of county council. I am Michael Cunningham with AnMed Health.

First of all, I'd like to introduce my two colleagues. Well, not really colleagues, but certainly two health professionals. The first is Dr. Brad Mock who serves as the Chief Medical Officer here at AnMed Health. And the second is Jean Tillotson, who among her many duties, also helps head up our infection prevention area for AnMed Health. I will tell you that these two are rookies to county council meetings, so

this is their first county council meeting. I am not a rookie. But you've done a good job of informing them about how our county government works.

So with that I'm going to step out of the way. I do have handouts that will cover the information that Dr. Mock will be sharing with you. So to respect the barriers, I'm sure there's someone I could hand that over to that will -- and if you'll just reference these as Dr. Mock is speaking. And I think I made enough for everybody there, along with the county attorney and county administrator.

So, again, thank you for this opportunity to share with you kind of an overview of what we're seeing worldwide, nationally, and then in the state of South Carolina and then in Anderson and then also with our hospital system to give you an idea of what we're seeing as relates to COVID-19; its spread and its impact on our community. So thank you for the opportunity.

TOMMY DUNN: Thank you.

BRAD MOCK: Thank you, council

members, for the opportunity to come speak to you. As

Michael said, my name is Brad Mock. I'm the Chief

Medical Officer at AnMed Health. And thank you, Ms.

Floyd, for the invitation.

JIMMY DAVIS: Sir, I can't hear you. You're going to have to speak up.

BRAD MOCK: Sorry. Thank you, again, for the invitation. We were asked by Ms. Floyd to give some information on how the coronavirus is -what we've seen at AnMed Health and what our numbers have been like. When we first started preparing for this, we looked at what was happening in Europe as we were preparing for the coronavirus because we figured that would -- the data coming out of there was reliable. And we saw significant surges there and then we saw a retrenchment of the cases there as they started to escalate in the United States. Europe is experiencing another surge today. They're having significantly more cases, actually, than they had in the surge one. They are seeing fewer deaths associated with that, but significant numbers of hospitalizations.

If you'll look at major cities in the U.S., they're experiencing something very similar now. And if you'll look at -- as far as AnMed itself, if you'll look at that first graph -- and I'm sorry, Ms. Floyd, that you don't have this -- you'll see where we peaked in late July, early August, and saw a significant drop in the number of cases, with the nadir being about the last week in October. And we have since started seeing our

cases go back up. We reached a low of about twenty-five inpatients at AnMed Health who were COVID position and we are in the mid-forties today. And that trend has been continuing.

The next couple of pages of what you have just talk about some of the things that have impacted our numbers. We believe at AnMed Health after the city council mask ordinance, we did see a decrease in the number of cases. There's always a lag between any intervention that people take and the results that follow that. We have seen an increase in cases after most of the holidays when people spend more time together, frequently in larger crowds. We've also seen a significant increase in the number of positive cases in our testing over the last three to four weeks. where we were running ten percent six weeks ago, we're now running better than fifteen percent. And what's generally considered to be under control is less than five percent by the epidemiologists. We have had significant numbers of staff out of work. Most of those, as many other employers in the county are seeing, are community exposures rather than work related exposures.

And if you'll turn to the next page, one of the things that challenges us as a healthcare facility is that many of these patients are there for quite a bit longer than our typical patient. The typical length of stay for a COVID positive patient is almost twice what it is for a regular patient. So as a result, when those numbers go up, those patients stay in the hospital longer and it creates a census problem for us in terms of trying to care for all the patients. We have created additional ICUs. When we had our first surge, we added twenty-one additional ICU beds in multiple locations to be able to accommodate the sick patients that were both COVID and non-COVID. So we've had to do substantial work as a result of that.

And if you'll turn to the next page, you'll sort of see some of our average numbers in terms of census of COVID. We hit a peak in late July or early August of about eighty-five patients who were COVID positive. And again, we got as low as twenty-five patients in the last few weeks before we started back up.

If you'll go to the next page, there's some great information, of course, from the DHEC website. I'm sure y'all are used to looking at that. The graph that has the mountainous green line there is the percent —it's the seven—day moving average of a percent positive for COVID—19 tests in South Carolina. And again, you can see where we peaked around July 14th and a slow

trend down, but that trend has reversed and started back up. And again, I think yesterday's number was sixteen percent positive of all the tests that were done in the state of South Carolina.

On the next page you'll see, again, the peak that we experienced in mid-summer. And again, if you look at those two lines, the red and the blue that are trending back up are the upstate and midlands. The low country, which actually had one of the highest peaks in the mid-summer is trailing behind there. But we see significant trend in the wrong direction in terms of number of positive cases in this area.

And the last page is Anderson County. So on that DHEC website, you can select county-specific data. And this is Anderson County up through November 1st. And again, you can see a significant jump in the number of cases over the last few weeks.

Typically, as far as the hospital is concerned, the positive cases don't necessarily result directly in hospitalization. But two to four weeks later we will see our numbers go up significantly, as well. And I think that's what we're starting to experience from late October to early November. Our numbers are going up now.

We do support a mask ordinance for the county. We believe it helps in terms of reducing the spread of coronavirus. We believe in social distancing, masking, and we would absolutely support the council to pass that measure.

I'll be happy to take any questions if you have them.

TOMMY DUNN: Anyone have any questions?

GRACIE FLOYD: Yes. But Mr. Chairman, I will wait to the end and ask my questions then. And I would like for them to stay near the mic when they finish their presentation. Thank you.

TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Wooten.

CRAIG WOOTEN: Do you have any experience or -- you brought us data saying there's a problem. I think everybody in the room knows there's a problem. So then the question becomes the solution. And for us, you're wanting us to take data and create public policy. The problem with that is how do you create public policy that achieves the desired result? It's easy to say mask ordinance. What's hard is enforcing it. What's hard is communicating it to people. What's hard is making people social distance. And so that's the realities we have to operate in. As we've seen other topics here, people are passionate

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about a whole host of things. We have to take that passion and then put it into something that can actually be implemented and executed.

So outside of just, hey, we want a mask ordinance; hey, we want social distancing, can you point to things that we can critically do, because I do believe there's a problem. I voted for the mask ordinance. I took flack for the next two weeks on Facebook, personal text messages, phone calls. People confronted me in public about it. So I get that there's a problem. But I think what's getting lost on us is actually finding a solution. And so I put that back on you as a medical professional, tell us things that are working in other places, because right now the amendment I see, or the ordinance I see is title only. So that means there's no meat to it. It's just pass it and we'll figure it That's troublesome because I'm going to out later. have to go explain to the public what it's all about. So do you have examples of fundamentally how we can implement things so that if it is considered -- and right now my fellow supporter is, by ordinance, not going to be able to vote today. So just sheer numbers, you know, show us a path forward.

BRAD MOCK: I wish I had more information for you on how to carry that out in a way that would be more effective. Public policy is not my forte. But I do see the challenge that you're referring to. But unfortunately there's not a lot of other activities that any community has found other than the lockdowns, which again, that's -- my vote for the mask ordinance and social distancing is to avoid creating lockdowns because it's very damaging to the -we've had patients who did not come seek care that they needed because they were scared to come out and come to the hospital. So we support people trying to function in society as best we can by trying to follow those rules. To my knowledge there are no other significant advances beyond a vaccine. And while there is some promise it was released in the last day or two with that, it still would be months before we would see the effect of that.

CRAIG WOOTEN: And that's a key differentiation I want the public to hear is the county is different than the city. The city actually issues business licenses. The city actually does things that connect it to the businesses that allow enforcement. This is a two hundred thousand person county, which is one of the largest counties in the state. It's a mixture of rural areas, population areas, too. I guess what I'm pointing out is I agree with you that I

believe masks work or at least everything I've heard. I don't have the credentials you have. But fundamentally putting it into place is easier said than done. And well after everybody leaves here, we'll be the ones at the public safety meeting at eight in the morning. We'll be the ones on the phone at night having to figure out a true solution.

And we have more stringent guidelines that we put in place when they are with a patients. And it is on that basic principal of we are protecting each other.

I know that does not speak to how to create your policy, but that is what our policy states. And all we can do is encourage people to do that. Because we are a community, and that is what we want, is for us to protect each other.

TOMMY DUNN: Thank y'all. Any more

questions?

BRETT SANDERS: Yes, sir, Mr. Chairman. TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Sanders.

BRETT SANDERS: I was looking at -- on your handout, and you stated in here that following the city council's mask ordinance there was a decline by thirty percent. And then you look at the data that you provided me, there really wasn't a decline. I mean we're following a trend with PeeDee, the midlands, the upstate, the low country. I know the population in the low country may be less or more, but I understand we're here to promote a mask ordinance -- or you're here to promote it -- but the data you showed me doesn't show anything of how it helped to do anything. You just stated that there was a decrease by thirty percent in the city. And then you go back and look, well, in the last eight weeks -- the last three weeks, we're fifteen percent positive. And I'm not -- my question, I quess is, how did you come up with the thirty percent? Because the city had a mask ordinance, did they check everyone in the city and say, well, they're thirty percent less? I mean, I like the presentation.

appreciate what you've put together. But the first line that you put in there doesn't even flow with what you presented to me.

BRAD MOCK: So that representation was for the whole county, the thirty percent, in terms of the number of cases that showed up in the next sixty days.

BRETT SANDERS: So we don't know if the mask that the city done had any effect on this; is that correct?

BRAD MOCK: Yes. Most of those relationships to those time periods on there were put on there for the benefit of -- to see what impact, if any.

BRETT SANDERS: Okay. Thank you.

First of all, I want to turn your attention to our Mission Statement for Anderson County. Let's start there. The Mission Statement says Anderson County is honored and privileged to serve its residents, workers and visitors with the highest quality public safety, with the highest quality public safety. It didn't say what most of the people want or it didn't say what the least of the people want. It said that we were going to serve our people with the highest quality. Right now our highest quality of public safety have been told to us by people in this profession and they said, wash your hands, practice social distancing and wear a mask. Wear a mask.

Now, in the past recently we have two ideas here. We have one idea with people that said to wear it and the other one says to don't wear it. We have that because in our nation no one stood up and said it was bad. Maybe I didn't say that right. No one stood up and said it was a good thing to do it. We had one side doing it, but we had the leader of our nation telling

us that you didn't have to do it; it didn't work; and this and that. And you have half the people following that and other half doing that. You have said things like, well, you can't tell people what to do. Now, you know better than that because we do it twice a month. We tell people what to do. We tell people to wear seatbelts. And not only them, your kids got to wear seatbelts, too. And they did it. They do it nationally. They do it. Nobody stood up and said, well, you're a sissy. You're not a man if you have to wear a seatbelt. Nobody can tell -- I'm going to sue you if I have to wear my seatbelt. We were told to do it. We were told that it was going to be a law of the land and we did it.

During that time two hundred and forty-two thousand nine hundred and fifty-four did not die because they didn't wear their seatbelt. So don't tell me that you can't, you can't make people do things. You can't tell people what to do. I don't want to hear that. And whoever else said that I just don't like to tell people what to do. I mean that's ludicrous. That ludicrous.

Okay. Somebody mentioned that we have two hundred thousand people in the county.

Also, I got a report this morning as far as on the QRVs. They're all up and running. We're actually below budget what we had originally thought it was going to cost. Again, the cost of these vehicles and these fleet -- excuse me -- QRVs are being covered through EMS funding that we were already -- had basically budgeted to go to the providers. Currently our priority is basically relinquishing some of their money for us to cover their district with QRVs.

This QRV system is working great. We seem to be getting some good response times. Everything I looked at through Steve Kelly's report earlier, the response times are actually down as far as getting a paramedic on the scene. It's just -- seems to be working out to be a great program. And please, by all means, if you guys hear concerns in your district, please bring them to our attention. We're definitely trying to correct any issues ahead of the game, but currently it seems to be a good program. And I honestly think it's going to provide better EMS care, not only to our citizens, but also it's going to be more feasible for Anderson County as far as getting a handle on the cost and expense of the EMS program.

Mr. Chairman, that's all I've got at this time. Thank you.
