And with your kindness and generosity, we was able to do what we started out to do and we just thank you all. And we just pray and hope that God will continue to bless you in your endeavors. I think we've had maybe seven meetings since March for county council. And I understand to do 31 32 with the pandemic. And we certainly don't want anybody to come if they are sick. But there have been several 33 34 members on council that have not attended regularly. One who's no longer here, he was running for the senate 35 36 and he got kind of lazy about coming to meetings. And 37 another one, Ms. Floyd, who has had some issues. And I 38 don't know how y'all are going to resolve that. But we need to have -- each person out here who is a citizen 39 needs to have their county council person represent 40 them. You can't do that if you're not here and if you 41 42 can't come to meetings or whatever the situation is. Moving on, report from the Public Safety Committee held on Monday, January the 4th. I'll turn it over now to the Public Safety Committee Chairman, Mr. Graham.

RAY GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

There's actually three things that we need to bring forth in the form of suggestions for us voting to full council support. If it's okay I'll cover those and then we'll go back and get kind of an update on two of these other items.

The Public Safety Committee brings forth in the form of a recommendation -- and we done all three of these together and that's the way I'll present it. If we do need to separate we can at that time. But Public Safety brings this in the form of a motion. It was brought up that we hire one full time employee to the QRV Program. Just the savings in part-time help and also overtime help is going to make this more than worth its while. This is an investment we started with the QRV Program and it's just a matter of continuing to build this, so we supported that a hundred percent.

We also, on the purchase of two new QRVs. As you know, once we started this program, Stone basically took and literally got vehicles from the sheriff's department, from different departments, and created QRVs. What we need to realize, these QRVs are emergency responding vehicles that are required to go, you know, faster on the roads. So we need to ensure not only the safety of the citizens of the county but also the safety of our employee that's driving them.

There's money that will be made available as far as through the QRV that's the funding that's coming back for that program that would purchase these vehicles. And realistically speaking, we're probably talking about July before we would actually receive these vehicles. But we want to go ahead and move forward as far as voting on these and basically go ahead and order, and that way we'll cut out some of that downtime waiting on them. Again, that comes forth in the form of a motion, as well.

The last one is basically -- I'm going to give a little bit more information just to kind of catch you

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up, Councilman Wright. As far as on -- we originally had three -- excuse me -- three trucks stationed throughout the county that was Ebenezer, Williford and Sandy Springs that was basically a twelve-hour truck. With that being said, our cost of that was seventy-two fifty, is what we allocated to those providers for each truck. Well, since then with the QRV and stuff that we've redone, we now only have one truck, and that's actually with Sandy Springs. Sandy Springs' truck with just the development up there, I mean they're absolutely getting hammered. And basically the allocation that we have on that, it's not supporting that program for that provider. And it's also basically at a fourth of what we pay for one truck on a twenty-four hour, which technically twelve hours, it should be at a half. mean just keeping the math simple. So with that being said, they requested that we would go up to fifteen thousand dollars, which is a little less than half of what the subsidy is for a twenty-four hour truck.

Public Safety discussed this and felt that it was a warranted request. EMS's budget, by all means, is going to be tight this year. In fact, we're probably going to have to generate some money on some other ends to make up some of the shortcomings. But even with that being said, we have got a lot invested in the QRV program. The Sandy Springs truck is a very important part of our puzzle to make our EMS system sustainable. So with that being said, we did bring this forth before council with a hundred percent support on Public Safety, and we ask council to consider all three of these.

TOMMY DUNN: Coming from the committee, it doesn't need a second. So we'll open the floor up for discussion. And keep in mind, this is for one new employee to run the QRV program, two new vehicles for the QRV program. And they are replacing vehicles that's been handed down, I think three different times. I think they've got about three hundred thousand miles on them. And this is to reevaluate the Pendleton contract where they've got a twelve-hour ambulance. This is something new. original contract was for seven thousand plus some change. They was told this budget year we would reevaluate that and make them whole and get it back up. They've been very gracious, I think, understanding about the situation with the virus and other things.

And talking to Ms. Davis and the committee doing their work, I think this is going to -- as Chairman Graham said, it's going to be a tight budget, but I think we've got to keep a close eye on it. But I think it's doable and we can do it and it's a necessary need.

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In saying that, I just want to make sure you understand what you're voting on. And I'll open the floor up for discussion.

CINDY WILSON:

May I, Mr. Chairman?

TOMMY DUNN:

CINDY WILSON:

I wasn't quite clear on
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CINDY WILSON: I wasn't quite clear on what our funding sources would be for these -- the employee and the two new vehicles. Will that be our levy, the EMS levy?

9 levy, the EMS levy? 10 RAY GRAHAM: No. This ---

CINDY WILSON: Can any of it come out of

E911 or ...

RAY GRAHAM: Naturally, we do have some funding from the 911 system as far as on that. But I mean if we back up, and again, this is some information for Councilman Wright, as well, when we formed the QRV program three months ago, roughly, basically in providing those -- keeping it simple for the city, for MedShore's call area, part of the money that was allocated to that provider, basically part of that money comes back to the county now to sponsor the QRV program.

So in a sense, that's where the money is coming back Each month we're getting that money back in. By July when these vehicles are ready, you know, naturally we'll have some money banked up. I don't want to sugarcoat it. The EMS program, you know, it's a system that we have to sponsor from somewhere. So I mean that program is probably going to come up short this year. I don't think it's necessarily due to us going to the QRV program. If anything, the QRV Program, I still stand firm, I think that was a great move on our part. It gives us better coverage, better care, better quality. I don't want -- when I say better control, I don't want to sound like that we as a county needs to be in control of everything. But we are in control of the care that we provide our citizens. The level, the whole nine yards, and it just creates a better environment for us to do that.

I truly think that we're continuing moving into a positive direction with the EMS Program and this is just part of it. However, even though that money is coming back to that fund each month, we as a council still have to vote to add -- to purchase two new trucks, to spend some of that money to purchase -- excuse me -- to add a full time employee. Again, that full time employee, just the savings alone that right now we're spending on overtime and part-time help is going to offset that full time employee.

So there's going to be some added benefits, but I

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mean still it's going to far outweigh putting that extra
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     employee on. Just to let you know, that will bring us
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     up to nine employee for the QRV program.

TOMMY DUNN: I'd just like to add -and I appreciate the comments on that, Ms. Wilson, especially being a fireman for our thirty-eight years, but Anderson County -- I had a conversation the other day with somebody about the schools. And I don't begrudge nobody, the schools or fire department -- and ${\ \mbox{I}}$ know that's Mr. Wright's background, but they've got their own thing. Anderson County government has enough worries and liabilities and responsibilities without taking on somebody else's. The fire departments have got a fire commission and a governing body they need to adhere to, and the delegation. But also, and we've touched on this before and I hope -- what we can do to help some fire departments, what I'd like to see, Mr. Davis had a little spot here a month or so ago and I brought this up back last year, I think any fee in lieu of we do for new companies coming into the county, we need to earmark -- some of that money needs to go directly not to the fire commission but needs to go to the fire department serving that district. That's who's That's who's having -- putting the responsible for it. burden on them. And we need to help them a little bit. My thoughts on that.

Anyone else on the Public Safety Committee's recommendations? All in favor of the motion show of hands. All opposed like sign. Show the motion carries unanimously.

Chairman Graham.

RAY GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

As far as the discussion of (end of audio) EMS budget plan, that was just a broad sentence that kind of basically was -- all the items below that was discussed.

As far as discussion for putting EMS out for RFP, as council members know, we're coming up on the end of the contract and we are -- we will be looking at possibly putting that out for RFP to the providers to basically

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 come up with a new contract and make sure we're continuing moving in the right direction.

What our hopes is, is Leon, Steve Kelly and Don McCowan will be getting together and coming forth with a plan on that. And hopefully we'll be discussing that more, probably early February.

Am I missing anything? Seems like there's one other thing.

TOMMY DUNN: While you're thinking about that, Mr. Chairman, I'd just like to point out, we need to make sure to get this right. The time is essential. July will be here before you know it. And we have time to do things. I think it's very imperative we do put out requests for proposals county-wide, each individual zone, what not. I think I was able -- appreciate being able to attend the meeting yesterday morning and some good discussion, some good things. You know, I think we get hung up sometimes in these zones. The citizens don't care. They want quality care. They don't care what ambulance is coming to them.

But saying that and saying this, as Mr. Davis pointed out yesterday and in a discussion me and him had, we put this out requests for proposals. That don't mean -- council is still going to have to look at everything and decide which way we want to go. So everybody get -- because I'm sure there's going to be some things some of us have some areas with EMS providers, maybe a little touchy about this, but this is not to say they can't put in a request and won't get the request or keep things the way they are. I think it's something we definitely need to look at because two things for sure.

Number one, we keep going back around, around in circles with the same things. So we've got to change things up some in my opinion. The second thing, Mr. Graham made this comment yesterday, I think. Since he come on council four years ago and since I come on council about twelve years ago, this thing has slowly gotten better. I think the EMS thing is better today than what it was four years ago when Mr. Graham come on. And I think it's better than what it was two years ago. I think we've steadily got some improvement, but we've still got a long way to go. Just want to get things that are best for our citizens.

Chairman Graham.

RAY GRAHAM: Thank you. Just want to finish up letting council know, Steve and Don has done remarkable as far as trying to ensure that we are very efficient in our operations with the EMS. You know, naturally on some of the additions and the changes we've

made this year, there is some other costs there. But they have assured us that they're going to be watching the budget very closely and looking at it with Rita and see if there's any things that we can cut to even improve that deficit by the end of this budget cycle.

But we are continuing moving forward with that. Councilman Wright, probably EMS is probably one of the things that we all get a lot of phone calls over time. If there is any problems, feel free to reach out to Public Safety or to Steve and them. I'm not saying we're where we need to be because we're not. But I mean we are continuing moving forward. They have made some great strides to really get back with the customers, the citizens, when there is an issue. Normally there's an explanation. And we use it as a growing pain and learn from it and move forward with it.

Mr. Chairman, that's all I've go. I do appreciate your time.

TOMMY DUNN: Yes, sir. Appreciate the fine, hard work you and your committee has done. And Mr. Chairman, the other thing I think was discussed was maybe some personnel problems with some squads and I think you handled that good, telling them, I hope, Mr. Kelly and his sidekick is well on top of that and taking care of that. And that's what needed to be done. Again, I want to thank y'all for the job y'all are doing and continue to do.

Anyone else have anything else on the EMS discussion, Public Safety Committee?

Hearing and seeing none, we'll move on to item number 14, appointments. We'll start off with Councilman from District 1, Mr. Wright. Mr. Wright?

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     the Christmas spirit has been overwhelming.
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    decorations in town, even though we couldn't have the
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    lighting of the Christmas tree ceremony, the tree is
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    magnificent; all the decorations downtown. The flags
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    that are being put up, instead of just the generic flag
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    on every post, they're ones that highlight different
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areas of the town. One that's just on the skating. One that's -- another one on -- oh, I forget what they are. I took pictures. But I took many pictures this year. The downtown trees in the middle, the lighting. Anderson County just looked great. And it help with the negative attitude with everything else that's going on.

It's time, however, -- and basically, though, all those decorations are within a two block, three block area, from Fig's to the Anderson business office. But we need to help out some other areas. And I'm not sure whose responsibility it is, the roads. I'm not talking about the asphalt and the potholes. I'm talking about the maintenance of the islands that are in the middle of the roads and all the leaves and the debris that are on the side of the roads, that are in the drainage areas. Murray Avenue particularly. All the roads need to be cleaned and all of that gotten up. The division when you get up to the Annex building and you're going to turn towards town and come down Fant Street, that divider. We can do better.

I have enlarged my area of pick-up to ten miles every week instead of six. And I now have people who see this decrepit lady out there, becoming decrepit lady out there, who are now coming behind me in other areas and picking up. We've got just trash everywhere.

So I would like to propose that every citizen in Anderson County spend one hour a week picking up trash, cleaning up neighborhoods, responding. Calling in when you see tires on the side of the road or things you can't pick up. Imagine with two hundred thousand people in Anderson County, two hundred thousand hours a week, that we could clean up this county. It's not enough to have the downtown in a three block area looking nice when the rest of the county really needs a do-over.

LEON HARMON:

MAURICE MARTIN: Maurice Martin, District 2. I'm a community leader. Been a community leader about fifteen years. Last session I brought a family in, Tommy Dunn. They was homeless. They got evicted. You know, you looked at them in their eyes and said we're going to try to help you but ain't nothing guaranteed. They exhausted their options. Went to AIM, SHARE and all that. These organizations get millions of dollars, and plus y'all contribute to them. It's families out here need y'all to help them out.

And you talk about the jobs. Ms. Wilson, you talk about the 3.5, 3. unemployment rates, you're proud of it. But you've got to think about the homeless people. There's thousands of homeless people. It's people who's

unemployed, who do not even apply for unemployment. The rate that we are saying that is incorrect. Our organization goes inside the community. We see what's going on. We see the transportation. We see the jobs that need to be done. A lot of these jobs is not out here hiring. Most of these jobs out here that's being brought forward to our county is not paying. You have families working two and three jobs that needs y'all's assistance.

So what I'm saying is the family that I brought forth to you in December, they're still homeless. They're still evicted. The only thing y'all had to do was just pick up a cell phone. Even you could have put them in a hotel for at least two days. Even you could have called AIM or SHARE. Help these people out. They came to y'all. You turned your back on the community. There's organizations that feed people every day, every week, every month. I appreciate your, boss man, for doing that. We have an organization that do it all year round. We do it all year round. We appreciate it. But here it is, y'all county council. Help the people that need to be helped. You have organizations taking money out of their pocket to be able to do something that y'all supposed to be doing.

Force these organizations, AIM, SHARE, help these people out here, these organizations. We are community leaders. We want to help with everybody. We want to be a team. But here it is, when we get phone calls and we don't get no assistance, we come and reach out to y'all. Here it is, the family still homeless, two kids, young lady pregnant. Here it is. Y'all turned y'all's back on the community. Thank you.

But we get comments all the time on this employee going out of their way doing this. This employee going out of their way doing that. But if you look at where our nation has been in this past year, where our state has been, where our county has been, and you look at what we've been exposed to with this virus and all of the fallout that has came along with it, I tell you, I'm proud to be a part of this county. I'm proud of what our citizens does on an individual basis, you know, stepping up, serving the community. I'm proud of what our employees does on a regular basis, stepping up, serving the community.

And I'll stand by that all day long. I think we've got a great county, and I'm proud to be a part of it. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

I've never seen such an outpouring of providing resources and trying to coordinate to make sure people have jobs. We've even had school superintendents that came to our county a few years ago saying they had a lot of bright students who were just bored to tears in class, they were afraid they were going to drop out. So our administrator and others went to bat immediately pulling everybody together.

And we also have tax credits for job training. So there are so many resources available. If somebody wants to go clean, they can go clean and get a job. And we'll do everything that we can publicly and privately to make that possible.

We've got a long road ahead of us this year. But I have great hopes that because we have come out of the last recession one of the top seven in the nation, I have great hopes and beliefs that we'll come out of this terrible mess, too, because we have good people and a strong faith in God. Thank you.

TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Ms. Wilson. I just want to say two things. You ain't got to go probably two or three blocks to see a help wanted sign for someone in Anderson County. I tell people all the time, you might not make what you want to make, you might not be doing what you want to do, but you can get a job if you want one.

Our administrator has worked tirelessly since he's come on to try to get training for jobs. We've got a great thing with our adult education, our school districts, our technical schools, our high schools.

But also, Mr. Burns, he's working on a thing right now trying to get transportation to outlying areas. He has expanded on transportation in the county to make it

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better than it was before he got here and still tirelessly working on it and with council support. And appreciate that, Mr. Burns. Appreciate all you do trying the things.

Also, the last council meeting some regular spewed about the Friendship Court thing. We all seen how that turned out and how that's come out and the facts. If anybody wants to ask me, I've got the facts on that about who's taking care of that. But some people don't want to hear it.

But I want to reiterate back, I want to thank our citizens for the great job they've done in Anderson County, for being part of Anderson County. I think Anderson County is blessed. I want to thank our employees. My thoughts and prayers is hope they stay safe and Mr. Burns looks after them as the council does what needs to be done to keep them safe through these trying times.

Look forward to this year. We've got a lot of work to do. As Mr. Graham commented a while ago, tightening up our EMS system. I think we've got a good start on that. We've got work to do. We've got sewer projects that we need to get a hold of and get rid of and get sewed up and get done. We've got subdivision regulations, and I'm putting that at speed. We got slowed down a little bit because of the virus and things, but my hope is to have something for council to vote on in February on that, up and down, one way or the other.

And as always, economic development is a thing in Anderson County. As I talked to someone yesterday, our employment rate is very low. That's just a fact. You might not like it, but it is what it is. But the thing as it is, and I told her, who knows when something might happen and a company shuts down and loses two hundred jobs. That's the reason we've got to stay vigilant out here and try to get the jobs.

The difference where Anderson is today than what it was several years ago, we can pick and choose a little bit better now and get good paying jobs for the citizens of Anderson County and the right kind of things. We've got -- Anderson County has really been blessed. Their economy, when it comes to it, if this industry goes down we've still got some other ones to pick up. And I'll tell you right now, in talking to some folks the other day, we don't know how blessed we are to be in Anderson and in South Carolina because people are working. Companies and industries are working. There's so many counties, towns and states that's shut down. They're unable to work. Got unemployment. Unemployment is

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-041 AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE DIMINUTION OF THE TERRITORY OF THE METROPOLITAN SEWER SUBDISTRICT AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO.

February 2, 2021

- **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED.** by the County Council of Anderson County (the "County Council"), the governing body of Anderson County, South Carolina ("Anderson County"), in meeting duly assembled:
- **Section 1 Findings of Fact.** The County Council makes the following findings of fact in connection with the enactment of this ordinance (this "*Ordinance*"):
- (a) Pursuant to the provisions of Title 6, Chapter 11, Article 3 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended (the "SPD Boundary Laws"), and specifically, Sections 6-11-420 and 430 of the SPD Boundary Laws, the County Council is empowered to take action to enlarge, diminish, or consolidate any special purpose district lying within Anderson County upon receipt of a petition of the governing body of the affected special purpose district.
- (b) Metropolitan Sewer Subdistrict ("Metro") is a special purpose district created pursuant to Act No. 687 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina of 1969, as amended (the "Metro Legislation"), and governed by the Metropolitan Sewer Subdistrict Commission (the "Metro Commission"). Pursuant to the Metro Legislation, the current boundaries of Metro (the "Metro Boundaries") consist of portions of Greenville County, South Carolina ("Greenville County") and, pursuant to an ordinance of the County Council enacted on December 21, 2010, the area of Anderson County encompassed by the boundaries of the Piedmont Public Service District, as shown on the map at Attachment 1 to the petition attached to this Ordinance at Exhibit A (the "Piedmont Territory"). Metro is authorized to provide sewer collection services within the Metro Boundaries.
- (c) Renewable Water Resources ("ReWa") is a special purpose district created pursuant to Act No. 362 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina of 1925, as amended (the "ReWa Legislation"), and governed by the Board of Commissioners of ReWa (the "ReWa Board"). Pursuant to the ReWa Legislation, the current boundaries of ReWa include portions of Greenville County, Anderson County, and other South Carolina counties, including the Piedmont Territory within Anderson County. ReWa is authorized to provide sewer collection services and sewer treatment and disposal services within its boundaries.
- (d) The Metro Boundaries and the boundaries of ReWa within Anderson County overlap to the extent of the Piedmont Territory; however, Metro owns and operates all sewer lines and related sewer infrastructure located within the Piedmont Territory and is the provider of sewer collection services therein.
- (e) The County Council is advised that Metro and ReWa desire that the County Council diminish the Metro Boundaries in order to remove the Piedmont Territory therefrom to allow ReWa to become the provider of sewer collection service therein. As the boundaries of ReWa currently include the Piedmont Territory, no changes to the boundaries of ReWa are necessary to achieve this result. As a result of the diminution of the Metro Boundaries as requested, the Metro Boundaries will no longer include any portion of Anderson County.
- (f) The County has received a petition of the Metro Commission, which is attached to this Ordinance at **Exhibit A** (the "*Petition*"), requesting that the County Council take proper

action to diminish the Metro Boundaries to remove the Piedmont Territory therefrom. Pursuant to the Petition, the County Council is informed that Metro and ReWa have entered into a Memorandum of Understanding regarding ReWa's assumption of the right and obligation to provide sewer collection service within the Piedmont Territory.

- (g) Pursuant to the SPD Boundary Laws, by resolution adopted on November 17, 2020, the County Council ordered that a public hearing be held on the question of whether and to what extent the Metro Boundaries should be diminished by the removal of the Piedmont Territory. Notice of the public hearing was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County once a week for three successive weeks, on December 31, 2020, January 7, 2021, and January 14, 2021, and the public hearing was held on January 19, 2021. The public hearing was conducted publicly and both proponents and opponents of the requested action were given the full opportunity to be heard.
- Section 2 Diminution of Boundaries. The diminution of the Metro Boundaries to remove the Piedmont area therefrom is hereby approved and shall be effective as of April 14, 2021 (the "Effective Date"). As of the Effective Date, the Metro Boundaries shall be modified to remove the Piedmont Territory therefrom, and the County Assessor, Auditor, and Treasurer of Anderson County are directed to take such action as is necessary to remove the Piedmont Territory from the Metro Boundaries on the respective records of such officers.
- **Section 3** No Bonds to be Issued. Responsive to Section 6-11-470(A)(2) of the SPD Boundary Laws, the County Council is advised that no bonds of Metro are to be immediately issued in connection with the action taken hereby.
- **Section 4** No Changes to Governing Body. Responsive to Section 6-11-470(A)(3) of the SPD Boundary Laws, there shall be no changes to the Metro Commission made in connection with the action taken hereby.
- **Section 5 Further Action.** The County Administrator of the County, the Chairman of County Council and other officers and staff of the County are hereby authorized and empowered to take such further action as may be necessary to fully implement the action taken by this Ordinance. A certified copy of this Ordinance shall forthwith be transmitted to the Metro Commission and the ReWa Board to advise of the action taken by the County Council.
- **Section 6 Notice of Action.** Pursuant to Section 6-11-470 of the Enabling Act, a notice of the action of the County Council taken hereby, substantially in the form of the notice attached to this Ordinance at **Exhibit B**, shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation within Anderson County once a week for two successive weeks.

- 4. Responsive to Section 6-11-470(A)(2) of the SPD Boundary Laws, the County Council is advised that no bonds of Metro are to be immediately issued in connection with the action taken hereby.
- 5. Responsive to Section 6-11-470(A)(3) of the SPD Boundary Laws, there shall be no changes to the Metro Commission made in connection with the action taken hereby.
- 6. Persons affected by the aforesaid action of the County Council may object to such action by following the procedures provided in Sections 6-11-480 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended.



Pursuant to the Metro Legislation, the current boundaries of Metro (the "Metro Boundaries") consist of portions of Greenville County, South Carolina and, pursuant to an ordinance of the County Council of Anderson County (the "County Council"), the governing body of Anderson County, South Carolina ("Anderson County"), enacted on December 21, 2010, the area of Anderson County encompassing the boundaries of the Piedmont Public Service District (the "Piedmont Territory"). Metro is authorized pursuant to the Metro Legislation to provide sewer collection services within the Metro Boundaries.
- 2. Pursuant to the provisions of Title 6, Chapter 11, Article 3 (the "SPD Boundary Laws") of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended (the "S.C. Code"), and specifically, Sections 6-11-420 and 430 of the SPD Boundary Laws, special purpose districts may petition the county council of a county in which the district is located requesting that the county council take action to enlarge, diminish, or consolidate such special purpose district. Upon the receipt of such a petition, the county council shall order a public hearing to be held for the purpose of making a determination as to whether and to what extent such special purpose district shall be enlarged, diminished, or consolidated.
- 3. Renewable Water Resources is a special purpose district created pursuant to Act No. 362 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina of 1925, as amended (the "ReWa Legislation"), and governed by the Board of Commissioners of ReWa (the "ReWa Board"). Pursuant to the ReWa Legislation, the current boundaries of ReWa include portions of Greenville County, Anderson County, and other South Carolina counties, including the Piedmont Territory within Anderson County. ReWa is authorized pursuant to the ReWa Legislation to provide sewer collection services and sewer treatment and disposal services within its boundaries.
- 4. Metro desires that the County Council diminish the Metro Boundaries in order to remove the Piedmont Territory therefrom in order to permit Metro to convey the sewer lines and related sewer infrastructure within the Piedmont Territory to ReWa and for ReWa to become the provider of sewer collection service therein. As the boundaries of ReWa currently include the Piedmont Territory, no changes to the boundaries of ReWa are necessary to achieve this result. As a result of the diminution of the Metro Boundaries through the removal of the Piedmont Area, the Metro Boundaries will no longer include any portion of Anderson County.
- 5. The Metro and ReWa are entering into a Memorandum of Understanding regarding the diminution of the Metro Boundaries, as requested hereby, and ReWa's acceptance of the obligation to provide sewer collection service within the Piedmont Territory.
- 6. Metro requests that the diminution of the Metro Boundaries, as requested hereby, be made effective within 30 days of the final approval thereof by the County Council.

WHEREFORE, pursuant to the SPD Boundary Laws a resolution of the Metro Commission dated October 30, 2020, the Metro Commission hereby petitions and respectfully requests that the County Council to order a public hearing to be held upon the question of the diminution of the Metro Boundaries, as described herein, and take such action as is necessary to effect such diminution.



ORDINANCE NO. 2021-005

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 38-66 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, ANDERSON COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, TO PROVIDE FOR TWO AT-LARGE MEMBERS OF THE ANDERSON COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION AND TO ESTABLISH TERMS OF OFFICE FOR PLANNING COMMISSION MEMBERS CONSISTENT WITH OTHER COUNTY BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

- **WHEREAS**, the Anderson County Council has authority under Section 6-28-340 of the Code of laws of South Carolina to establish a local planning commission;
- **WHEREAS,** Section 6-29-350 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina provides that local planning commissions may have not less than five members and not more than twelve members;
- **WHEREAS**, the Anderson County Planning Commission presently has one member from each County Council district; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Anderson County Council desires to increase the number of Planning Commission members to nine by adding two at-large members to the Planning Commission.
- **NOW, THEREFORE,** be it ORDAINED by the Anderson County Council in meeting duly assembled that:
- 1. Section 38-66(b) of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - (b) *Members*. The planning commission consists of nine members, with one appointment per council district and two at-large members to be appointed by County Council. Each member, once initially appointed, shall serve pursuant to the terms and provisions contained in section 2-351 of the Anderson County Code of Ordinances, as amended.
- 2. Section 38-66 (e) of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Bids were opened for this project on Thursday, January 21, 2021. Two bids were submitted, the low bidder The Belk Company, LLC with a base bid of \$1,328,700.00, and IPC Paving, LLC, with a base bid of \$1,541,456.25. Both bids exceeded the funding available for the project.

Following discussions with SCDNR, the design engineer and the low bidder a reduced scope of work was negotiated to keep the project within budget. The dock will be shortened by 42.5 feet by eliminating Bid Item #7 Standard Floating Dock section. And Bid Item #4 Gangway Platform Pier/Platform will be replaced with Alternate #9 Design-Build Fixed Gangway Platform Aluminum Structure. This reduces the low bid by \$182,000.00 for a recommended bid award of \$1,146,695.00.
