    chemicals are going to have a reaction that we have to
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    pay for. Do you know that since 1954 health issues
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    have gone up four thousand percent? That is obesity,
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    heart, diabetes, so forth. We're killing ourselves by
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what we eat and drink, breathe, live, the chem trails, everything else we're doing. So how we dispose of our waste is very important because when it goes in the ground, it doesn't just go in the ground. It's going to go through the ground and get into the water table and so forth and so on. So, that is my admonition. We had a wonderful lunch today and it was great and I pigged out just like the rest of us, but I tell you what, about three o'clock everybody's going to get the 10 droopsies and if you're diabetic, when you test your sugar, it's going to be up. And you better eat and drink very sparse the rest of the week until Christmas. Drink a lot of water to flush out all the sins that you partake of today. 14 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Harmon.

At this time I'll turn things over to Mr. Burriss Nelson. Mr. Nelson.

BURRISS NELSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. apologize. I'm getting the presentation documents to you at this late hour. This is an existing company. It's their fourth expansion since they've been here since 2004. It's a growing company, continues to They're in -- make logistics equipment. This is a ten million -- their biggest expansion thus far. Ten million dollars, seventy-one jobs, average pay of fourteen dollars an hour. Adds one point eight nine million dollars to our payroll and has a first year community impact of five million and a twenty year community impact, total impact, of sixty-seven million. The current site pays nine hundred and eighty-seven dollars in taxes. And first year estimated projected taxes will be almost ten thousand dollars in taxes. This comes to Council as a

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    recommendation from staff and from the Economic
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    Advisory Board and we request you give favorable

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The hauling contract which has two one-year renewals is set to be renewed.

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Discussions involving the camper issue, had input from one private citizen and our Codes enforcer. A camper on private property such as a lake site or hunting and family does not seem to be an issue. It's clusters of campers that appear to be on parcels of land and don't seem to have facilities like water, septic and power. There are a number of reasons that we learned that this has happened. One, which was kind of interesting, is that there's apparently some situation where other jurisdictions give people one-

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way tickets to come here and they're dumped in our 1 2 area. I don't know all of the ins and outs of that, but that was one thing that was brought up. The other 3 4 is that apparently they're drug users in a lot of 5 these situations. And as our Codes enforcer pointed 6 out to me when I said, oh, these must be drug dealers 7 in these areas. He said, no, a drug dealer would be living in a house. These are drug users. But 8 9 wherever you've got a cluster of these type campers, 10 sometimes you've got people renting spaces that really 11 don't meet our code in the county. So anyway, 12 there'll be more discussion of this in the future and 13 hopefully some resolution. And we look forward to 14 everybody's input in that. 15 But this is the report from our Planning and 16 Public Works Committee. And do my fellow members have 17 anything to add? CRAIG WOOTEN: 18 I wasn't able to make the 19 last meeting and I totally agree on the camper 20 situation because it can create a pretty bad situation. I guess I just -- my worry there is that I 21 hope leave some kind of discretion because I know many 22 of them may be drug dealers. I know many of them 23 24 maybe have ill intent, but there is a potential that 25 some of them are just that one step away from being homeless. And if they're living in a camper I hope 26 27 that, you know, maybe our law enforcement or code 28 officials can have a way to direct them or, you know. I'd hate for somebody who is actually trying to get 29 30 caught up in a way of seeking bad folks. That's my 31 only comment on that. 32 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, sir. Evaluation:

This request is to rezone the parcel of property described above from R-20 (Single Family Residential) to R-M7 (Multifamily Residential). The applicant's stated purpose for rezoning is to build townhomes/condominiums. A total of seven units per acre would be permissible, if approved for R-M7.

This property was zoned R-20 at the time of initial zoning for the Five Forks Voting Precinct in 2000.

Lebanon Road is a state road, classified as a collector. Marett Road is a county road, classified as a collector.

A county served gravity sewer line runs parallel with Lebanon Road. The county currently has limited capacity in a nearby pump station but is considering installing a new line that will free up some capacity that could serve this development.

Staff Recommendation:

While facilities exist that could support a development that is more dense than single family, the applicant's request of R-M7 is incompatible with the County's Future Land Use map as approved Ordinance 2018-001 Page 2 of 2

by County Council in the 2016 Anderson County Comprehensive Plan; therefore staff is compelled to recommend **DENIAL** of this request.

Zoning Advisory

Group Recommendation: The District 4 Zoning Advisory Group met on December 6, 2017,

and recommended DENIAL of a request to rezone from R-A to R-

M7. The vote was 3 in favor, 0 opposed, and 1 absent.

Planning Commission

12th, 2017, and after a duly noted public hearing recommended **DENIAL** of a request to rezone from R-A to R-M7. The vote was 4 in

favor, 0 opposed, and 3 absent.
