TOMMY DUNN: At this time I'd like to call 1 2 the Regular Anderson County Council meeting of 3 February the 6th to order. Like to welcome everyone, 4 each and everyone here for coming out tonight. First 5 item of business I'd like to ask Vice Chairman 6 Councilman Graham if he'd lead us in Invocation and 7 Pledge of Allegiance. If we'd all rise, please. 8 (INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY RAY GRAHAM) 9 TOMMY DUNN: Ms. Flovd. 10 GRACIE FLOYD: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, I 11 would like to take a few minutes right now to 12 introduce someone who ---13 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. Before you 14 would, I'd just like to say -- might be going to say 15 it, but this is for the record -- Ms. Floyd means no 16 disrespect. She's got some back issues is reason she 17 wasn't standing a while ago. Go ahead, Ms. Floyd. 18 GRACIE FLOYD: I'd like to introduce to 19 you Markecia Brock. Ms. Brock, would you please 20 stand? Ms. Brock is shadowing me until the month of 21 April, I think it's going to be. So you will probably 22 see her a lot. If you -- if we see each other, okay. 23 But I just want to welcome her to -- I think this will 24 be her first meeting. She is studying at the 25 University of South Carolina. Yeah. And she is a 26 registered nurse, also, at the hospital. So I'm very 27 proud of her and very pleased that she chose me to 28 shadow. But Ms. Markecia Brock. Thank you for 29 coming. 30 TOMMY DUNN: Welcome. 31 GRACIE FLOYD: Thank you. 32 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. 33 Moving on, any corrections to be made to the 34 minutes of January the 16th, 2018. Ms. Wilson? 35 CINDY WILSON: Yes, sir. On page 34, line 50, Bleckley Street was misspelled. It should be B-L-36 37 E-C-K-L-E-Y. And that's the only thing I noticed. 38 Thank you. 39 TOMMY DUNN: Anyone else? Ms. Wilson, 40 make a motion to accept the minutes with that 41 correction? 42 CINDY WILSON: May we accept the minutes 43 Thank you. as corrected. TOMMY DUNN: 44 Ms. Wilson makes a motion, 45 we have a second? Second Mr. Graham. All in favor of 46 the motion show of hands. All opposed like sign. 47 Show the motion carries unanimously. 48 At this time we'll go into Item number 4, Citizens 49 Comments. When Mr. Harmon, our legal counsel, calls 50 your name, please state your name and district for the

You have three minutes on agenda items first 1 record. 2 go-around and please address the Chair. 3 LEON HARMON: Mr. Chairman, first citizen 4 signed up is Frank Pressly. 5 FRANK PRESSLY: Frank Pressly, District 2. 6 I sat in on the Finance Committee meeting yesterday. 7 I'm going to talk about Item 13 1(d). 8 I sat in on the Finance Committee meeting 9 yesterday and listened with interest to a lot of the 10 goings on there. And there was a report from one of 11 the County employees about the purchase of three 12 Juniper switches. Particularly the EX3400-48P. Now, 13 I notice that the state contract pricing that was 14 given to us was three thousand six hundred and sixty-15 nine dollars each. 16 Well, I went to Google and I typed in Juniper 17 EX3400-48P. As you all are well aware Google tells 18 you everything about everything. And the first five 19 entries were other locations that these could be 20 purchased. Now, there is a company called 21 InteraSource that sells these same switches for one 22 thousand three hundred and ninety dollars. Now, 23 that's a two thousand two hundred and seventy-nine 24 dollar difference between what it can be purchased for 25 if somebody had done just a little due diligence and just going and buying it off a state contract price. 26 27 Now I know employees feel safe in buying at a state 28 contract price because it's a contracted price. But 29 the risk that you run there is, at the beginning of 30 the year, electronics are a hot commodity and they're 31 at top price. By the end of the year that same item has usually fallen to almost half price, when the next 32 33 generation of item has come out and so forth. So I 34 don't know if it's that we have employees that are 35 just not doing the due diligence to go and find deals 36 and they're just relying on state contract pricing to justify paying the price. But of this eleven thousand 37 38 dollar contract, six thousand eight hundred and 39 thirty-seven dollars of it could have been saved, if 40 we'd gone to InteraSource rather than whatever company 41 we bought it from. 42 Now, I don't know if we go to our vendors and say, 43 hey, this what we need to do and they say, okay, well, 44 this is what you need. Or if our vendors come to us 45 and say, hey, you need to be able to do this and this 46 so you need this. So I don't know what the 47 relationship is, but I just know that we are 48 overpaying enormously for some things and electronics 49 is probably one of the worse culprits. Thank you. 50 LEON HARMON: Mr. Chairman, next speaker

1 is Elizabeth Fant. 2 I'm speaking on, I'm ELIZABETH FANT: 3 speaking on number 10 -- Elizabeth Fant, District 3 --4 on the landfill question. I went to the meeting that 5 Cindy Wilson and Mr. Graham had at Cheddar last week 6 on the landfill situation and there were probably 7 about 50 people in the room, all hot. Not happy 8 campers. 9 The problems that they are experiencing are the 10 same ones they've been experiencing for the last 11 twenty years. Means nothing is getting done. Same problems. Biggest thing is the landfill is operated 12 13 at 24 hours a day. The stench is still horrible. The 14 buzzards are circling all around. The trucks fly up 15 the road, throwing rocks from the road. Children are 16 They -- you can't let your children out out playing. 17 anywhere near there. I still know of five different 18 families that I know that have been affected by 19 cancer. 20 We're not doing a good job of helping our 21 citizens. It just seems to me that we're focusing so 22 much on economic development and that dang Green Pond 23 Landing that we're not doing -- you all are not doing -- the job that you were entrusted to do. 24 25 One of the biggest things that the government is 26 supposed to do is look after the safety and health of 27 its citizenry. And these people are really suffering. 28 Now, it was a good meeting in the fact that Mr. 29 Graham -- I'm glad to see that District 3 was there 30 representing and Cindy wasn't by herself as she's done 31 so many times in the past. And it looked to me like 32 y'all were trying to really get some input from the 33 citizens. But I just hope this is not going to be 34 another case of whoop-de-doo. And then it just dies 35 This time I intend myself to intervene if that's out. 36 what I see is going on. 37 LEON HARMON: No one else is signed up, Mr. Chairman. 38 39 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Harmon. 40 No item on 5 or 6. 41 Item number 7(a) Ordinance 2018-002 a Supplemental 42 Ordinance to amend Ordinance 2017-016 will be taken up 43 during the Finance Committee's report. 44 Item number 7(b) 2018-003 an Ordinance authorizing 45 a fee-in-lieu-of Tax Arrangement on behalf of Project Spindle (the "Company") pursuant to a fee-in-lieu-of-46 47 tax agreement between Anderson County, South Carolina 48 (the "county") and the company; authorizing a 5-year 49 extension of the investment period for all investments 50 over the statutory minimum investment; authorizing the

execution and delivery of an Infrastructure Financing 1 2 Agreement (IFA) granting certain infrastructure 3 credits to the company. Mr. Nelson, you like to ---4 Yes, sir. If Council --BURRISS NELSON: 5 Mr. Chairman, members of Council. Project Spindle is 6 a ten million dollar investment of an existing 7 industry. They're a -- over a -- more than a fifty 8 year old European based company, corporation that 9 manufactures technical fabrics for a variety of 10 industrial uses. They'll also be creating seventy-one 11 new jobs with the expansion with an average pay of 12 sixteen dollars and fourteen cents per hour, an 13 approximate annual payroll of two million two hundred and seventy-two thousand. This will include a fee-in-14 15 lieu agreement for thirty years with first year taxes 16 -- current taxes paid on the expansion property are a 17 little under a thousand dollars. The -- when the 18 taxes are paid in 2020 for the first time, when the 19 project is in full operation, first year's tax is nine 20 thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight dollars. And over a thirty year period, two hundred and thirty 21 22 thousand dollars in property tax for the first year. 23 Community impact of five million, and a twenty years 24 community impact of sixty-seven million. 25 This comes to Council as a recommendation from 26 staff and from the Economic Advisory Board. We 27 respectfully request you give favorable consideration 28 to this project. 29 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Nelson. We 30 have a motion to move this forward? 31 KEN WATERS: So moved. 32 CINDY WILSON: So moved. 33 TOMMY DUNN: Motion Mr. Waters and 34 second Ms. Wilson. Now any discussion, any questions, 35 anything for Mr. Nelson? Comments. All in favor of 36 the motion show of hands. All opposed like sign. 37 Show the motion carries unanimously. Appreciate it, 38 Mr. Nelson, y'all keep up the good work. 39 BURRISS NELSON: Yes, sir. Thank you. 40 Appreciate your support. 41 Item number 9, Report from TOMMY DUNN: the Civic Center Adhoc Committee meeting held January 42 43 23rd. Don't believe there will be no need for 44 Executive Session. Chairman Waters. 45 KEN WATERS: At this time we are working 46 on a contract to have someone manage the Civic Center 47 and the Anderson County Sports Center out there. So 48 we don't have the contract, yet, but that's the goal 49 of what we're trying to put together. 50 TOMMY DUNN: Once the contract's given

it will be brought back to the Ad Hoc committee for 1 2 review and then to the full Council. 3 KEN WATERS: That's correct. So if 4 there's any suggestions, please, Mr. Burns and he'll 5 ___ 6 TOMMY DUNN: Ms. Floyd? Ms. Floyd's got 7 a question. 8 GRACIE FLOYD: The only thing we're doing 9 in this case is just looking at contracts. We haven't 10 really hired anybody -- we haven't even started a 11 search for this program, yet. Have we? 12 RUSTY BURNS: Ms. Floyd, the county put 13 out a Request for Proposal nationwide, looking for 14 people who would be interested in managing the Civic 15 Center. We received one response and we are in 16 negotiations with those people right now. As Mr. 17 Waters pointed out, the Ad Hoc committee met with 18 them. We have taken the input from the Ad Hoc 19 committee. Mr. Harmon is putting a contract together. 20 The contract will go back to the Ad Hoc committee and 21 then go to full Council. 22 GRACIE FLOYD: Okay. Mr. Chair. 23 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. 24 GRACIE FLOYD: While we're on this subject 25 I have something I want to ask. Last year, 2017, I 26 was assigned to that group, but because of my illness 27 I was unable to participate. And you've already said 28 that the last year's committee would go forward again 29 this year in 2017. So from here on out, I would like 30 to take my place on the Civic Center Committee, 31 please. I would like to be informed on any type meetings or whatever that's going on. Thank you. TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. Anything else, 32 33 34 Mr. Waters? 35 That's all. KEN WATERS: 36 TOMMY DUNN: Anybody else have anything? 37 Ouestions or comments. 38 Be moving on to Item number 10 now, Report from 39 Ms. Wilson on the Cheddar Community meeting held 40 January the 30th. Ms. Wilson. 41 CINDY WILSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 42 We held a meeting over at the Cheddar Fire Department 43 on the 30th of January. We had a large group of 44 residents and landowners there. And our county was 45 represented by County attorney Mr. Harmon, and Solid 46 Waste Director Mr. Greg Smith, and Districts 3 and 7. 47 We focused in that meeting on the facility issues, 48 negotiation process as it related to the original 49 landfill disposal contract and the sale of the 50 landfill. And that was where the community met with

1 the company and came up with basically some rules for 2 the roads so to speak. 3 Among those rules, the main issues negotiated were 4 hours of operation of the landfill, the truck routes 5 of the trucks using the landfill, cleanliness of 6 trucks leaving the landfill, cleanup of the litter 7 blown offsite, the establishment of an advisory 8 committee, implementation of recycling efforts, 9 protection of property, the final elevation of the 10 lateral expansion, and the aesthetics of the landfill. And the parties agreed that the main routes for 11 12 trucks coming and going to the landfill were from I-85 13 to Highway 8 to Midway Road to Cherokee Road to Beaver Dam Road to Highway 20 to Big Creek Road. Or from 14 Anderson Highway 29 North to Broadway School Road, to 15 16 Highway 20 to Big Creek Road. From Highway 25, 17 Highway 247 to Murphy Road to Big Creek Road. 18 The company was supposed to have place a toll free 19 number decal on its trucks where persons could lodge 20 complaints when they recognized adverse condition or 21 behavior. The company was supposed to place fencing 22 necessary around the landfill to control litter 23 leaving the site. The company was supposed to have 24 cleaned up litter along the public roads. The county was supposed to educate the general public about 25 26 disposal of trash in general and recycling efforts in 27 particular. The company was supposed to file with the 28 appropriate federal agencies for permit or permits to 29 control the buzzard population which had taken up at 30 the landfill and to implement control actions as 31 approved. The company was supposed to in general 32 promote beautification efforts to minimize the adverse 33 effects of the landfill. And they were supposed to 34 set up an advisory committee with the community. And 35 also, they were supposed to prevent leakage from its 36 trucks going on to public or private property. Many 37 of these conditions that were put into place have not 38 been met. And that has been a very difficult 39 situation for the community. 40 We came back with basically a punch list of those 41 items that needed to be resolved and needed to be 42 incorporated in the contract going forward with the 43 landfill. Mr. Greg Smith made a wonderful list and 44 I'll read off this to you. The Anderson Regional 45 Landfill runs 24 hours a day and that's in violation 46 of existing agreement. The community said the host

47 fee should go to the Cheddar community and Belton for 48 the fire department and other community needs. The 49 foundation of the Big Creek Road was not correctly 50 installed due to mud and soft ground during

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1 construction. And the residents want the Big Creek 2 Road to be repaved. 3 Now those items are under review with SCDOT as we 4 speak. The residents requested no trucks on Murphy 5 Road. An update on that, we've had three or four 6 tanker overturns on that road with spills in the last 7 18 months. So that is also under review. The Rector 8 Road area had water coming onto private property 9 issues that they wanted to have reviewed. Our county 10 DOT is reviewing that. The intersection of Cannon 11 Bottom Road and Big Creek Road and Mahaffey Road, 12 there's a dangerous sight distance issue there. SCDOT 13 and the county DOT are reviewing those issues as we 14 speak. 15 The trucks are coming non-stop into the landfill The smell of the landfill is 16 in the community. 17 dreadful. There are Massachusetts tags on trucks and 18 many speeding vehicles. Mr. Smith has had the 19 transport police contacted, so hopefully the weights 20 and the speeds will be resolved there. We need the 21 Sheriff's Department to place a deputy on Big Creek 22 Road from 7:00 AM to 8:00 AM, 3:00 PM to 4:00 PM and 23 5:00 PM to 6:00 PM due to excessive speeding. It is 24 very dangerous. School students and workers from the 25 steam plant were the main ones it identified. 26 Since then Duke Power has notified us that the 27 work at the Lee Steam Plant will be complete some time 28 next week and they also contacted the highway patrol 29 to police the area and catch the speeders. Trucks 30 leaving on Rector Road and onto Big Creek Road are 31 running the stop sign and they were wanting some 32 measures put in place to stop that problem. 33 Trucks coming in after hours of operation at the 34 landfill in violation of the agreement. Neighbors are 35 awakened by loud clanging of trucks dumping all night 36 long. Large amount of truck traffic. They want a list of disciplinary actions for trucks and companies 37 38 and have some consequences employed there. Thev 39 wanted the tire wash to be made to work. Apparently it has very rarely worked over there. Surge coming 40 41 off of the tires when leaving the landfill has been 42 known to bust windshields and all kinds of trouble 43 there. The fuel trucks coming on to Crawford Road, 44 again, those are a serious consideration. And the 45 buzzards and the sea gulls. And they want weights of 46 the trucks at the landfill verified. Transport police 47 are on that. They want the taxes cut on property 48 around the landfill and reassess the property due to 49 the landfill, fuel tanks and steam plant. Mr. Graham

will be addressing that shortly and he's working on

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1 that right now. 2 There's a home -- there's at least two home owners 3 along Big Creek Road that have stated that their 4 foundation is compromised because of the heavy truck 5 traffic and hitting the potholes. We're hoping to 6 have that resolved with the road straightened out. 7 There was also the need of some type of a muffler on 8 the generators or walls around the generators dealing 9 with the methane gas to muffle the loudness. Mr. 10 Smith is addressing that with the landfill company 11 right now. They were also requesting that the 12 landfill and Kinder Morgan contribute money to the 13 fire department as those are volunteer firefighters 14 and they are trained to deal mostly with residential 15 fires, but with the fuel tank farm, the landfill, the 16 sewers, the pipelines, the ethanol facility, the 17 railroad, that is truly a terrorist dream and it's a 18 very dangerous situation. So we need to have our fire 19 departments over there properly trained and equipped. 20 They also requested that water taps be placed for 21 residences along Compton Road and some of the other 22 areas due to suspected well contamination. It should 23 be noted that years ago there were serious well issues 24 over there and water lines were run to help those 25 residents over there. Also they wanted the litter 26 needs to be picked up every day on Big Creek Road. 27 Mr. Smith is working with the company on that. A lot 28 of litter -- not just people throwing out, but from 29 the trucks, even with tarps, it's blowing out. They 30 want environmental enforcement on Big Creek Road and 31 Broadway School Road more often. They were there all 32 of this past week. They want the landfill to cover 33 the trash with dirt every day and not to use the tarp 34 There were also issues with the stench from a system. 35 product that's being brought into the landfill and 36 DHEC and the company are being worked with to mitigate 37 that problem. They want the host fees to pay for 38 another officer over there and they want speed limit 39 signs and kids at play signs to put in the area. And 40 also quard rails on the road at the creek on Big Creek 41 Road. 42 The community is developing a committee to better 43 communicate and coordinate these and other efforts, along with the facebook site, to make reports and 44 45 photos of suspected violations more available. 46 And now, if I might have Mr. Graham to provide us an update on his efforts. And he has been so 47 48 wonderful to have over there. Everybody was so 49 grateful to have more people. Thank you. 50 RAY GRAHAM: Thank you, Ms. Wilson.

1 Just ---2 TOMMY DUNN: Excuse me, Mr. Graham. Ιf 3 you can, Mr. Harmon has instructed we're out of time. 4 Can we ask for five more minutes of this to get this 5 through with? Can we get it completed? 6 KEN WATERS: Make a motion. 7 TOMMY DUNN: Ms. Wilson makes a motion, 8 second Mr. Waters. All in favor of the motion to 9 extent time five minutes show of hands. Show the 10 motion carries unanimously. 11 All right. Go ahead, Mr. Graham. 12 RAY GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 13 I'll definitely make this short. The biggest thing, 14 as fellow Council members see, this is a huge list. Realistically speaking, though, if we go down the 15 16 list, there's a lot of items that we as a county can 17 control. Ms. Wilson and myself, we have already 18 contacted different divisions within the county to 19 start working on some of these items. Some of them's 20 just -- honestly it's just some real quick fixes. 21 A couple of things in the meeting, one thing they 22 brought up was they wanted their county taxes done 23 away with. Well, we know as a county, we cannot do 24 that. But in the same respect, I heard their plea and 25 Ms. Wilson did, as well. We've contacted the assessor's office and what they're doing is ensuring 26 27 that the property values that are placed on the 28 residents in that community has bearing of the fact 29 that they're right beside a landfill. They're basically looking at the landfill's taxes, they're 30 31 looking at the vacant lots, the farm land, and those 32 taxes. They're also looking at the residents where homes are actually -- add on to tracts of land 33 34 ensuring that they are getting the correct tax base 35 that they should be getting. 36 A lot of the other things, we do have a transport 37 police scheduled to be coming out there. Captain 38 Barn, if you would, I been communicating with Chief 39 Mitchell on that and also with the code enforcement officer to kind of be in that area, you know, an hour 40 41 or two a day or something. If you could pass that on, 42 just to make sure at least for a few weeks or whatever 43 until we can kind of get a handle to see where our 44 needs are, maybe see if the code enforcement deputy 45 can maybe just patrol that periodically. We would 46 definitely appreciate that. 47 But the biggest thing is that they have -- this 48 community has spoken and spoken loudly year after year 49 after year. My mindset is that landfill wasn't built 50 and wasn't put there this year. That's something

that's been ongoing. But in the same respect if 1 2 something that as a county that we can correct, you 3 know, through our personnel or through something as 4 simple as putting some sign up, putting a speed bump 5 on our property; the county actually owns thirty acres 6 coming out of the landfill. One of the concerns, the 7 trucks don't stop coming on to Rector Road. That's 8 our property. Put a speed bump. I mean a big truck's 9 going to stop then, because that's going to cause some 10 jarring if it doesn't. I mean, that's a simple fix, stuff like that. And to me, I mean, it's just a 11 matter of us kind of being diligent as far as going 12 through this list and seeing what we can correct. 13 14 We're not going to remove the landfill, but we can 15 make it a better community for some of these items 16 that they brought to the concern. 17 Ms. Wilson, thank you for allowing me to attend 18 that meeting with you. And I'll definitely look 19 forward to trying to get some of this situated. 20 CINDY WILSON: Bottom line, this trash 21 business is not out of sight for that community. Ιt 22 may be out of mind for a lot of us living elsewhere, 23 but it does have a cost monetarily and 24 environmentally, and I really appreciate everybody on 25 Council trying to work together to make things a 26 little better for those folks. Thank you. 27 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Ms. Wilson. 28 Moving on to Report from The Public Safety Health 29 and Human Services Committee. Mr. Graham. Chairman 30 Graham. It's the report from the February 1st 31 meeting. 32 RAY GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 33 This is basically just to update as far as some of 34 the items that we've discussed at Public Safety. One 35 of them, the Sheriff's Department, everybody should 36 have it in their agenda package, just an update on the 37 National Institute of Corrections Study. We are 38 moving forward with that. It's been kind of a slow 39 start as far on that, but hopefully that's starting to pick up and we're going to get some actions in place 40 41 with that as that committee moves forward. 42 As far as Pelzer Rescue Squad, they brought forth 43 a proposal to EMS Director Steve Kelly and myself 44 about possibly placing an ambulance in place at Three 45 and Twenty where we have been housing a QRV for the same price that it would cost us to operate the QRV. 46 47 And looking at this proposal with Mr. Kelly and Ms. 48 Rita, we basically determined that it's kind of a no-49 brainer. I mean we're getting a bigger bang for the 50 buck with the ambulance that's capable of offering

full service for that twelve hour period for the same 1 2 cost that we'd be offering a QRV. We brought forth 3 this in the form of a motion at Public Safety. It was 4 passed a hundred percent. 5 At this time, Mr. Chairman, I'd like to bring that 6 forth from Public Safety that we approve allowing 7 Pelzer Rescue Squad to have that contract for the 8 remainder of this budget year for basically the same 9 cost that we're operating the QRV. 10 TOMMY DUNN: We have a motion coming 11 from the Public Safety committee doesn't need a 12 second. Are there any discussion? Yes, ma'am. 13 GRACIE FLOYD: Would you please repeat the 14 motion? 15 RAY GRAHAM: The motion would be --16 we're currently paying for a QRV through county funds, through the EMS budget. Pelzer Rescue Squad has 17 18 brought forth a proposal that they would place an 19 ambulance in -- and that's actually located at Three 20 and Twenty Fire Department -- and basically that we 21 place an ambulance in that place of the QRV. The 22 county would be saving the money of the operations of 23 the QRV and giving that money to Pelzer Rescue Squad 24 for a full time ambulance for the twelve hours a 25 shift. 26 TOMMY DUNN: And that will be at ---27 RAY GRAHAM: Three and Twenty. 28 TOMMY DUNN: Three and Twenty sub 29 station in Slabtown. 30 RAY GRAHAM: Yes. The call volume in 31 that area has drastically increased due to the growth 32 in that community and we -- the Public Safety brings 33 that in the form of a motion due to hopefully bringing 34 them back in compliance. 35 TOMMY DUNN: This area has been long needed and when Mr. Kelly took that job, he done a study and seen it could be justified, which we already 36 37 38 pretty much knew that. And it's no thing. Bottom 39 line is, no doubt ambulance is better, in my opinion, best thing for it. But a QRV is better than nothing. 40 41 So we've got a chance to get an ambulance here for the 42 short -- for the remainder of the contract things is a 43 pretty good no-brainer. Anybody else have anything? 44 GRACIE FLOYD: Can we ask questions? 45 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. 46 GRACIE FLOYD: Where is this -- I can't 47 get a -- what area is this? 48 TOMMY DUNN: If you go up -- be District 49 4 and District 6 area. It's -- you go up Liberty 50 Highway and turn right on Highway 88. It's out that

way in the Slabtown community. You remember, Ms. 1 2 Floyd, the -- several years ago they put the -- can't 3 think of the name of the road, Mr. Waters would know, 4 but they put the landfill up there. We had that big 5 discussion about the landfill. It's Hamlin Road. 6 It's in that area before you get in there. Be backing 7 up Pendleton. 8 GRACIE FLOYD: How many QRVs do we have? I 9 thought we only had one over in Pendleton. 10 TOMMY DUNN: No, ma'am. 11 GRACIE FLOYD: Excuse me, Ebenezer. 12 TOMMY DUNN: We had one in Ebenezer and 13 we had one in Williford. And they been -- they 14 switched -- they have since been switched out to ambulances. 15 The only QRV we have now active is the 16 one in Slabtown. 17 GRACIE FLOYD: Ebenezer doesn't have one 18 any more? 19 TOMMY DUNN: No, ma'am. They got an 20 ambulance down there. 21 Ms. Floyd, we actually --RAY GRAHAM: 22 if I may ---23 GRACIE FLOYD: I understand the question, 24 I understand. Thank you. 25 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. Anybody else 26 have anything? Go ahead, Mr. Waters. 27 KEN WATERS: This is a good thing. I'm 28 very surprised. This kind of -- it's kind of like a 29 Christmas present. You know, this is something that's 30 moving forward. That area is very busy. They have 31 quite a number of calls. And I'm excited about this 32 because the West Pelzer actually put forth an effort 33 to do something and that's what we look for from these 34 EMS. 35 TOMMY DUNN: Well, this is what it's all 36 about, in my opinion what EMS -- our local thing, but 37 it's community driven. 38 KEN WATERS: Yeah. 39 TOMMY DUNN: This is that. But not only 40 is that area growing in call volume, but it puts 41 another ambulance on the street for when Mr. Kelly and 42 the county gets the system working like it's supposed 43 to, to move around and rotate to back one up when 44 one's on call and everything. 45 KEN WATERS: That's right. 46 TOMMY DUNN: I think it's an excellent 47 thing. 48 KEN WATERS: I'm very excited about 49 I wasn't expecting it and I really appreciate this. 50 West Pelzer for putting forth that effort. Thank you,

1 sir. 2 TOMMY DUNN: Pelzer. 3 KEN WATERS: I'm sorry. Pelzer. 4 TOMMY DUNN: Talking about West Pelzer 5 Fire Department. Yeah. That could be fighting words 6 in some places. 7 KEN WATERS: I don't think nobody was 8 here to hear that. 9 TOMMY DUNN: All in favor of the motion 10 show of hands. All opposed like sign. Show the motion carries unanimously. 11 12 Anything else, Mr. Chairman? 13 RAY GRAHAM: No, Mr. Chairman, that's 14 it. 15 TOMMY DUNN: Moving on Item number 12, 16 Report from the Planning and Public Works Committee 17 meeting held on February the 1st. Ms. Wilson. 18 Chairman Wilson. Ms. Wilson. 19 CINDY WILSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 20 The first item for our committee's consideration was 21 the pavement management presentation by Mr. Steve 22 Lander, PE of the Kercher Group from Raleigh, North 23 Carolina, who was introduced by Mr. Holt Hopkins. Ιt 24 is the desire of our Roads and Bridges Department to 25 have a more scientific evaluation and analysis of the 26 county's road system to better plan and prioritize 27 road care for our county. It is believed that the 28 methods used by this group would create a more sustainable county road map with analytics using up-29 30 to-date data providing goals, policies, intelligent 31 decisions based on a business process review, project 32 selection, performance measures all resulting in a 33 more cost effective management. This company would 34 provide the software and software training and 35 consulting engineering to the county. The cost for 36 this service in the first year would be approximately 37 half a million dollars and would not include the 38 municipalities. We expressed that the municipalities 39 should be invited to participate if the county chooses 40 to engage this group. Mr. Hopkins stated that the 41 Roads and Bridges Department has the funds to pay for 42 the service as many personnel vacancies remain 43 unfilled in his department. Our committee voted in 44 support of the proposal as presented but pending a 45 review of the written proposal. At the start of our Finance Committee meeting yesterday we were advised 46 47 that an expense of this magnitude would require to be 48 bid out. And since that time each of us has at our 49 seat the written proposal and we are expecting a 50 little more information. I don't know how y'all want

1 to handle that. I do think it would be appropriate 2 for us to read it and maybe vote the next time. 3 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. I think we 4 need some time to study this. 5 CINDY WILSON: All right. And then -- we 6 then voted to go into Executive Session to receive 7 legal advice and updated discussion with respect to 8 the county's solid waste disposal contract. Much of 9 the concerns expressed in the original FIN agreement 10 would be expected to be incorporated in a new contract with the landfill. Mr. Harmon, Mr. Smith, and others 11 12 are working on the contract and related issues. We 13 anticipate that the community and our county tax 14 payers will be encouraged by the progress on this 15 important matter. 16 And I want to thank everyone again, for working so 17 hard on this issue. And thank you, Mr. Graham, it's been so nice to have, you know, other Council members 18 19 present, too. Do any of our committee members have 20 anything else to add at this time? And that is our 21 report from the Planning and Public Works Committee. 22 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you for all y'all's 23 If there's no objections, can we take about a work. 24 five minute break? 25 (BREAK 7:10 PM to 7:15 PM) 26 TOMMY DUNN: Call the meeting back into 27 And at this time we'll move on to Item number order. 28 13, Report from the Finance Committee meeting held February the 5th. At this time, Chairman Waters. 29 30 Mr. Waters. Ms. Davis want to step up? 31 KEN WATERS: Does she want to step up? 32 The majority all except for one item was passed by the Finance Committee unanimously except one thing. 33 34 Everything passed but we have one item that it'll be 35 on the latter part of it so we'll explain that. Ms. 36 Davis, you want to hit it? 37 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. The first item, 38 we're requesting permission to purchase ten 2018 Dodge 39 Chargers for the Sheriff's office. That's off a state contract, Performance Automotive, three hundred and 40 six thousand three hundred. And that is coming out of 41 42 the one point nine that was originally budgeted for 43 the Sheriff's office. 44 TOMMY DUNN: Coming from the Finance 45 Committee doesn't need a second. Are any discussion 46 or questions? Hearing and seeing none, all in favor 47 of the motion show of hands. All opposed like sign. 48 Show the motion carries unanimously. 49 Moving on to Item (b). 50 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. Requesting

permission to purchase 26 tablet Computers for the 1 2 Sheriff's department patrol cars. It's coming from 3 Control PC. It's a sole source purchase because they're the only manufacturer of these ultra rugged 4 5 advanced mobile data terminals. They only sell to 6 First Responders. This, too, will be coming out of 7 the one point nine that was set aside for Sheriff's 8 vehicles and upfit. 9 Any question? Coming from TOMMY DUNN: 10 Finance Committee, again, doesn't need a second. Any 11 comments or questions? All in favor of the motion 12 show of hands. All opposed like sign. Show the 13 motion carries unanimously. 14 Moving on to Item number (c). 15 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. We're asking 16 permission to buy an aligner machine with a cabinet 17 for the fleet services. It's coming out of our left 18 over lease money, twenty-nine thousand one thirteen ninety-two. And it, too, is sole source from Mohawk 19 20 Resources LTP. 21 TOMMY DUNN: This is a replacement item 22 coming out of their thing. I think the one they got 23 is over twenty-five years old and having a hard time 24 getting parts for it. This is coming from Finance 25 Committee meeting. It doesn't need a second. Are 26 there any questions or comments? All in favor of the 27 motion show of hands. All opposed like sign. Show 28 the motion carries unanimously. 29 Moving on to Item number (d), 3(d), Ms. Davis. 30 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. We're asking to 31 purchase three Juniper Switches. This is so that they 32 can be CJIS compliant. It closes the loop between the 33 EOC towers 3 and dispatch so that the transfer of data 34 between those three locations is secure. It will be 35 paid for from a combination of LEMPG grant funds and 36 E911 tariff funds. 37 TOMMY DUNN: Coming from Finance 38 Committee doesn't need a second. Just like to -- Mr. 39 Graham I think has a comment. 40 RAY GRAHAM: Sorry, had to get my 41 microphone on. Yes, Mr. Chairman. We -- Mr. Pressly, 42 just for your input earlier, I personally thank you 43 for that. But we are going to look into that and see what does this entail. My recommendation is we move 44 45 forward with it tonight, but I mean we're definitely 46 going to shop and see if we can get this switch 47 cheaper. 48 TOMMY DUNN: All what the reason is, why 49 it's this way. 50 RAY GRAHAM: I honestly -- I know it's

got several items out beside this and I'm not sure if 1 2 what you're looking at has got those same items. But 3 I mean, we'll definitely compare apples to apples, if 4 we can get it cheaper. Again, we appreciate that 5 input. 6 TOMMY DUNN: And not to throw nobody 7 under the bus, but this comes out of the Sheriff's 8 Department. People, radio people and all, IT people 9 were looking at doing this and we're going to, like 10 Mr. Graham said, make sure it's apples to apples. 11 Make sure there's no installation involved or what 12 not. Make sure it's the best. Ms. Wilson. 13 CINDY WILSON: Thank you. I was going to 14 ask if we could check into it further. And we do have 15 some great citizens. 16 TOMMY DUNN: Well, the fact is, Mr. 17 Graham has already started during this meeting 18 checking into it. 19 TOM ALLEN: Mr. Chair. 20 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Allen and then Ms. 21 Floyd. 22 TOM ALLEN: Yes, thank you. I'm glad 23 you brought that up because I was going to do it, too. 24 And I know a place I worked before, we were buying 25 computers on a five year contract. We're paying three 26 thousand dollars for them. And on that fifth year 27 they were selling for a thousand out in the open 28 market. But we had to go with the state contract. So 29 we definitely need to look at this. And we may end up 30 with this, but maybe, I think we can do better. 31 TOMMY DUNN: Well, the thing is, make 32 sure it's apples to apples. Ain't a reason for this. 33 That's the thing what is. Ms. Floyd. 34 GRACIE FLOYD: I, too, was very interested 35 in what Mr. Pressly had to say. It seems as if, 36 though, however, that somebody, now what's that word due diligent, would have looked at that before and 37 38 have known that. And I don't like the idea of well, 39 let's just go ahead and buy the five dollar one and 40 we'll look at the one dollar one later. Could this be 41 put aside till the next meeting, maybe? 42 TOMMY DUNN: Well, I think we can do it 43 now with the caveat that they going to look and see if 44 it can be bought cheaper; it will be bought. We need 45 to make sure first of all, in my opinion, that it's 46 apples with apples. Make sure this ain't no thing or 47 whatnot. But we are not going to pay that if it can 48 be bought cheaper. Is that to everybody's ---49 GRACIE FLOYD: I don't understand. What 50 you're saying is that we're going to just approve it,

1 but we're not going to buy it until we actually look 2 at the other cost of it? 3 TOMMY DUNN: That's right. That's 4 right. 5 GRACIE FLOYD: Okay. All right. So what 6 we're doing tonight is just going ahead and clearing 7 the way to buy something? We're not going to go ahead 8 and buy that most expensive one right now. 9 TOMMY DUNN: I'll make a motion here in 10 a moment. I'll make an amendment to this to clarify. GRACIE FLOYD: 11 Thank you. Okay. 12 TOMMY DUNN: Any more discussion? I'll 13 make an amendment to the motion that the Sheriff's 14 Department checks and makes sure, compares apples with 15 apples, make sure it's comparing and if they can get 16 this cheaper, let's buy it cheaper. Let's make sure 17 it's the same thing what they want to and it's got all 18 the things. And if it does get the one less 19 expensive. But if it's not -- for some reason, it's 20 not what they was wanting or what they specked out, or 21 the installation is not included or whatnot, then they 22 go ahead with this. We're approving this money but it 23 could be lower. That's my motion. I hope I cleared 24 things up. 25 RAY GRAHAM: Second that. 26 Second Mr. Graham. Now, TOMMY DUNN: 27 any discussion on that? We have to vote on the 28 amendment. Show of hands. Amendment is unanimous. 29 Now we vote on the main motion. All in favor. Vote 30 is unanimous. 31 Now going on to Item number (e), a backup 32 solution. Ms. Davis. 33 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. If you don't 34 mind, we're going to table this. Mr. Carroll needs to 35 bid this out, we have found out. So we're going to 36 skip over that at this time. 37 TOMMY DUNN: Item number (e) will be 38 pulled to a later date with more things. 39 RITA DAVIS: That's correct. 40 TOMMY DUNN: Okay. Moving on to the 41 next item, Ms. Davis. 42 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. You have before 43 you the State Homeland Security Program. There's two 44 grants, one from your SWAT team, one from the Haz-Mat 45 It was approved unanimously by the Finance team. Committee. You'll see that there's capital involved. 46 47 There are chemical protective ensembles, air purifying 48 respirators, and breathing apparatuses. Also, that's 49 on the SWAT side. On the Haz-Mat side, they have 50 wireless remote detectors for the gases and chemicals

1 that may be -- they may encounter. And also a host 2 computer and wireless modem that supports that 3 equipment. There is no match. It also includes five 4 thousand for exercise support. And these items -- all 5 these items are on the Homeland Security list that we 6 have to have and it's fully paid for by grant funding. 7 In other words, the state was recommending that we buy 8 these items. 9 Coming from the Finance TOMMY DUNN: 10 Committee again doesn't need a second. Are there any 11 questions or comments, discussion? Hearing none, all 12 in favor of the motion show of hands. All opposed 13 like sign. Show the motion carries unanimously. 14 Moving on to Item number 5, radio fees. 15 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. This is -- we're 16 requesting permission to turn on up to thirty-five 17 This would allow for us to pay the forty-one radios. dollar monthly fee. That is, if it's necessary. Mr. 18 Mark Williamson, the CFO at the Sheriff's office, is 19 20 working closely with Mr. Hawkins. They're doing a 21 complete physical inventory of all of our mobile radios throughout the county. They're hoping to have 22 23 that done no later than April 1st. I think the 24 Finance Committee tasked them to expedite that; let's 25 get this done. We feel like some of those are going 26 to be turned off. Therefore, we may or may not need 27 any of these turned on. So we know we've got the ten 28 cars that you just approved. Ten of these radios will be in these new cars. But you're turning one off and 29 30 the other one on. So this is just seeking permission 31 so we don't have any down time, especially in those 32 ten vehicles that we're purchasing because we're getting to the critical stage for our deputies to 33 34 having vehicles. So this is just a communication, so 35 it'll be ready to go once the vehicles are on site. 36 It will be paid for by the E911 tariff funds. 37 TOMMY DUNN: Any discussion or 38 questions? Coming from Finance Committee, again, 39 doesn't need a second. All in favor of the motion 40 show of hands. All opposed like sign. Show the motion carries unanimously. 41 42 Before we move on, get into some of the 43 supplemental budget, we got some special people here tonight. Guest people that represent us on the 44 45 airport commission. I'd like to recognize them. 46 Chairman, I believe Mr. Don Acevedo, Dr. Tomlinson and Ms. Watkins. We appreciate having y'all here tonight. 47 48 Welcome y'all and thank you for coming. Thank y'all 49 for what y'all do at the -- service to the county by 50 being our airport advisory board. Ms. Davis.

RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. Ordinance 2018-1 2 002. 3 TOMMY DUNN: Let me, if we can, as we go 4 through these, if I'm not mistaken, y'all correct me 5 if I'm wrong. I wasn't at the Finance Committee 6 meeting. But I believe the Finance Committee voted to 7 pull this up, Items 1 through 7, take two out and vote 8 on it separate, is that not -- I'm asking. Is that 9 not correct? 10 KEN WATERS: Correct. 11 TOMMY DUNN: So, Ms. Davis, what I'm 12 saying is, when you go through this, go through 1, 3, 13 4, 5, 6, and 7. That'll be voted on and we'll come 14 back to 2. 15 GRACIE FLOYD: Mr. Chairman, you've lost 16 I don't know what you're talking about. This is me. 17 the only thing that I've gotten. What are we -- is 18 there something else we're supposed to have? 19 TOMMY DUNN: The supplemental budget 20 should be in your book. 21 GRACIE FLOYD: Well, this is what I've 22 got. 23 TOMMY DUNN: That's it. That's it. 24 GRACIE FLOYD: Okay. But what are you 25 talking about 1 through 7? 26 TOMMY DUNN: This is the things they're 27 going to have, the list -- the list right here what 28 I just got them numbered. And the airport you qo. 29 terminal -- this was the recommendation from the Finance Committee to pull this out and vote on it 30 31 separate versus those things in that thing. GRACIE FLOYD: 32 Okay. Now I went through 33 this last -- yesterday some time. But does everyone 34 have what you have there? 35 TOMMY DUNN: I doubt it. It's just 36 I made it. But you're welcome to it. mine. 37 GRACIE FLOYD: Well, no. 38 TOMMY DUNN: You got another one of 39 these, Miss Lacey? 40 GRACIE FLOYD: It'd be nice if we all had 41 one. 42 KEN WATERS: She can have mine. I've 43 qot one I left in the car. You can have -- if you 44 don't mind my doodling on it. 45 I call it my cheat sheet to TOMMY DUNN: 46 help me keep up with notes about what -- making 47 things. That's all it is. Y'all got the same thing, 48 I just got some -- I'm sorry -- just got some things 49 to help it up. 50 GRACIE FLOYD: Okay. But Mr. Chairman.

1 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. 2 GRACIE FLOYD: Could we start getting 3 everything that you have so we can keep up, too? 4 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. I got no 5 problem with that. 6 GRACIE FLOYD: We're not Chairmans, but 7 gosh, what you have ---8 TOMMY DUNN: This is just something I 9 asked for to help me through and I'll be more than 10 glad if they want to give it to anybody. I asked for this in my thing. I'm a little slow and I have to 11 12 have this to help me keep up. 13 GRACIE FLOYD: Does anybody else have one? 14 KEN WATERS: I got one at the Finance 15 Committee meeting. 16 TOMMY DUNN: She's got the same thing 17 you've got, Ms. Wilson. Only one that got this is me 18 and Mr. Waters. 19 Now, getting back where we at. We're on the same 20 Talking about everything but the airport page. 21 terminal. That's separate. 22 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. 23 TOMMY DUNN: Okay. Go ahead. 24 RITA DAVIS: Okay. I would want to 25 point out that laying at your desk for the four members who aren't members of the Finance Committee, 26 27 we are talking about the one that has the yellow 28 highlight on it that was laying at your desk when you came in today. Not the one that was in your agenda 29 30 packet. Basically the same thing, but there's just a 31 few yellow highlighted items that was explained at the 32 Finance Committee. Thank you. 33 Will you go over ---GRACIE FLOYD: 34 TOMMY DUNN: She's going over it. She's 35 going to explain it. 36 GRACIE FLOYD: Will you explain these 37 things to us who were not at the Finance Committee? 38 TOMMY DUNN: Yeah. That's what she's 39 She's going to go over them. fixing to do. 40 RITA DAVIS: Yes, ma'am. This one that 41 was laying at your table. 42 GRACIE FLOYD: You will explain those? 43 RITA DAVIS: Yes, ma'am. 44 GRACIE FLOYD: Okay. Good. 45 Most definitely. Let me RITA DAVIS: 46 just start by saying that the fiscal year ended June 47 30, 2017 in the general fund. It was a very good 48 year. And so, it finished the year about three point 49 two million to the good. Basically that was because 50 of salaries and associated fringe benefits. Keep in

mind, salaries and fringes are about sixty-five to 1 2 seventy percent of our entire budget. Anyway. But 3 due to vacancies we finished the year really good. So 4 two point seven million of that the Administrator is 5 recommending these items for supplemental budget 6 appropriations that we need. The first item is 7 building demolition. We originally budgeted fifty 8 thousand, asking sixteen thousand be added to it so 9 that Mr. Newton can finish up the neighborhood 10 improvement program. This is costs that is not 11 covered under the grant. 12 The next item is legal. We're asking a hundred 13 and twenty-five thousand be added to that account for 14 a total of two forty-seven two fifty. The next item 15 is ---16 TOMMY DUNN: Wait a minute Ms. Davis. 17 Think Ms. Floyd's got a question. 18 GRACIE FLOYD: Yes, I do. I asked the 19 I know this is a same question yesterday. 20 supplementary ordinance and this is when you go back 21 during half of the year and you put more money into 22 different budget items here. But I'd like to know 23 why, because we sat down and we did the budget. 24 RITA DAVIS: Yes, ma'am. 25 GRACIE FLOYD: And we did -- we had all of 26 our stuff together and we made the budget and now 27 we're coming back. Now when I asked the question 28 yesterday I really forgot what I was told, but could 29 you tell me why it went from a hundred and twenty-two 30 thousand two hundred and fifty dollars to two hundred 31 and forty-seven? Did we sue somebody or did somebody 32 sue us? 33 RITA DAVIS: No, ma'am. No. That was 34 basically me gambling that we were going to not have 35 to spend as much in legal and we did. I started to 36 ask Council to do two fifty, but we were trying to balance the budget and I was hoping that we could get 37 38 by with about a hundred and twenty-five thousand. But 39 unfortunately we need -- and we spend that about every year. But we were just gambling that hopefully we 40 41 wouldn't have to this year. But unfortunately we're 42 going to have to, it looks like. 43 GRACIE FLOYD: So you're saying that 44 nothing really happened to increase those costs that 45 much over the year? 46 RITA DAVIS: No, ma'am. Not really. 47 It's just normal ordinary legal. And I'll know next 48 year not to -- to make sure that we budget about two 49 fifty. 50 GRACIE FLOYD: Was it about two fifty last

1 year? 2 RITA DAVIS: Yes, ma'am. 3 GRACIE FLOYD: Thank you. 4 RITA DAVIS: Yes, ma'am. And the 5 building demolition is because we took that money out 6 of that account first of the year to demolish those 7 mobile homes in Homeland Park area because Steve 8 Newton didn't think he'd need it. Now he realizes he 9 does. And he originally asked for that. 10 The next item is part time salaries. Dr. Sanders 11 says that she needs about ten thousand to get her 12 through June 30. That's because she's not getting 13 inmates and she needs to have the cages clean before 14 she opens up to the public every morning. 15 The next item is medical supplies. She needs 16 about sixty thousand in medical supplies. To her 17 defense, she asked for two hundred and ten thousand at 18 budget time, and again, we were just trying to balance 19 the budget and cut her to the bare bone and this would 20 get her up to about what she asked for. She's doing 21 more surgeries than ever out there. 22 The next item is twenty-five thousand transferring 23 it out to the grant fund; that's a grant match. 24 The next item is transferring out a million 25 dollars to the airport. That's so that the runway rehabilitation -- Council previously voted to make it 26 27 a hundred and fifty feet versus a hundred so that --28 that's what we have currently. We want to pave and 29 rehab that. And in order to do that the FAA wouldn't cover that additional fifty feet so we need this one 30 31 Sir, that's the first six item. million dollars. 32 GRACIE FLOYD: Excuse me. Excuse me. Ι 33 know that most of the money, I think, for the airport 34 was because of a grant. 35 RITA DAVIS: FAA and state money. 36 GRACIE FLOYD: Okay, whatever. But you 37 said that this one million dollars is not a grant and 38 this money's coming from ---39 RITA DAVIS: The general fund. Yes, 40 ma'am. 41 GRACIE FLOYD: And that's to keep the 42 airport runway at a hundred and fifty feet instead of 43 the one hundred that they want to cut it back. 44 RITA DAVIS: Correct. Yes, ma'am. 45 Council has already voted on that bid, voted to do 46 that and this will get the money there so that we can 47 accomplish that in conjunction with the FAA and state 48 aeronautics grant. Yes, ma'am. And so, we're 49 skipping over the next item. And I just wanted to 50 bring your attention, the rest of page 1 is just

governmental accounting in and out. There's nothing 1 2 new down there. What I just described to you, those first six items, money coming out of the general fund. 3 The remainder of page 1 is money going into those 4 5 funds to accomplish the objectives that Council wants 6 to do. That's all the supplemental. 7 TOMMY DUNN: Coming from the Finance 8 Committee meeting it don't need a second. So now 9 we'll have discussion and Ms. Floyd, you got the 10 floor. And then Ms. Wilson. 11 GRACIE FLOYD: Thank you. Tell me about, anyway, about the transfer out capital project that 12 13 went from six hundred and fifty thousand to two 14 million one hundred and twenty-five. Tell me about 15 that one. 16 RITA DAVIS: Well, that's the one we're 17 skipping over right now, ma'am. On page 2, we're not 18 talking about that at the current time. We're just 19 talking about the first six items. You skip over the 20 seventh item and all the rest of page 1 ---GRACIE FLOYD: 21 Got it. 22 RITA DAVIS: --- is what you'll be 23 voting on. 24 GRACIE FLOYD: Got it. Okay. Good. 25 TOMMY DUNN: Ms. Wilson. CINDY WILSON: 26 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Ι 27 was the one who objected to considering that with the 28 entire supplemental budget. I'm withdrawing my 29 objection right now, because I've been assured by 30 several Council members we will have money for funding 31 for paving next year and that was my concern -- that if we didn't have money for paving, that would be 32 quite bad. So my objection has been withdrawn. Thank 33 34 you. 35 TOMMY DUNN: Any more discussion on 36 items -- first items Ms. Davis talked about? All in 37 favor of the motion show of hands. All opposed like 38 sign. Show the motion carries unanimously. 39 Moving on, Ms. Davis, to the airport terminal. 40 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. That would be 41 the seventh item that you see on your sheet under 42 general fund appropriations. Asking Council to 43 approve basically up to one point five million. You see on your sheet it's one million four seventy-five 44 45 three hundred. And that would be matched two million that we have in grant funds coming from the federal 46 47 and the state sources. So you have two million in 48 grant funds, up to about one point five from the 49 general fund for a total -- keep in mind, though, the 50 bids don't come in until March 1st, so we're trying to

get our ducks in a row, if you will, so that we can be 1 2 ready to do the terminal when the bids are received. 3 TOMMY DUNN: And keep in mind, fellow 4 Council members, if we don't get this grant money from 5 the state and federal money like we anticipate we 6 won't be spending this money. Does that make sense? 7 We'll have to come back and look at something else. 8 But again, coming from the Finance Committee 9 doesn't need a second. So open the floor for 10 discussion. Any more discussion or questions for Ms. Davis or Mr. Burns. All in favor of the motion show 11 12 of hands. All opposed like sign. Show the motion 13 carries unanimously. And keep in mind, this is the 14 first reading. We have two more readings on these Thank you, Ms. Davis. Thank you, Mr. 15 things. 16 Chairman. Anything else? 17 KEN WATERS: That's all. 18 RITA DAVIS: Transfers, sir. 19 KEN WATERS: Transfers. 20 TOMMY DUNN: Transfers. There is 21 something else. See, between both of y'all and you're letting me fail. You want to hit that? 22 23 RITA DAVIS: Yes, sir. Three quick 24 transfers. Just eighteen dollars in the museum. 25 Thirty thousand to professional services in the 26 Sheriff's support services department for the housing 27 and the feeding of the horses that were seized 28 awaiting for the court case disposition. And lastly that four point -- four million eight hundred fifty-29 30 four thousand five hundred, that's just taking it from 31 one object code to another. That's all that's doing. 32 That's it, sir. Just three. 33 TOMMY DUNN: Coming from the Finance 34 Committee it doesn't need a second. Open the floor up 35 for discussion. 36 GRACIE FLOYD: Mr. Chair. 37 Ms. Floyd. TOMMY DUNN: 38 GRACIE FLOYD: Thank you. I had several 39 questions about the transfers. 40 Yes, ma'am. TOMMY DUNN: 41 GRACIE FLOYD: Number 1, here's one that 42 we had because something happened to the printers and 43 they need to replace toners and cartridges for 44 imaging. But -- and they transferred money from 45 training to supplies. Ma'am? 46 TOMMY DUNN: That's in the 47 Administrator's report. We can bring that up in just 48 a little bit. That's not in -- these are the only 49 transfers that we have, Ms. Floyd, from the Finance 50 Committee, is those three right there. And that's

just a housekeeping thing about money. This was --1 2 the museum asked for that seventeen dollars and the 3 Sheriff needs this thirty thousand. 4 GRACIE FLOYD: I don't have that. 5 It's on that sheet there TOMMY DUNN: 6 It just ain't broken down. Yes, ma'am. you got. 7 GRACIE FLOYD: Where? See, yours is 8 written out where it says transfers. Mine's not like 9 that. 10 TOMMY DUNN: No, it's not. But it 11 should be -- transfer in general fund. See that's 12 that and that's that. 13 GRACIE FLOYD: Yours is all broken down, 14 mine is just one lump sum. But I will take this for 15 now, but the next time, break mine down, too. Okay. 16 Good. Thank you. 17 TOMMY DUNN: Open the floor back up for 18 discussion. Mr. Harmon, and I'm going to ask this. Ι 19 think I know the answer, but I'm going to ask anyway. 20 This -- is there anything at all the Council can do 21 when these court cases come up and we have to house 22 different animals and we're footed with the bill? Ι 23 mean, you know, somebody -- and I ain't talking about 24 just these horses. I mean we went through this on 25 dogs, cats, puppy mills, like this. And you know, 26 sometimes, the court does -- they're working 27 themselves so hard it might be a year before they get 28 to some of this stuff. 29 LEON HARMON: The court does have 30 backlogs. I'm not sure there's a whole lot we can do 31 about that, but certainly -- and I have done this on some of these cases, I've worked with the clerk to see 32 33 if they can work a little bit faster. 34 TOMMY DUNN: I know you have and the 35 clerk's been real good. Is there anything we can --36 and I know -- anything we can think about maybe trying 37 to get some help from our friends down in Columbia 38 about something another. I mean we ought to be able 39 to get some restitution back for the taxpayers of 40 Anderson County on some of this stuff. I mean if 41 they're found guilty. 42 LEON HARMON: But here again, we're Yes. 43 trying to get restitution from those individuals who 44 weren't taking care of the animals in the first place 45 and a lot of time there's -- I mean we could ---46 TOMMY DUNN: I know what you're trying 47 to say. Might not have nothing. You know how the old saying goes, you can't get blood out of a turnip. I 48 49 told a man that one time and he said, yeah, but I'll 50 get the turnip. So it's just something to think

about. I'm just saying this thing, some of this stuff 1 2 is a little frustrating because we've been through 3 this with these dog cases and dog cases and sometimes 4 it's the same people you're dealing with. We do this 5 on horses and it's expensive. And I want to take care 6 of these animals, don't get me wrong, but I just think 7 if these people were to have to pay up some it might 8 make things a little bit different. 9 LEON HARMON: Well, what we try to do, 10 Mr. Chairman, is actually get control of the animals 11 as quickly as we can ---12 TOMMY DUNN: And we should. 13 LEON HARMON: --- so that we can put them 14 to auction or dispose of the animals in some other way 15 by finding appropriate homes for the animals. I don't 16 mean just to get rid of the animals. 17 TOMMY DUNN: A good home. 18 To get a good home for LEON HARMON: 19 those animals. And so the quicker we can make that 20 happen, of course, the less expense we will have in housing the animals until that occurs. 21 22 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you. 23 CINDY WILSON: Mr. Chairman, may I? 24 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am, Ms. Wilson. 25 CINDY WILSON: One of the issues is that when we seize the animals, and it goes to court and of 26 27 course we have to hold them and expend the money to 28 get them healthy and all, but if we can come up with 29 some kind of dispersal ordinance on particularly the 30 large animals where once they've gone through court 31 they can be turned over to a rescue immediately, then 32 the final outcome for those animals would be far 33 better. 34 For example on the horses, it ended up we had 35 three auctions scheduled for the first batch that came 36 in and every time there was an appeal. There were 37 different people in the community who had lined up 38 people to take those animals that would have given 39 them a good home. Well, you go six, eight months 40 later and those people were no longer available or 41 they had already found something else. 42 The other issue is prior to, I guess about the 43 middle of 2016, we had a good arrangement where the 44 Sheriff's animal control people would call a rescue 45 down in Greenwood County that we helped to fund. And 46 we also -- other organizations funded them. They 47 would go pick up the animals, get them through triage 48 and all. They were successful in getting those 49 animals relinquished and not having to go through 50 court.

But something changed in mid-2016, so now we're 1 2 having to deal with it in this manner. And it's very 3 costly and may not have the final outcome that's best for those animals. We need to look at an ordinance to 4 5 turn them over to appropriate rescues. And I think we 6 can work on that. And I've got a call into Chairman 7 Edda Cammick over in Oconee County. She was telling 8 different groups that they have a different procedure 9 and maybe we can see what they're doing to help 10 mitigate the expense and have better outcomes. 11 LEON HARMON: Yes, ma'am. Ms. Wilson, 12 I'll be glad to look into that. 13 CINDY WILSON: Thank you. 14 TOMMY DUNN: Thank y'all. 15 Anymore discussions on transfers? All in favor of 16 the motion show of hands. 17 GRACIE FLOYD: I'm going to abstain. 18 TOMMY DUNN: All opposed and all 19 abstentions. Show in favor, Mr. Water, Mr. Allen, Mr. 20 Dunn, Mr. Graham, Mr. Wooten, Ms. Wilson; and Ms. 21 Floyd abstains. 22 GRACIE FLOYD: Would you please state the 23 reason why I'm abstaining? Or may I say it? 24 TOMMY DUNN: You can say it. You can 25 speak for ---26 GRACIE FLOYD: I'm going to abstain 27 because I don't have the information where the 28 transfers are coming from. All I have is a total. Τ 29 don't have it listed if it's here, here, here. And I 30 want to see that. Thank you. 31 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Ms. Floyd. 32 Moving on now to appointments. I don't have no 33 list. Does anybody have any appointments? Anything 34 come up? 35 Requests by council members. Mr. Waters. 36 I have -- I'd like KEN WATERS: I do. 37 to appropriate two thousand dollars from the District 38 6 rec fund to Wren Youth, and I bring that in the form 39 of a motion. 40 TOMMY DUNN: Have a motion Mr. Waters, 41 have a second? Second Ms. Wilson. Any discussion? 42 All in favor of the motion show of hands. All opposed 43 like sign. Show the motion carries unanimously. 44 Anything else, Mr. Waters? 45 KEN WATERS: That's all I have. Thank 46 you. 47 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Allen. 48 TOM ALLEN: Yes. From my recreation 49 funds I'd like to do take six hundred dollars out for 50 the ACTC Student Radio situation and from my

1 recreation account. And I put that in the form of a 2 motion. 3 KEN WATERS: Second. 4 TOMMY DUNN: We have a motion from Mr. 5 Second by Ms. Wilson. Allen. 6 TOM ALLEN: It's a Tech school out in 7 Williamston. Yeah, I'm sorry. 8 Any more discussion? All TOMMY DUNN: 9 in favor of the motion show of hands. All opposed 10 like sign. Show the motion carries unanimously. 11 Anything else? 12 TOM ALLEN: That's all I had. 13 Ms. Floyd? TOMMY DUNN: 14 GRACIE FLOYD: Three years ago I 15 appropriated seventy thousand dollars to the city of 16 Anderson for their paving. As of this date, the city 17 has not used those funds yet, and I want to recall it 18 to put it back in District 2's paving account. And I 19 put that in the form of a motion. 20 TOMMY DUNN: Ms. Floyd's got a motion, 21 we have a second? 22 TOM ALLEN: Second. 23 TOMMY DUNN: Second Mr. Allen. Any 24 discussion? All in favor of the motion show of hands. 25 All opposed like sign. Show the motion carries 26 unanimously. Ms. Floyd, anything else? 27 GRACIE FLOYD: No, that's all I have. 28 Thank you. 29 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Graham? I'd like to appropriate 30 RAY GRAHAM: 31 three hundred dollars to the ACTC Student Radio. 32 TOMMY DUNN: We have a motion Mr. 33 We have a second? Second Ms. Wilson. Any Graham. 34 discussion? All in favor of the motion show of hands. 35 All opposed like sign. Show the motion carries 36 unanimously. Anything else, Mr. Graham? 37 RAY GRAHAM: That'll be it. 38 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Wooten? 39 CRAIG WOOTEN: I'll appropriate two 40 hundred fifty dollars to the ACTC Student Radio from 41 District 1 rec account. 42 TOMMY DUNN: Have a second? Second Ms. 43 Any discussion? All in favor of the motion Wilson. 44 show of hands. All opposed like sign. Show the 45 motion carries unanimously. Ms. Wilson? District 7 would like to 46 CINDY WILSON: appropriate two hundred to the ACTC Student Radio 47 48 trip. 49 TOMMY DUNN: Ms. Wilson makes a motion, 50 we have a second?

1 TOM ALLEN: Second. 2 TOMMY DUNN: Second Mr. Allen. Any 3 discussion? All in favor of the motion show of hands. All opposed like sign. Show the motion carries 4 5 unanimously. 6 I'd like to also appropriate two hundred and fifty 7 dollars out of District 5's rec account to the ACTC 8 Student Radio. Put that in the form of a motion. 9 CINDY WILSON: Second. Second Ms. Wilson. Any 10 TOMMY DUNN: discussion? All in favor of the motion show of hands. 11 12 All opposed like sign. Show the motion carries 13 unanimously. 14 Moving on to Item number 16, Administrator's 15 Report. 16 RUSTY BURNS: Mr. Chairman, I have 17 nothing, but I believe Ms. Floyd has a few questions. 18 GRACIE FLOYD: I do. May I ask? 19 TOMMY DUNN: Yes, ma'am. 20 GRACIE FLOYD: I'm concerned about the 21 transfers. Usually I'm not, but have one or two in 22 here that I think that we need to be cognizant of. 23 And that was -- one of the ones is that it says in the 24 reason for the transfer, it says due to the expiration 25 date of the discount coupon, family illnesses and a death in the family there was not an opportunity to 26 27 submit a transfer prior to purchase. I don't like 28 I think that we need to stay away from that. that. In other words, we didn't have time to get this work 29 30 done up because we had a family death and we had illnesses in the family. But every department has 31 32 more than one person. And in each department it 33 shouldn't be where one person stops the show. Or one 34 person is relied upon to do everything. 35 This particular one was purchased before Council 36 had a chance to vote on it. And I don't think that we should allow that to go on like that. If they waited 37 38 too late for the expiration date on the coupons to 39 expire or somebody got sick or a death, there should be somebody else in that office who can carry on while 40 41 that person ... That was one of the ones. 42 And I had another one here. Some time ago we were 43 talking about transfers and we came up with the fact 44 that at the end of the year we talk about how much 45 insurance we have to pay for each employer and how much it costs us and how it goes up every year. 46 But 47 yet at the end of the year during that time people 48 were robbing the employment benefits and health 49 insurance accounts and transferring it to the other 50 place. And at that time we said we were going to stop

that. We were not going to do that, allow that to 1 2 happen. If insurance is that high, and we know how 3 important it is, whatever is left in there should stay 4 in there to carry over to the next year. But ten 5 thousand dollars was taken out of that fund to put 6 somewhere else. I don't -- District 2 just doesn't 7 approve of that. 8 That was the only two. The others were explained 9 and they had pretty good explanations to them, except 10 for the one where the office has three LexMark 11 printers and it required toners, and cartridges for imaging. Well, I just felt like that should have been 12 13 placed in the budget. The money for that should have 14 been in the budget because you know you're going to 15 have problems with your machine. You know you're 16 going to need equipment or whatever you want to call 17 it, supplies for your machine. So my thing was, why 18 wasn't it put in the budget to begin with. They took 19 it out of training. It seems that we need to keep 20 what we can do in training so we can keep up with 21 what's going on in this world. 22 And I thank you, Mr. Chairman. 23 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Ms. Floyd. 24 Moving on to Citizens Comments. Mr. Harmon calls 25 your name, please restate your name and district. You 26 got three minutes and address the Chair, please. Mr. 27 Harmon. 28 LEON HARMON: Mr. Chairman, first speaker 29 is Frank Pressly. 30 FRANK PRESSLY: Frank Pressly, District 2. 31 Mr. Chairman, the switches that we were discussing, I 32 looked at all the components of everything that's 33 listed here and I see that they're pretty much 34 standard on all of these with 48 ports. 35 TOMMY DUNN: I think Mr. Graham's 36 already got an answer for that. Already got an 37 answer. 38 FRANK PRESSLY: All right. So I don't 39 think it's an apples to apples comparison. 40 Don't think so, but like I TOMMY DUNN: 41 said, Mr. Graham will be addressing that. 42 FRANK PRESSLY: Okay. The other thing I 43 was little disappointed is the report that we got back 44 on the QRV proposal. There's -- we didn't get a lot 45 of meat in that discussion. I looked in the packet 46 and there was only an agenda sheet in there. There 47 wasn't really much else said. I'm assuming this is 48 the QRV proposal and the update on the National 49 Institute of Corrections study has to do with the 50 jail. And I'm hoping that that's not the avenue that

we take. There's a lot of public interest in the 1 2 issue about the jail. So I hope that we don't take 3 secrecy or not completely reporting to the public 4 what's going on as the avenue of choice. There are a 5 lot of people interested in what happens with that 6 jail. So if we could keep the information flowing and 7 keep the public advised as to what's going on, I think 8 it would be to all of our benefit. 9 TOMMY DUNN: All the meetings will be 10 public and will be announced. Sure will. Next. Mr. Chairman, next speaker 11 LEON HARMON: 12 is Elizabeth Fant. Some housekeeping things, 13 ELIZABETH FANT: 14 and I didn't know Ms. Floyd and I were going to talk 15 about the same thing. But if you'll look at in under 16 number 16 area, you get to the one on Veterans Report. 17 I had to fill it in. There was no title there. So this is a semi-annual report of report, but nothing up 18 19 there at the heading. Supposed to be the Veterans. Ι 20 don't know whose oversight that is. This is the kind 21 of thing. You can't put this in public record if you don't know who it is that's doing it. 22 23 Here's another one. Budget transfer for juror 24 fees to books and publications, ?? division. Budget 25 transfer on PAWS, public works, supplies, chemicals, 26 supplies, cleaning, went to supplies medical which is 27 okay. But we also just gave them money on the front 28 end when we were doing the supplemental budget. So we 29 just need to be careful with that. 30 We have a problem in Anderson County. It's a big 31 problem. Drugs. Twice in the last two weeks I've 32 heard Jay West speak on the opioid crisis and what the 33 legislature is doing on it. It's not only the opioid 34 crisis, it's crack, it's heroin, it's pink, it's drunk 35 drivers, it's people who are smoking marijuana. We 36 have a big drug problem. When you talk about the 37 landfill, any kind of landfill, you need to realize 38 that everything that we consume that we can't consume 39 is going there. And everything that you do consume in your body is going through your body and it is going 40 41 into your toilet, your sewer and eventually water 42 treatment. We're killing ourselves. The landfill up 43 in Slabtown, I understand was a done deal. No pun 44 intended. It was done while there were hearings and 45 zoning requests and all of that. People went to 46 Columbia to protest it. Somebody got money under the 47 table for that deal. One of the people who went to 48 that hearing -- one of those hearings in Columbia has 49 confided in me that they actually met the attorneys 50 from the Mafia. They introduced themselves as

attorneys for the Mafia. So don't say that the Mafia 1 2 is not involved in landfills and waste management, 3 because they are. The landfill up at Slabtown has no 4 liner. 5 LEON HARMON: Time, Mr. Chairman. 6 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Harmon. 7 LEON HARMON: No one else is signed up. 8 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Harmon. 9 Moving on is Remarks from Council members. Ms. 10 Wilson. 11 CINDY WILSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. А 12 quick comment on the C&D Landfill up at Slabtown. 13 That was the done deal before this Council came on. 14 It's a disgrace that it happened in that manner, but 15 it predated this group. 16 I am going to request that for our next Council 17 meeting in consideration of coming up with funding for 18 paving, that we have a report of budget to actual 19 revenues and expenditures for mid-fiscal year 2017-20 2018 budget year if we could do that at the next 21 Council meeting so we have some idea of where we are. 22 And that will give us a good lead-in for budget 23 consideration. But I greatly appreciate everybody 24 working so hard. We covered a lot of territory and 25 it's nice to have help. Thank y'all. Thank you. 26 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Wooten. 27 CRAIG WOOTEN: Yes, two things. I was in 28 a couple of committee meetings and it seems to be a 29 recurring theme that, you know, staff will propose 30 some things and I'll say, well, do you need Council 31 approval? And they say, no, no, we just want your 32 blessing. And I'm like, well, if you think it's a good idea, then we should be empowering staff to make 33 34 those decisions and to move forward on it. If it's in 35 their budget and they're the experts of their particular realm, and I feel like we're in a economic 36 37 upswing and it won't last forever. Sometimes we've 38 had to micro-manage in economic downswings to make 39 sure that budgets were correct. But we -- if prices 40 of houses are going up and economic development is 41 going up, this is the time for us to empower staff to 42 move forward and right some of the wrongs that we 43 haven't been able to right in the past. And so going 44 into this budget season, that's not an indictment 45 against them, that's an indictment against us. 46 That's, you know, that's not to hold anybody unaccountable. But to allow them to do their jobs and 47 to move forward and if they see problems, fix it. 48 And 49 if they need resources, tell us and let's get them 50 resources. So you know, things like the landfill,

don't linger for twenty years. And we can move 1 2 forward. 3 And the second thing I just wanted to announce 4 that my wife and I are expecting our fourth child and 5 so ---6 TOMMY DUNN: Congratulations. 7 CRAIG WOOTEN: Thank you. -- and so I 8 joked earlier my fragile retirement plan has now been 9 demolished. And maybe in next year's budget we can talk about child care at meetings. That's it. 10 11 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Wooten and 12 congratulations. 13 CRAIG WOOTEN: Thank you. 14 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Graham. 15 RAY GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 16 Just a couple of things. Again, Mr. Pressly, thank 17 you for taking the time to do the research on that. Α 18 couple of the pricings around the area that you have, 19 is actually reconditioned switches. So I definitely 20 would like to get that information from you to 21 determine if it is truly an apple to apple. One thing 22 about the ones that we are pricing with the company --23 and in defense for the Sheriff's department this is on 24 state contract so technically speaking, they should be 25 a better price. But in the same respect we should do 26 our diligence to ensure we're getting the best price 27 for it. But as far as this particular switch and this 28 estimate here that I can speak for, this switch here 29 provides support along with the purchase of this so 30 that's probably part of the difference. Is it 31 feasible to be that much of a difference? I don't 32 know. Again, we need to look and make sure the 33 fifteen hundred dollar price range that you're looking 34 at, is it a new switch or is it reconditioned? 35 Because now the ones we've looked at for this price is 36 reconditioned. And actually that wouldn't be apple to 37 apple. But I mean, if we can get a new switch for 38 that price, we might can add some support service with 39 it and still be way under the price that we've got. 40 So we definitely would like to get that information 41 from you on that. I'll be glad to meet with you after 42 the meeting to get that, if that's possible. As far as one other thing that I've got. One of 43 the comments, and I hear this so often when we're 44 45 talking about the National Institute of Corrections, 46 that we're here to build a jail. We're actually not. 47 That is not -- and again, if you look on the agenda, it plainly states Update on National Institute of 48 49 Corrections study. The study is not to determine when 50 and where we're going to build a jail. The study is

to determine how can we make that system more 1 2 efficient. And that's the very reason they have went 3 through a process of putting people on committees and 4 getting this together. It's still early stage. But I 5 mean the purpose of it is to truly look into how can 6 we get the justice system to work better for the 7 citizens, for the people that -- for the inmates that 8 comes in. Are there ways that we can offer them 9 treatment, whether it's drug rehab, whether it's some 10 type of education. I mean the key there is to basically cut off the problem. And we've got to give 11 12 these people an opportunity to come out and be a true 13 resource to the county, to their families, to the 14 areas they're living in. That's what the study is 15 The study is not to build a jail. And I kind of for. 16 get touchy every time I hear that, because that's not 17 what I'm after. And I truly believe -- I know Chief 18 Mitchell, Friday was his last day, but I know his 19 direction was not for that. And I know the Sheriff's 20 direction is not to build a jail. In the past, yes, 21 that was the direction they wanted to go. But that's 22 not the Administration. We want to know what our true 23 need is for Anderson County and how can we help every 24 citizen in Anderson County. And that includes the incarcerated ones. Some of them that I actually 25 26 locked up over the years. But I mean we want to 27 change that pattern and get them where they have an 28 opportunity of coming back out into the community and stepping up their game and being a resource to their 29 30 family to help raise them and in doing so, that's what 31 the study's for. It's not to build a jail. So I just 32 wanted to clarify that. 33 And if you've ever got any questions as far as how 34 we're putting the public safety meeting together, 35 please by all means, ask them, I'll be glad to explain 36 anything I can to you. I definitely appreciate your 37 input and thank you for coming. 38 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Graham. Ms. 39 Floyd.

40 GRACIE FLOYD: Thank you. I have two, 41 maybe three things. We're having the Taste of Soul 42 again this year on the 23rd of February. I have some 43 fliers for you. Last year we were -- we had Mr. Allen 44 came by and had a very, very good time. Excuse me. And Liz Fant was there. We had a very, very good 45 46 time. Would like for you to come by. What it is is a 47 fund raiser event for our community in District 2. 48 And they have the best cooks in the world down there. 49 And they get together and they make what's called soul 50 food. Now, you can call it what you want. But it's

the same food that you ate when you were little. And 1 2 I have somebody yet to tell me that they don't know 3 what I'm talking about. It was collard greens and corn bread and this and that. Pigs feet, and I love 4 5 them. They had all of that down there. And we would 6 like for you, Mr. Newspaper man, I want you to come, 7 too, this year. But it's really a lot of fun. Ιf 8 you've never tasted mustard greens before, this will 9 be a good time to do so. The tickets are twenty-five 10 dollars a piece, but it's worth every bit of the food. Okay. In fact, the first year we had so much of it 11 12 left, we had a huge crowd, but they were able to take 13 food home. Did you take any last year? Did you get 14 to take some food home last year? It's really good. 15 Give us a try. Don't be a snob. Come on by and let's 16 hob-knob. Okay.

17 Another thing, I was reading the Greenville News, 18 yesterday's paper, and they had an article in there --19 don't know if Anderson Independent had it or not --20 but the article said Help Feed South Carolina Kids 21 during the Summer. Did you hear about this one? 22 Okay. This is a summer food program that is offered 23 in camps, schools, in parks and da-da-da, where the 24 children will come to the place and get a hot meal, I 25 think a lunch meal during the middle of the day. And 26 sometimes these are the same kids that get the free 27 lunch thing. They are looking for people to sponsor 28 They've got the money to pay for it, but they're it. looking for places and people to volunteer. And they 29 30 have -- they're going to train you how to do it.

31 When my kids were growing up, they worked during 32 the summer in the parks helping with this program. 33 That was their little job. When they were thirteen 34 years old, they would go down to the park and they 35 would help serve the food, meet the food truck, get it 36 all organized. But if you have a company or a club or something and you're looking for something to do, 37 38 please, maybe even your church would be interested in 39 something like this. It was in the Metro column of the Greenville online news. 40

41 Okay. And going back about this jail thing, I 42 didn't know what the study was for, but I do know that 43 I have been hearing for the past 18 years that I've 44 been sitting up here that we do have a problem with 45 our correctional institute and that we would have to 46 do something about the crowdedness of the jail. I**′**m 47 not talking about no committee now. That we would 48 have to do something about the crowdedness of the 49 jail. That if we don't get to build a new one then 50 they're going to come down here and build it for us

and that's a fact, Jack. 1 2 And I thank you for listening. And I'm through, 3 and I thank you, Mr. Chairman. 4 TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Allen. 5 TOM ALLEN: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chair. 6 I'd like to, first of all, congratulate the economic 7 development folks here in the county. I know a 8 bulletin came out this week from the Chamber, or I 9 mean the state Department of Commerce about Anderson County being number 1 in the state last year for 10 11 economic development. And since 2009 we've brought in approximately three point three billion dollars in new 12 13 industry or expanded industry in the county. So that 14 speaks very highly for Mr. Nelson and the Economic Development crew that's worked so hard to do that and 15 16 I wanted to thank them for that. 17 Second thing is just to make note that at this 18 time I do not plan on running for Council the next 19 time. So I wanted to make that announcement tonight 20 so that anybody else that wants to throw their hat in 21 the ring will have a chance to do that. Several 22 reasons for it. I've enjoyed working on Council, I 23 really have. But I've always kind of been a proponent 24 of term limits. If somebody wants to stay for a long 25 time, and they're in a good position, doing a great 26 job, I have no problem with that. But I still kind of 27 lean towards term limits. I would note, too, that my 28 wife's going to be retiring this spring. And we'd 29 kind of like to have a little bit of time to travel 30 some before we get too old to be able to travel. And 31 finally, if I look at this one way, I've spent half of 32 my life in public service of one kind or another. Ι 33 spend over 22 years in the military serving the 34 country, 4 years on the Anderson County Board of 35 Education, it will be 10 years on the Anderson County Council. That comes out to 36 years. So, that's half 36 of my lifetime spent in public service, if you will. 37 38 So in the past 30 years, my wife and I have had 2 39 vacations in 30 years. So we thought it'd be kind of nice to take a break and get to do some other things. 40 41 I still want to stay involved with Anderson County and 42 I'm not going to go hide under a rock somewhere. But 43 I will give somebody else the chance to toss their hat 44 in the ring and a chance to excel and do something 45 great on the Council. So I just wanted to make note 46 of that tonight. And I thank you and all the Council 47 members. Thank you. 48 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you, Mr. Allen. It's 49 been a pleasure. Mr. Waters. 50 KEN WATERS: Mr. Wooten, if you're going

to need a babysitter, Mr. Allen's going to have some 1 2 spare time. That's bitter sweet news, I'll tell you. 3 Mr. Allen has been -- made some key votes in his reign 4 as a County Council person for District 4. He's been 5 a good friend. You know that's one of the things that 6 I've always said. We're friends up here and so after this is over with, you know, I'll still be looking for 7 8 some of his guidance because he's a very intelligent 9 And you know, going to be missed greatly. man. This 10 is -- I tried to talk him out of it a couple of times, 11 but I understand, you know, why he's doing it. And 12 there comes a time when everybody will make the decision like that. Anderson County, just looking at 13 14 the supplemental budget and all that, it's kind of 15 like standing in a forest and you turn around and you 16 can touch a tree. You start looking at all the good 17 things that's happened and he's been one of the key 18 votes in the majority of the good things. The 19 economic development. When I first came on Council, 20 he was here and we were excited to see a ten dollar an hour job. And you know, just going back and looking 21 at all that and his guidance, his experience, it's 22 23 going to be greatly missed. And I can't say how many 24 good things he's done just because there's so many. 25 You just start touching the trees. And I wouldn't 26 mind being one of his dogs because he treats his dogs 27 great, you know. But you know, he's going to be 28 greatly missed and there's a lot of good things that 29 he's done and so I appreciate his friendship. Thank 30 you, Mr. Chairman. 31 TOMMY DUNN: Thank you. Wrap things up, I just want to say -- all I'm going to say about Mr. 32 33 Allen's thing, I'm not going to say a whole lot about 34 that and boo-hoo because if you heard Mr. Allen, he 35 said his plan thing. You know to make God smile 36 sometimes we talk about we got plans. Well, He knows 37 that and our plans can change. So let's keep that in

38 mind and there's still hope there. 39 Number 2, I want to welcome and appreciate Captain Vaughn, runs our jail for us in Anderson County has 40 41 done an outstanding job, appreciate him being here 42 tonight in the Council meeting. Want to appreciate Ms. Casey Collins. I know she does an outstanding 43 job. Ms. Collins, hear a lot about what all you do 44 45 and I want you to know this Council -- you don't go 46 unnoticed, it don't go unnoticed. I just want to say 47 that in public record, we really appreciate the job you're doing and helping them out over there and 48 49 keeping them straight. If there's any way we can help y'all, you let us know, okay. We really do appreciate 50

the job you're doing. Number of good things about 1 2 you. 3 Want to appreciate, as Mr. Allen said, economic 4 development in Anderson County. You know some people 5 try to dirty something up whatnot. Want to tell you 6 something. The way to give everybody, to help anybody, and give them a leg up, is a good job. And I 7 8 hope that's one thing we've tried to do and get that 9 and train people to be able to do it. And we got some 10 things coming down the path very shortly about trying to help people get started and get them job training. 11 12 It's great, but that's the way you help somebody, give 13 them, help them get a good job. And I appreciate each 14 and everyone of y'all. Meeting adjourned. 15
