## A RESOLUTION HONORING THE MEMORY OF SIDNEY WOOD "BUTCH" KENNEDY, SR. AND HIS LIFETIME OF EXTRAORDINARY, DEDICATED SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY

Whereas Butch Kennedy, a son of the late Yates Kennedy and Antoinette Dukes and widower of Mac Reta McLeod Kennedy, grew up exercising thoroughbreds at multiple east coast racetracks, riding saddle broncs and bulls, jousting, playing polo, and training many horses, eventually graduating from Clemson College in 1962, not long after which he became Clemson Sheep Farm Manager, brought the first horse to what is now known as the Clemson Equine Center, and created the majority of the trails in the Fant's Grove area with the Block and Bridle Club; and

Whereas the trailhead behind the Garrison Arena is named the Butch Kennedy Trailhead in Mr. Kennedy's honor, and Mr. Kennedy was awarded the inaugural Order of the Stirrup in the year 2000 for his lifetime of work with horses and his central role in ensuring trails were passable and safe for the equine community; and

Whereas Mr. Kennedy was an active member of the SC Upstate Equine Council, the SC Horsemen's Council, was a founding member of the Pendleton Area Saddle Club, a longtime member of Pendleton United Methodist Church, and, at the time of his passing in November, he was survived by a son, Sid

Kennedy, a daughter, April Haynes, two siblings, two grandchildren, and a great-grandchild;

**Now, therefore, be it resolved,** in a meeting duly assembled this eighteenth day of April 2023, that the Anderson County Council hereby honors the memory of Butch Kennedy for his lifetime of extraordinary service to our community, region, and state.

First of all on the thing is a presentation by The Zone Service thing. Who's doing that? Come on up. Mr. Burns, help her get whatever she needs.

He has some papers you can take two and pass it if you want to participate in a little classroom exercise with us this morning — this afternoon, to give you more information about The Zone. They helped pack those bags and make sure that they're being a part of giving back to our community. So we wanted today to ask you all to please help us keep them in a safe environment this summer by providing them with some stem activities, as well as giving them an opportunity to have a chance to explore Anderson, Clemson and some of the different places that we can explore throughout the state of South Carolina as we're doing our activities this year.

Thank you so much, again, for allowing us to grace your podium to talk about our summer program at The Zone. We do provide innovative activities for parents, families and children. And we're just excited about what we're doing here in Anderson County and the impact we've made. We have several students that are doing great things in Anderson now that are representing The Zone and came through this program at an early age. ## INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY JOHN WRIGHT TOMMY DUNN: At this time

we're going to move on to item number 3, approval of minutes of March 7th. We didn't receive none, so they're not ready to be approved yet or make any changes or corrections. We haven't received them so we won't be doing item 3.

We're going to move to item 4, Resolution presentation to honor and recognize Anderson County EMS for winning System of the Year and Steve Kelly for winning Director of the Year. On behalf of the Council, I'd like to ask Councilman John Wright if he would read this.

JOHN WRIGHT: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Tonight it's our privilege as Council members on behalf of the citizens of Anderson County to recognize the great work that our Emergency Medical Services have been doing, work that is now being

recognized statewide. We won EMS System of the Year; Steve Kelly won EMS Director of the Year; and Amy West, won Emergency Nurse of the Year.

Before we get into reading the Resolution, I just want to say thank you to a few of the people and partners who have made all of this possible.

Thank you to our fellow Council members who voted for the changes. Thank you to Don McCown and Steve Kelly. Thank you to our partners, AnMed and MedShore. And thank you to all of our EMS personnel and all of the emergency providers that provide emergency medical care every day in our county.

And now the Resolution.

This is, again, a Resolution honoring and recognizing Anderson County EMS for winning EMS System of the Year, and Steve Kelly for winning EMS Director of the Year.

WHEREAS during the Covid-19 pandemic, Anderson County boldly overhauled and unified its EMS system from top to bottom, standing up a brand new two-tier, paramedic driven system of emergency prehospital care, debuting the system—a partnership between Anderson

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County, AnMed, and Medshore-only 45 days after the vote to create it; and

WHEREAS within weeks of the new system's launch, response times sharply decreased and, since then, the new system is 100% staffed and response time goals—defined as 9 minutes, 59 seconds or less—are now being met 95% of the time on priority one calls as opposed to 65% under the previous system, an accomplishment unprecedented in emergency care in the history of Anderson County; and

WHEREAS on Saturday, March 4th, at the 44th Annual South Carolina EMS Symposium, the South Carolina EMS Association-in partnership with the South Carolina EMS Network—awarded Anderson County EMS the three highest awards available to EMS in the State of South Carolina: Anderson County EMS is the EMS System of the Year, and Anderson County EMS Director Steve Kelly is the EMS Director of the Year; and AnMed's Amy West, RN, is Emergency Nurse of the Year.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Anderson County Council hereby expresses its profound appreciation to all members of the Anderson County EMS team, to our community partners AnMed and Medshore, and to Mr. Kelly for the excellent work they do on a daily basis to save lives in Anderson County and for bringing statewide recognition to the good work being done here.

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One of the bills I got while I was working down there was water permitting for the state which kept people from just coming in and taking our water as much as they wanted from wherever they wanted. It has to be permitted. And then when we go into a drought, they fall under all -- the jurisdiction of our regular drought regulations.

Then another one was when we met with the state of Georgia about working together with the Savannah River Basin. We got the fishing laws where we have a reciprocal agreement with Georgia so that they recognize our laws and we recognize theirs.

I met with the Corps of Engineers in Washington to stop the arbitrary draw-down of Hartwell Lake in September and October. And they agreed that there was really no reason for them to draw it down. So that's helped us maintain the water levels in the lake.

Two years ago, I wrote the Wake Boat Law. And after two years of wrestling with them, we finally got that thing passed. And the people on Keowee are ecstatic about having it, as are the people on Hartwell Lake, and Lake Murray as well. Georgia is going to file a copy of that same bill and try to get it into their legislation as well.

I've always worked on saltwater intrusion into public well system that we have.

You might ask yourself, how do I get to do this? Well, ever since Jonathan Hill, my reputation has improved 100% down there in Colombia. The General Assembly is more than willing to work with me. I can write a bill directly with legislative counsel with a seated member's sponsorship. Which brings us to this year.

The bill concerning mosquitosides being fogged around a drinking water, lake and pond -- and we're only talking about those lakes and ponds that currently provide drinking as a drinking water source. This was one I needed to work on. So I got started. I talked to the head of the pesticides and herbicides at Clemson. And that's -- the average fee that they charge for coming out and doing this every season for people is about \$650. And there's a lot of people doing that now. And this, this is where the problem is going to be. They have people just out there spraying that stuff with really no rhyme or reason.

I talked to Ernie Schoonerhorne, who was at the time over the pesticides. And I met with Heather Nix, who is also over our water quality for the state. And they both agreed that this might not be a bad approach to take.

I got a letter back from them. And in that letter, this is one of the things that they stated, the product that they're using is extremely toxic to fish and aquatic invertebrates. And you know, with that new Green Pond system we've got out there, that's been a real asset. I can lay in my bed every morning, as  ${\tt I}$ watched the sunrise, I can watch the fishermen in the fisherman -- fishing tournaments that we have out there all the time. It has to be good for our community. And then the other part said that this -- they need to let surfaces dry before humans and pets come in contact with it. And they said, do not apply where institutions like libraries and sports facilities in the immediate area when it's occupied. So they know that that stuff is not good for human beings. So even even when they -- and they spray a lot around the lakes, because people think because they're around water, that we're going to have a big problem with mosquitoes. And that's not necessarily true. lived out there for -- since 2000. So that's about -we're going on 23 years now. And I stay outside every time the sun is shining. And occasionally I get bitten by one, but I'd rather be bitten by a mosquito than fogged with those mosquitosides. 

And I got this thing from the -- have y'all seeing this? This is what the county puts out about their convenience centers. And in their convenience centers the following is not accepted: pesticides and herbicides. So if y'all say y'all don't want it in our county landfills, I think now the time has come that we look at our drinking water supply to be sure that we're not, we're not creating a big problem up the road.

You remember back when we had lead in our paint, they made us take that out because they felt like that leached into our water supply. In 1953 and 1954, I used to live in Charleston, and I was a little kid then. I'm 78 now. And they had this great stuff that they mosquito fogged with. And it actually would kill every mosquito around. They'd fogged us down with DDT. And you know that's not even used anymore.

Two percent of the world's water is drinkable in its current form. And we've got Hartwell Lake right here in our backyard, we've got Lake Keowee right up the road, we've got Lake Russell right down. And I think we need to take a responsible approach to preserving it for the people in the future and taking care of the people that are here now.

Y'all all know that the PCBs that got put in Hartwell Lake, we had a very expensive time about trying to mitigate the damage that it has done. So

we've already been one major round with contaminants being dumped into our drinking water lake. And I worked with them when we -- we spent millions going up and blowing the dams down and trying to bury the PCBs, but it still has left kind of a bad omen over our lake with regard to fishing.

And this, this stuff that they put out, I made one of the guys that was putting it out give me a copy of what he was putting out. And I called the company that manufactures this stuff, and they're -- of course, their attorneys, they don't want to incur any liability for this. And none of them are following the protocols that the attorneys for the manufacturers have recommended that they do.

We only need to look at what Agent Orange did. They told us that was a wonderful thing during the Vietnam War. And we have guys dying right and left and suffering from having been exposed to that in the past. They claim they won't fog within 100 feet of the lake, but I know better because I watch them doing that. This stuff works on your central nervous system. Now small children and women that are pregnant, this is not good for them to take it all because of the size of the body and the development of the child in the womb.

We don't really have a mosquito problem. I've lived out there since 2000. I could probably count the number of mosquitoes that I've been bitten by since I've lived out there. But we need to be good stewards of God's given resource.

This bill that I've got in and it's supposed to come up in subcommittee next week, and I wanted to be sure that y'all were completely aware of what I was attempting to do. And that maybe y'all might even be amenable to what I'm suggesting here tonight. We want them to stay 1000 feet away from the waterline on any lake or pond from which we draw our drinking water. And that doesn't have anything to do with anyplace else that they want to spray mosquitosides. Also, if we should ever have a problem with mosquitoes, or mosquito borne disease breaks out, DHEC will come in and mitigate it and work through county council as they do that. So it's not something if we have a problem that we can't address.

But what I see out there is I see too many different people -- and you see these people with the little magnetic stickers on the side of their trucks just running and -- the people that -- I've talked to several of them, they have no specific training, they work under somebody else's license, and usually they're the youngest kid on the block or the newest man on the

team.

So time has come to try to address this. It makes us look responsible. And it makes us be responsible as a government.

I would appreciate any input y'all could have to help me with this. This stuff is cumulative in your system, and in our bodies. And over a period of time we may get to be an old person and wonder, you know, why we have this particular ailment or something. And having been exposed to pesticides in the course of your life could very well be some of the problems that we have as we age.

TOMMY DUNN: Mr. Bowen, I appreciate it. That's going to be time. We'll take this under advisement, and I'm sure we'll be in touch and look at your thing. If you've got any literature or anything else, just leave it with Mr. Burns.

This allows those sites to access certain benefits available through the South Carolina Department of Economic Development in their incentive programs. One of the recommendations that I had is even on the smaller developments where there are fewer dwellings or fewer anticipated trips in and out, is that the mouth of the entrance be wider. Because now we've got landscape trucks and trailers coming and going and now they have to get all the way out into the opposite lane. And that's not very expensive. I know we had to do that at our own farm. The county had a certain width they could do and then I had to hire a construction company to add another section of culvert so we could get rigs in and out. So that's one minor thing that I think that would help. That's not very expensive, really.

Anyway, we'll be looking at this in greater detail. And it might be useful for us to have Mr. Hogan to come up and tell us about his summary of traffic impact study practices in other jurisdictions because actually our county is probably way behind on addressing these issues, behind a lot of other counties.

CINDY WILSON:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Our Planning and Public Works Committee held a meeting on the 14th of March at 1:15. It was well attended, including representatives from the engineering and real estate professions and private citizens. We definitely appreciate their input and

9 interest in these considerations. Mr. John Caime has 10 exhaustively researched measures believed to be 11 helpful.

11 helpful.
12 Firs

First was a continued discussion of a tree ordinance pertaining to development. Most of our county council members have received phone calls from angry citizens where projects have taken down every tree including along creek banks and in some instances on a tract of land and mass grading the property, dramatically changing its topography, and causing runoff of rainwater, damaging adjoining and downstream landowners. And case in point, Midway Road, what the city annexed in and has unforgivably developed high density, busting our zoning. The provisions that were looked at apply to all new development except that land disturbing activity that disturbs less than one acre of land, is not part of a larger common plan of development or does not fall under the NPDES industrial stormwater permit.

For purposes of this article, new development is defined as any development for which a grading permit is required after the effective date of the article. Developments with Planning Commission approval on the effective date of the article are exempt from the requirements of the article if development activity is commenced within two years of the approval of this article.

Exemptions: This article shall not apply to individual dwelling lots, farms, undeveloped acreage, agricultural acreage, existing already built commercial or industrial properties, or any other real property that is not being developed or redeveloped, substantially changed or subdivided, as described in Division A above.

The development plan would require the inclusion of a tree protection plan providing tree credits for existing specimen or heritage trees and would encourage tree planting. The proposed tree ordinance is a companion to the county stormwater ordinance and stream buffer requirements. Density variances and appeals along with provisions for residential projects, public recreational, industrial, commercial, retail and

institutional are made clearer. To provide better guidance and enforcement of this ordinance, an arborist would be needed. The Clemson Extension Service and our county forester will be helping us with these measures.

As we work through the second and third readings of this ordinance, obviously, further adjustments may be made.

Our committee voted unanimously to send this up to council with a recommendation for approval. Obviously, we have more work to do. I'll leave it to the floor, to our chairman, as to how we should proceed here.

TOMMY DUNN:

I just think there's a good bit of work to be done. I've gotten -I'll open the floor up for the rest of y'all, too, but
I've got several things and then talking to Mr. Harmon in talking to Mr. Caime, one thing is -- and I've got a list here I'll turn over -- one thing is section three application and exemptions. Evaluate where the language of this section needs adjustment to accommodate the state vested rights act and US Army Corps of Engineers Clean Water Act Section 404 permitting, both individual permits and nationwide permits.

Number two, section four, tree protection plan, consideration whether 15 calendar days is significant enough for the county review of a tree protection plan.

Section three, buffer criteria, consideration and evaluation of the language that a minimum of 25 foot undisturbed buffer is required on all sides of jurisdiction of wetlands. As we all know, federal jurisdiction or federal things now, you can do land swaps and fill in wetlands without having a buffer on it, if you've got a right to do that. That's federal law. We looked at that at Arthrex up here on those ponds. We didn't choose to do it, but you can do that. Swap to buy to put lands back in the conservatory.

Section nine, provisions for the public recreational, industrial, commercial, retail, industrial projects. Just want to make sure we are all on the same page. Get Mr. Burns and Mr. Harmon to look and see what kind of impact this could have on economic development.

In Section 13, violation, several (inaudible) and enforcement consideration, who and how this ordinance will be enforced. Number one, talking to Mr. Caime, and where he's come from in the past, I think this could be policed. If we decide to do something on this, this could be a policed thing. There are going to be engineers out there working for these companies. They ought to be ones designs this, does this. Our

staff approves it. It's just a little extra thing. They've got to be out there. When they go out there and do something another as far as inspect roads, this, that and the other, staff is, Stormwater, they're going to see if that tree, if that work is being done and these penalties -- more times than not, engineers have got license. He's not going to stamp off on something to say approval. That's some stuff that needs to be worked on. But I don't want to get into the thing of hiring a tree police. Who are we -- and who's going to do that?

And look, talk all you want to, we're all been here, all about government. Clemson University ain't going to help you. The Forest Commission of South Carolina ain't going to help you. They can't do the jobs they planned on doing. You ain't going to get no intern for nothing to go out there and do these kind of things. It's too important to have somebody that don't know what they're doing; having an intern doing this.

The other thing I've got an issue with is I can own four acres, going to build my family a house on, I'm going to disturb two acres by putting a house, septic tank and a driveway to get to my house and I've got to have the tree police on my four acres. I'm the one that first talked about a tree ordinance, and it was all because, it's not the individual person. I don't want to see another Midway. I don't -- my opinion, I don't want to see another one that happened out there on Midway Road and evidently the city don't neither, after they let it happen, out there on Midway Road, mass grading like that and berms of dirt, things like that. That's my intent when talking about this. Not to bother the little person or -- on something like this right here. I just think this needs to be worked at. Mr. Harmon needs to have a vested say in this, looking and talking to him, and I'd like to get some things up.

And I open the floor up for any other discussion.

out-of-control development. As we do not choose to stop developments, some quality control seems to be in the best interest of our county going forward.

Mr. Batson recommends that, one, we set a fixed pre-development baseline date, such as 2017 to be compared with existing site conditions, and require the more conservative conditions be used for the project's peak flow targets. Currently, the pre-development conditions used for stormwater design are the site conditions that exist today. For example, this change could set the pre-development site conditions as a wooded condition if it had been cleared and converted to pasture, or if it had been -- had some level of unpermitted development after 2017.

Second, require subdivision storm sewers located outside of right of ways be located on common property, rather than within easements on lots. This would move the maintenance and repair responsibility more firmly in the court of the HOA rather than an individual resident, where problems such as a sinkhole might occur. So we had discussions about some of it, like who's responsible and et cetera.

Thirdly, conveyances in subdivisions designed to carry the 25 year storm. This would reduce the likelihood of ditches or swells overtopping and impacting the homes that are increasingly being built close together -- closer together and on fill dirt. There was more discussion that went on. These were just simply some recommendations regarding the riparian and stream buffers that will be forthcoming, hopefully at the next meeting. It seems that perhaps the feds, the state and the county riparian buffer requirements may differ. So we'll be looking at that.

And as an aside, I wanted to invite everyone to the April 3rd meeting. We'll have a meeting with the Corps of Engineers, the South Caroline DHEC and our Stormwater and other parties so that we can closely examine our respective roles and come up with a clearer understanding and better communications. And that will be here at one on the 3rd.

Next, Ms. Alisia Hunter, our Planning Director presented an update on an RV park ordinance. A rough draft of the RV ordinance should be ready soon. This area of concern has many working parts, and it's taking some time.

This concludes our meeting report. Do my fellow committee members have anything they would like to add? Well, thank you to everyone for a good, productive meeting. We appreciate it.

TOMMY DUNN: We'll get you something. If I can get your address, Mr. Burns -what this is, if I can just what you call it, this is -- it ain't been approved yet, but the House -- on March 15th, the South Carolina House of Representatives approved the 2023-2024 state budget and sent it to the Senate. In that budget, they've got a proviso in the House of Representative's version of the budget, there is a section that prevents local governments from enacting or enforcing an ordinance that prohibits short term rentals. The State Legislature prevents this type of ordinance by withholding the local government fund of any government that prohibits short term rentals. As of February 15, 2023, the South Carolina Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office predicted that Anderson County would receive -- we'd lose nine million dollars if we done something. That ain't going to happen.

Then we've got right now, it's very clear, what the House of Representatives means when it says prohibit short term rentals. We've got people looking on it. The main thing, if you want -- as I said a month ago when you come here, this was in the works. They worked on it. They moved quicker because what this has got to do with the budget, when it was tacked on to the budget.

Jordan, would you make sure she gets the information, what she can find out about this? That's one of our attorneys. He'll make sure you get the information where you can go online and get this. But it's going to go to the Senate. And if it passes the Senate, then they've got to get together and form a budget. But if it stays in there, our hands are tied. So I think where we're coming from, we don't want to --we've got staff working on some of these things, just what y'all said. But we don't want to enact nothing, spend no more time -- I don't want to use the term wasted time, but then the state says we can't do nothing and got our hands tied. That's where we're at with this. Because the train has left the station, it just ain't hit the other destination yet.

But the citizens is the ones that's going to have to stand up and call their Senators and their House members, as far as that goes, because the budget has got to come back to the House to be voted on final. And what this has got to do with the budget is beyond me, but it just goes to show you how bad somebody wants it done, how he tacked it onto the budget to get it done. But that's where we're at. Okay?

### **ORDINANCE NO. 2023-009**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 20 (TITLED ENVIRONMENT) OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, ANDERSON COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AND RELOCATE CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 20 TO CHAPTERS 10, 26, AND 32; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

**WHEREAS,** Anderson County, South Carolina, a body politic and corporate and a political subdivision of the State of South Carolina, acting by and through the Anderson County Council, previously adopted the provisions of Chapter 20 titled Environment of the Anderson County Code;

WHEREAS, the enforcement of the various provisions of Chapter 20 of the Anderson County Code occurs in different ways and it is desirable to group the provisions according to the way each will be enforced within the County; and

**WHEREAS,** The County Council desires to make these amendments and revisions to the Anderson County Code.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** be it ordained by the Anderson County Council, in meeting duly assembled that:

1. The definition of "litter" and "solid waste" in Section 20-19 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Litter means all waste material and solid waste (as defined herein), including but not limited to, those items defined in the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, Section 44-96-40(2), (6), (32), (43), (73), and (74), as amended, and also, including, but not limited to, cigarette/cigar filters; disposable packages or containers; scrap metal; trash, garbage, or refuse; tires; furniture; dead animals or parts thereof; land clearing debris; and construction debris, but not including the waste from the primary process of mining, logging, sawmilling, or farming.

*Solid Waste* means solid waste as defined in the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, Section 44-96-40 (46), as amended.

2. Section 20-21 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-21 Supervision.

The environmental enforcement officer shall be supervised by the County Administrator.

3. Section 20-22 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-22 Authority.

Personnel employed by the administrator shall be vested with the authority to enforce and administer litter control within the County in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, Section 4-9-145, as amended, and all rules and regulations adopted thereunder and the same are incorporated herein by reference as fully set forth verbatim and as they may be amended from time to time.

4. Section 20-23(b) of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-23 Compliance.

- (b) It is unlawful to deposit a collection of litter or solid waste in an area facility not intended for public deposit for litter or solid waste. The provisions of this item apply to a deposit of litter or solid waste as is defined by the provisions of this article in an area or facility not intended for public deposit of litter or solid waste; provided however, it shall not prohibit a private property owner from depositing litter or solid waste as a property enhancement so long as the depositing does not violate applicable local or state health and safety regulations, and no portion thereof migrate through the elements to property of another.
- 5. Section 20-27 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-27. Unlawful disposal.

It shall be unlawful for any owner, manager, employee, agent or independent contractor, who is self-employed or who works for a retail, commercial, or institutional establishment (such person include solicitors, vendors, etc.), to deposit litter or solid waste from that business in any receptacle other than a litter or solid waste receptacle maintained on premises, except after having received permission from the county solid waste director for disposal or transport to a county permitted landfill/ convenience center.

- 6. Sections 20-28 and 20-29 are hereby moved to Chapter 32 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, into a new Article VI titled Distribution of Handbills and renumbered as Sections 32-110 and 32-111.
- 7. Section 20-31 is hereby moved to Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina and re-numbered as Section 10-28(c).

8. Section 20-28 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-28. Trash, garbage, litter and solid waste on premises.

No person shall permit trash, garbage, litter or solid waste which is not in a litter receptacle or is left exposed to the elements and visible from any public road or adjoining private property to remain on the property for a period in excess of 15 days.

- 9. Section 20-30 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby amended by re-numbering to 20-29.
- 10. Section of 20-32 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby renumbered to Section 20-30 and amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-30. Inspection of premises.

The environmental enforcement officer shall be authorized and required to cause the inspection of any premises within the limits of the county whenever it shall be necessary to enforce the provisions of this article.

11. Section 20-33 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby renumbered to Section 20-31 and amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-31. Issuance of order to correct hazardous conditions.

Whenever it shall appear to the environmental enforcement officer that there are lying within the County limits any lots, yards, or premises in a condition which shall constitute a present or potential hazard to the public health, safety, welfare, or violation of Section 20-26, the environmental enforcement officer shall issue a written notice to the owner requiring the owner within 15 days to bring such property within the provision of this article.

- 12. Section 20-34 of the Code of ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby renumbered to Section 10-32.
- 13. Section 20-35 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby repealed.
- 14. Article III titled Noise of Chapter 20 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby moved in its entirety to Chapter 26 as Article IV. Noise and the Sections are hereby renumbered as 26-120 through 26-127, and are references to sections within this article are amended as follows:

(a) Section 26-120 Excessive noise means any noise prohibited by Section 26-125.

### (b) Section 26-125 (a) The reference to 20-66 is amended to 26-126.

- (c) Section 26-127
  The referenced to 20-62 is amended to 26-123 and to 20-64 is amended to 26-125.
- (d) Section 26-127 (6) The reference to 20-65(b) is amended to 26-126 (b).
- 15. Article IV titled Weeds and Rank Vegetation of Chapter 20 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby moved in its entirety to Chapter 26 as Article V Weeds and Rank Vegetation and the Sections are hereby renumbered as 26-140 through 26-146, and references to sections within this Article are amended as follows:
  - (a) Section 26-143 The reference to 20-93 is amended to 26-142.
  - (b) Section 26-146
    The reference to 20-91 is amended to 26-140 and the reference to 20-96 is amended to 26-145.
- 16. All Ordinances, Orders, Resolutions, and actions of Anderson County Council inconsistent herewith are, to the extent of such inconsistency only, hereby repealed, revoked, and rescinded.
- 17. Should any part or provision of this Ordinance be deemed unconstitutional or unenforceable by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such determination shall not affect the rest and remainder of this Ordinance, all of which is hereby deemed separable.
- 18. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon the third reading and enactment of by Anderson County Council.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 2023-011**

## AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A PROHIBITION ON CERTAIN MOTOR VEHICLE TRAFFIC ON MOORE ROAD (C-02-0078); AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

WHEREAS, the State of South Carolina (the "State") and certain of its political subdivisions have the authority, pursuant to Title 56, Chapter 5 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976, as amended (the "State Code"), to regulate the use of State highways and roadways through the establishment of traffic regulations; and,

**WHEREAS**, Anderson County (the "County"), a body politic and corporate and political subdivision of the State of South Carolina, acting by and through its County Council (the "Council"), is responsible for the creation, management, upkeep, maintenance, and safety of all public roads in the County not designated as either State or Federal roadways or highways; and,

**WHEREAS**, the County, acting by and through its Council, is authorized by Section 56-5-4210 of the State Code to regulate or prohibit, in whole or in part, the operation of any specified class of size of motor vehicle on County maintained roads, whenever such regulation is necessary to provide for the public safety; and,

WHEREAS, truck traffic has increased on Moore Road, which is a road not intended for heavy vehicle use of a constant nature, to the degree that truck traffic is endangering residents living in the area as well as the motorists who utilize the road located therein; and,

**WHEREAS**, the subject road is more particularly described as: Moore Road (C-02-0078), as set forth in **Exhibit A** attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Road"); and,

**WHEREAS**, the County has performed traffic count studies on the Road to represent daily traffic and those results are set forth in **Exhibit B** attached hereto and made a part hereof: and,


**WHEREAS**, County Council desires to restrict trucks and other large vehicles from using the Road by posting notice and enforcing prohibition against "through trucks in excess of six (6) wheels" on the Road.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, be it ordained by Anderson County Council, in meeting duly assembled, that:

- 1. Anderson County hereby imposes, and shall post notice of, a prohibition against "through trucks in excess of six (6) wheels," pursuant to Section 56-5-4210 of the State Code, on the Road.
- Once the new prohibition has been imposed and posted, any single-unit or multi-unit truck or other motor vehicles, as defined in Section 56-3-20 of the State Code, in excess of six (6) wheels, shall be prohibited from traveling upon the Road except as set forth below in Paragraph 3 below.

- This Ordinance shall not apply to federal, state, county, municipal and other public service
  maintenance and emergency vehicles and school buses, nor delivery or commercial vehicles
  serving local addresses.
- 4. Should any term, provision, or content of this Ordinance be deemed unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such determination shall have no effect on the remainder of this Ordinance, all of which is hereby deemed separable.
- 5. All ordinances, orders, resolutions, and actions of Anderson County Council inconsistent herewith are, to the extent of such inconsistency only, hereby repealed, revoked, and superseded.
- 6. This Ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after the public hearing and the third reading in accordance with the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina.

**WHEREAS**, the County, acting by and through its Council, is authorized by Section 56-5-4210 of the State Code to regulate or prohibit, in whole or in part, the operation of any specified class of size of motor vehicle on County maintained roads, whenever such regulation is necessary to provide for the public safety; and,

**WHEREAS**, truck traffic has increased on Major Road, which is a road not intended for heavy vehicle use of a constant nature, to the degree that truck traffic is endangering residents living in the area as well as the motorists who utilize the road located therein; and,

**WHEREAS**, the subject road is more particularly described as: Major Road (C-02-0077), as set forth in **Exhibit A** attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Road"); and,

**WHEREAS**, the County has performed traffic count studies on the Road to represent daily traffic and those results are set forth in **Exhibit B** attached hereto and made a part hereof: and,

**WHEREAS**, County Council desires to restrict trucks and other large vehicles from using the Road by posting notice and enforcing prohibition against "through trucks in excess of six (6) wheels" on the Road.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, be it ordained by Anderson County Council, in meeting duly assembled, that:

- 1. Anderson County hereby imposes, and shall post notice of, a prohibition against "through trucks in excess of six (6) wheels," pursuant to Section 56-5-4210 of the State Code, on the Road.
- Once the new prohibition has been imposed and posted, any single-unit or multi-unit truck or other motor vehicles, as defined in Section 56-3-20 of the State Code, in excess of six (6) wheels, shall be prohibited from traveling upon the Road except as set forth below in Paragraph 3 below.

- This Ordinance shall not apply to federal, state, county, municipal and other public service
  maintenance and emergency vehicles and school buses, nor delivery or commercial vehicles
  serving local addresses.
- 4. Should any term, provision, or content of this Ordinance be deemed unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such determination shall have no effect on the remainder of this Ordinance, all of which is hereby deemed separable.
- 5. All ordinances, orders, resolutions, and actions of Anderson County Council inconsistent herewith are, to the extent of such inconsistency only, hereby repealed, revoked, and superseded.
- 6. This Ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after the public hearing and the third reading in accordance with the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina.




