A RESOLUTION TO PROCLAIM MAY 20-26, 2023, AS NATIONAL SAFE BOATING WEEK; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

Whereas, for over 100 million Americans, boating continues to be a popular recreational activity. From coast to coast, and everywhere in between, people are taking to the water and enjoying time together boating, sailing, paddling, and fishing. During National Safe Boating Week, the U.S. Coast Guard and its federal, state, and local safe boating partners encourage all boaters to explore and enjoy America's beautiful waters responsibly.

Whereas, safe boating begins with preparation. The Coast Guard estimates that human error accounts for most boating accidents and that life jackets could prevent nearly 83 percent of boating fatalities. Through basic safety procedures-carrying lifesaving emergency distress and communications equipment, wearing life jackets, attending safe boating courses, participating in free boating checks, and staying sober when navigating- we can help ensure boaters on America's coastal, inland, and offshore waters stay safe throughout the season.

Whereas, National Safe Boating Week is observed to bring attention to important lifesaving tips for recreational boaters so that they can have a safer, more fun experience out on the water throughout the year.

Whereas, on average, 650 people die each year in boating-related accidents in the U.S.; 75 percent of these fatalities are caused by drowning; the vast majority of these accidents are caused by human error or poor judgment and not by the boat, equipment, or environmental factors; and a significant number of boaters who lose their lives by drowning each year would be alive today had they worn their life jackets.

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that Anderson County Council hereby supports the goals of the Safe Boating Campaign and proclaims May 20-26, 2023, as National Safe Boating Week and the start of the year-round effort to promote safe boating, urging all those who boat to practice safe boating habits and wear a life jacket at all times while boating.

THIS IS A RESOLUTION HONORING THE MEMORY OF SIDNEY WOOD "BUTCH" KENNEDY, SR. AND HIS LIFETIME OF EXTRAORDINARY, DEDICATED SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY

Whereas Butch Kennedy, a son of the late Yates Kennedy and Antoinette Dukes and widower of Mac Reta McLeod Kennedy, grew up exercising thoroughbreds at multiple east coast racetracks, riding saddle broncs and bulls, jousting, playing polo, and training many horses, eventually graduating from Clemson College in 1962, not long after which he became Clemson Sheep Farm Manager, brought the first horse to what is now known as the Clemson Equine Center, and created the majority of the trails in the Fant's Grove area with the Block and Bridle Club; and

Whereas the trailhead behind the Garrison Arena is named the Butch Kennedy Trailhead in Mr. Kennedy's honor, and Mr. Kennedy was awarded the inaugural Order of the Stirrup in the year 2000 for his lifetime of work with horses and his central role in ensuring trails were passable and safe for the equine community; and

Whereas Mr. Kennedy was an active member of the SC Upstate Equine Council, the SC Horsemen's Council, was a founding member of the Pendleton Area Saddle Club, a longtime member of Pendleton United Methodist Church, and, at the time of his passing in November, he was survived by a son, Sid Kennedy, a daughter, April Haynes, two siblings, two grandchildren, and a great-grandchild;

We went into parts of the county. I was at all the meetings, I think, and Mr. Sanders was, too. I might have missed one. Everybody didn't -- most people didn't like the car fee idea. Didn't think it was fair. Wanted to talk about doing this or that. And this is sort of where this is coming from. The other thing is, it's not going to raise enough money to put -- worth the effort, if I have to say, for lack of words. The second thing is, if we wanted to do it by millage, we couldn't -- state law wouldn't allow us to raise it enough to do anything. And thirdly, and we're going -- if we decide to do something, we're going to lay all this out, works and everything, the money is not there to make a thing in our budget. It's just not there. Our budget is --hold me to this, about sixty something plus percent. We've got all this before we get down is in salaries and personnel. And a lot of that is going to the Sheriff and pay raises and we get inundated every year. We get costs about insurance overruns. But this is a more I think a fairer way. And this ain't -- if we decide to do this, this is not County Council doing this, because we can't do it. State law wouldn't allow us to. It has to go to the voters and voters have to vote on it. All we're saying is given the citizens of Anderson County, if you want your roads fixed, giving you an avenue to fix them. Ms. Davis.

RITA DAVIS:

Well, sir, I
think you said exactly the things that I was going to
say. But we talked about it, and there are three
different mechanisms whereby we could raise funds for
roads. And we're in the budget process right now, and
I'll be honest with you, as the Chairman so eloquently
stated, 71 percent is salary and fringes. So what are
you going to cut in order to pave roads? I think 2019
was the last time we put any new money, 1.5 million for
all seven districts to pave. And Mr. Hogan told me
today that a failing, poor road, one mile is six
hundred thousand dollars.

And like you were saying, Mr. Sanders, if we had even a \$25 road fee, that's nine miles. But Mr. Hogan said we have 1,534 county road miles that he has to consider. And so you know, one mill will generate about a million dollars. We have about 17 mills in our bank. But transportation tax of one penny, or it could be a fraction thereof, would raise north of \$30 million dollars in one year. The maximum term, it'll be twenty-five years. But the good thing about that, and

But a lot of people are still leery of what that money is going to. And it's kind of hard to find on the SCDOT website sometimes.

But I think the more forthcoming we can be as a Council to the constituents, and they can actually see there is a plan in place, and they'll be able to follow along where that money is going, I think that that's a -- I think that only enhances the plan and hopefully helps people to understand exactly where we are with it.

And if they want more, they can drill down into But just a quick budget snapshot for people -- for citizens to look at and say, okay, this is what they're saying they do with their money. I either want more information or don't. If they want more information, we can have a link to the whole budget. If not then people -- I think people can understand -- most people are intelligent enough to understand if they look at it and see where the majority of their tax dollars are being spent, of what we get for that dollar of property tax. But I think that's important for people to understand because a lot of people don't. And I was one of those people not so many years ago that didn't understand where my tax dollars were spent because I didn't understand the budget. But, you know, it's easy for us to understand it. But I think a quick snapshot, something quick that they can look at, and if they want more information we have a place they can go get more information freely. And I think that's important for people to be able to buy into it.

We mentioned that car fee. You can look to our county north of us, they had a big debacle with that car fee and they had a lot of challenges with it, and it just turned out not to be a good idea for us. So I think this is the only avenue that I can see that we can really do something substantial and get our roads in good condition.

A while back Mr. Hogan and I sat down and we kind of estimated out that each district, just to maintain was about three to four million dollars, each district. There's seven of us, so that kind of puts us in the ball park there, to be able to get some things going with what we have. And as growth continues, we're going to continue to see more and more county roads and

Ms. Wilson. I know this come out of your committee. Do you want to ...

CINDY WILSON: Well, as you know, we've been hit with short term rentals and RV parks galore. Some of them are fine and fit in well, and other are a nightmare.

And in the RV Park Design Standards, we had a very good meeting. A lot of useful input. You have before you a draft copy with some additional measures. You have the definitions which were important. Everything from park models to trailers to buffers.

There's been a recommendation that RV parks be defined as commercial business and also permanent habitation would mean occupation of an RV space for a period of up to two or more months.

As you look through, a number of items were removed because they were either redundant or about as clear as mud. So we've gotten that far. And it covers everything from submission to inspection, notices, hearings, general operation and maintenance requirements. The accessory uses and amenities, even the size of the solid waste containers, and the width of the roads, which are very important, and the number of accesses, utility signage numbers, et cetera.

So tonight we're voting in title only with a working draft copy that may have adjustments made as we move forward into second and third reading. There's certainly no deadline, but because we've been inundated by so many proposals, as have been noted, some were nice and worked well, and some have been really not quite as welcomed. So I present this to you tonight from our committee. We had a recommendation of two of

the three of us to ask you to approve. And one of our 2 council members had reservations. So this comes to you 3 tonight with two and one. 4 TOMMY DUNN: Coming from the 5 committee, it doesn't need a second. Open the floor up for discussion. I would like to say if this passes 6 7 tonight I'd like to see it move forward myself. 8 before we have a second or third reading, to have a 9 community meeting like we done on the road thing, here at the courthouse, input from the general public. 10 11 Afternoon when they've got time to come, off work, and 12 maybe even have another one, whatever it takes to hear 13 it out. ORDINANCE NO. 2023-009

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 20 (TITLED ENVIRONMENT) OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, ANDERSON COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AND RELOCATE CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 20 TO CHAPTERS 10, 26, AND 32; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

WHEREAS, Anderson County, South Carolina, a body politic and corporate and a political subdivision of the State of South Carolina, acting by and through the Anderson County Council, previously adopted the provisions of Chapter 20 titled Environment of the Anderson County Code;

WHEREAS, the enforcement of the various provisions of Chapter 20 of the Anderson County Code occurs in different ways and it is desirable to group the provisions according to the way each will be enforced within the County; and

WHEREAS, The County Council desires to make these amendments and revisions to the Anderson County Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Anderson County Council, in meeting duly assembled that:

1. The definition of "litter" and "solid waste" in Section 20-19 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Litter means all waste material and solid waste (as defined herein), including but not limited to, those items defined in the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, Section 44-96-40(2), (6), (32), (43), (73), and (74), as amended, and also, including, but not limited to, cigarette/cigar filters; disposable packages or containers; scrap metal; trash, garbage, or refuse; tires; furniture; dead animals or parts thereof; land clearing debris; and construction debris, but not including the waste from the primary process of mining, logging, sawmilling, or farming.

Solid Waste means solid waste as defined in the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, Section 44-96-40 (46), as amended.

2. Section 20-21 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-21 Supervision.

The environmental enforcement officer shall be supervised by the County Administrator.

3. Section 20-22 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-22 Authority.

Personnel employed by the administrator shall be vested with the authority to enforce and administer litter control within the County in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, Section 4-9-145, as amended, and all rules and regulations adopted thereunder and the same are incorporated herein by reference as fully set forth verbatim and as they may be amended from time to time.

4. Section 20-23(b) of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-23 Compliance.

- (b) It is unlawful to deposit a collection of litter or solid waste in an area facility not intended for public deposit for litter or solid waste. The provisions of this item apply to a deposit of litter or solid waste as is defined by the provisions of this article in an area or facility not intended for public deposit of litter or solid waste; provided however, it shall not prohibit a private property owner from depositing litter or solid waste as a property enhancement so long as the depositing does not violate applicable local or state health and safety regulations, and no portion thereof migrate through the elements to property of another.
- 5. Section 20-27 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-27. Unlawful disposal.

It shall be unlawful for any owner, manager, employee, agent or independent contractor, who is self-employed or who works for a retail, commercial, or institutional establishment (such person include solicitors, vendors, etc.), to deposit litter or solid waste from that business in any receptacle other than a litter or solid waste receptacle maintained on premises, except after having received permission from the county solid waste director for disposal or transport to a county permitted landfill/ convenience center.

- 6. Sections 20-28 and 20-29 are hereby moved to Chapter 32 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, into a new Article VI titled Distribution of Handbills and renumbered as Sections 32-110 and 32-111.
- 7. Section 20-31 is hereby moved to Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina and re-numbered as Section 10-28(c).

8. Section 20-28 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-28. Trash, garbage, litter and solid waste on premises.

No person shall permit trash, garbage, litter or solid waste which is not in a litter receptacle or is left exposed to the elements and visible from any public road or adjoining private property to remain on the property for a period in excess of 15 days.

- 9. Section 20-30 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby amended by re-numbering to 20-29.
- 10. Section of 20-32 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby renumbered to Section 20-30 and amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-30. Inspection of premises.

The environmental enforcement officer shall be authorized and required to cause the inspection of any premises within the limits of the county whenever it shall be necessary to enforce the provisions of this article.

11. Section 20-33 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby renumbered to Section 20-31 and amended to read as follows:

Sec. 20-31. Issuance of order to correct hazardous conditions.

Whenever it shall appear to the environmental enforcement officer that there are lying within the County limits any lots, yards, or premises in a condition which shall constitute a present or potential hazard to the public health, safety, welfare, or violation of Section 20-26, the environmental enforcement officer shall issue a written notice to the owner requiring the owner within 15 days to bring such property within the provision of this article.

- 12. Section 20-34 of the Code of ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby renumbered to Section 10-32.
- 13. Section 20-35 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby repealed.
- 14. Article III titled Noise of Chapter 20 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson County, South Carolina, is hereby moved in its entirety to Chapter 26 as Article IV. Noise and the Sections are hereby renumbered as 26-120 through 26-127, and are references to sections within this article are amended as follows:

(a) Section 26-120 Excessive noise means any noise prohibited by Section 26-125.

(b) Section 26-125 (a) The reference to 20-66 is amended to 26-126.

- (c) Section 26-127
 The referenced to 20-62 is amended to 26-123 and to 20-64 is amended to 26-125.
- (d) Section 26-127 (6) The reference to 20-65(b) is amended to 26-126 (b).
- 15. Article IV titled Weeds and Rank Vegetation of Chapter 20 of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, is hereby moved in its entirety to Chapter 26 as Article V Weeds and Rank Vegetation and the Sections are hereby renumbered as 26-140 through 26-146, and references to sections within this Article are amended as follows:
 - (a) Section 26-143 The reference to 20-93 is amended to 26-142.
 - (b) Section 26-146
 The reference to 20-91 is amended to 26-140 and the reference to 20-96 is amended to 26-145.
- 16. All Ordinances, Orders, Resolutions, and actions of Anderson County Council inconsistent herewith are, to the extent of such inconsistency only, hereby repealed, revoked, and rescinded.
- 17. Should any part or provision of this Ordinance be deemed unconstitutional or unenforceable by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such determination shall not affect the rest and remainder of this Ordinance, all of which is hereby deemed separable.
- 18. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon the third reading and enactment of by Anderson County Council.



- 2. The remaining terms and provisions of the Code of Ordinances, Anderson, South Carolina, not revised or affected hereby remain in full force and effect.
- 3. All Ordinances, Orders, Resolutions and actions of Anderson County Council inconsistent herewith are, to the extent of such inconsistency only, hereby repealed, revoked, and rescinded.
- 4. Should any part or portion of this Ordinance be deemed unconstitutional or unenforceable by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such determination shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance, all of which is hereby deemed separable.
- 5. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon Third Reading and Enactment by Anderson County Council.

Sec. 24-115. - Intensity standards.

- (a) Definition. Intensity is a measure of development, designed principally to regulate land use in accordance with the design function and carrying capacity of the road on which it is located.
- (b) Purposes. The purposes of this section are to:
 - Relate land use intensity to the design function and carrying capacity of the county's road network.
 - (2) Reduce the cost of road repair and maintenance by prohibiting from residential roads intense uses which would overload and accelerate the deterioration of such roads.
 - (3) Promote the safety and convenience of vehicular traffic.
 - (4) Protect the residential quality of neighborhoods by limiting nonresidential traffic.
 - (5) Promote the safety of neighborhood residents.
- (c) Road classification. In order to carry out the purposes of subsection (b) of this section, all roads in the county are hereby classified on the basis of their traffic carrying capabilities, their general function in the circulation system, and the existing land use of abutting properties. The classification system is based on concepts and criteria contained in the Highway Functional Classification Manual, Concepts, Criteria, and Procedures, U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, July 1974. The manual classifies roads into one of three functional categories:
 - (1) Local;
 - (2) Collector; and
 - (3) Arterial.

Local roads are separated from other types because they generally carry significant volumes of foot and bicycle traffic and are used by children. A weekday traffic count will account for traffic generated by existing uses, and traffic to be generated by developments that have been approved but not built shall also be added using Trip Generation, Institute of Transportation Engineers.

Where a proposed use will cause the ADT to exceed the maximum set for such County roads by subsection (d) of this section, the applicant shall choose one of these options:

- (i) Present a petition to change the road classification to the development standards manager. The petition shall include sufficient documentation to support the assertion that the road is not currently properly classified. The development standards manager may approve the petition upon approval by the Roads & Bridges manager. If the petition is denied, the applicant shall choose one of the two remaining options.
- (ii) Adjust the proposed use so that the resulting ADT does not exceed that associated with the subject County road's classification.
- (ii) Improve the subject County road to bring it up to the design standards of the higher classification resulting from the subject development. This improvement must be made along the frontage of the site on the side of the road on which the site is located.
- (f) Traffic impact studies. A traffic impact study shall be required for access approval through the state and county encroachment permit process when a development will generate 75 or more trips during the peak hour of the traffic generator or the peak hour of the adjacent street (using the latest edition of Trip Generation, Institute of Transportation Engineers). The traffic impact study and subsequent access locations, turning lane and signalization requirements shall follow the South Carolina Department of Transportation Access and Roadside Management Standards, latest edition and any additional requirements set forth by the County. The developer shall be responsible for all costs of the required study, roadway improvements identified in the study, and right-of-way acquisition. The traffic impact study shall be included with the preliminary plat or site plan. Any changes to the traffic study or preliminary plat must be resubmitted to the planning commission. Submission of the study before official application with preliminary plat or site plan is recommended.

The developers or their traffic engineers shall contact the County's Principal Engineer or his/her designee before beginning the study to obtain the scope and other requirements of the study. The study shall be conducted by a consultant on the County's approved TIS consultant list.

If additional right-of-way not under the control of the developer is required to implement required roadway improvements, the developer shall make a reasonable effort to obtain the necessary right-of-way to perform the recommended improvements, including offering an amount as appraised by a licensed SC real estate appraiser (fair market value). If right-of-way cannot be obtained, the developer is required to make a written request to the County and go back to the Planning Commission for a waiver if the requirement was part of a Planning Commission approval. The Commission will consider the waiver if the developer provides written documentation that a fair market value offer was offered and not accepted.

Sec. 24-115. - Intensity standards.

- (a) Definition. Intensity is a measure of development, designed principally to regulate land use in accordance with the design function and carrying capacity of the road on which it is located.
- (b) Purposes. The purposes of this section are to:
 - Relate land use intensity to the design function and carrying capacity of the county's road network
 - (2) Reduce the cost of road repair and maintenance by prohibiting from residential roads intense uses which would overload and accelerate the deterioration of such roads.
 - (3) Promote the safety and convenience of vehicular traffic
 - (4) Protect the residential quality of neighborhoods by limiting nonresidential traffic.
 - (5) Promote the safety of neighborhood residents.
- (c) Road classification. In order to carry out the purposes of subsection (b) of this section, all roads in the county are hereby classified on the basis of their traffic carrying capabilities, their general function in the circulation system, and the existing land use of abutting properties. The classification system is based on concepts and criteria contained in the Highway Functional Classification Manual, Concepts, Criteria, and Procedures, U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, July 1974. The manual classifies roads into one of three functional categories:
 - (1) Local;
 - (2) Collector; and
 - (3) Arterial.

Local roads are separated from other types because they generally carry significant volumes of foot and bicycle traffic and are used by children. Therefore, traffic volumes must remain relatively low in order to provide the necessary safety for residential neighborhoods. Collector roads generally form barriers between subdivisions. Their traffic volumes and design speeds are correspondingly greater since their function is to connect major traffic routes. Arterial roads constitute the highway network upon which most traffic must flow. The efficiency of the system requires that arterial roads accommodate traffic at high speeds over considerable distances. For purposes of this section, these functional categories are refined to form a four-road classification system (see appendix B (section 24-251) for diagram), characterized as follows:

- (1) Minor local (access) road. A minor local road is one designed primarily to access abutting properties. This road normally terminates in a cul-de-sac, loop or other turnaround, with no more than two access points.
- (2) Major local (access) road. A major local road is one designed primarily to access abutting properties. This road is characterized as one having two or more access points, and receiving traffic from minor local roads.

Whereas, County Council desires to amend the Map by adopting a zoning map amendment for major changes to the Highway 76 Innovative Zoning District +/- 19.1 acres of TMS#65-00-04-013 described above; and,

Whereas, the Anderson County Planning Commission has held a duly advertised Public Hearing on April 11, 2023, during which it reviewed the proposed major changes to the Highway 76 Innovative Zoning District +/- 19.1 acres of TMS#65-00-04-013; and,

The Springs at Clemson Boulevard (project) consists of one parcel of land located on Hwy 76, Pendleton directly across from Chapman Rd. The project is +/- 19.0 acres and is made up of the following parcel:

I.1 TMS #650004013 - 19.0 acres (829,469.5 square feet) parcel located in Anderson County on Hwy 76, Pendleton. The property is currently owned by Ernest W Garrison, Jr.

Water will be provided by Sandy Springs Water District and sewer by Anderson County Wastewater.

II DEVELOPMENT OVERVIEW

The project development plan is to rezone the one tract to utilize the Innovative Zoning District (IZD) zoning classification. The development will consist of two different access points off Hwy 76, applications for driveway and utility encroachment permits will be submitted for review and approval by SCDOT. A traffic study will be submitted to SCDOT to determine potential impact to Hwy 76 traffic flow and to ensure proper design of access and egress. The proposed development will incorporate both residential and commercial uses. The residential component will be comprised of ten (10) three story apartment buildings with clubhouse, private pool, playground, dog park, fire pit, walking trail, and open space for resident use situated on approximately 14.2 acres of the 19.0 overall parcel. Each apartment building will vary from approximately 7,100 to 11,750 square feet per floor and provide a range of 200 to 250 units with a mix of 1, 2, and 3-bedroom configurations. Site coverage for the residential portion of the development will be approximately 42.6%. Common areas and open space dispersed throughout the site (not including detention pond) will be approximately 57.4%.

The commercial component of the development will be approximately 4.8-acre subdivided portion located adjacent to Hwy 76 at the southern end of the parcel. A drive entrance to serve this portion of the site will connect directly to Hwy 76 then cross the parcel to further serve the residential component. The specific commercial use TBD. A buffer between the commercial and residential lots will be achieved through placement of the detention pond between the two uses. The closest apartment building will be approximately 100 feet from the commercial lot line.

A minimum 25' building setback will be established along all exterior property lines. However, where the commercial parcel adjoins Hwy 76 a 50' minimum setback will be established consistent with Anderson County requirements for nonresidential use along Arterial Roads.

The overall project will consist of a range between 200 to 250 garden style apartment units and approximately of 4.8 acres of commercial space fronting Hwy 76. The residential component will be comprised of ten (10) three story apartment buildings with clubhouse, private pool, playground, dog park, fire pit, walking trail, and open space for resident use situated on approximately 14.2 acres of the 19.0 overall parcel. Each apartment building will vary from approximately 7,100 to 11,750 square feet per floor and provide a range of 200 to 250 units with a mix of 1, 2, and 3-bedroom configurations. Site coverage for the residential portion of the development will be approximately 42.6%. Common areas and open space dispersed throughout the site (not including detention pond) will be approximately 57.4%.

The commercial component of the development will be approximately 4.8-acre subdivided portion located adjacent to Hwy 76 at the southern end of the parcel. A drive entrance to serve this portion of the site will connect directly to Hwy 76 then cross the parcel to further serve the residential component. The specific commercial use TBD. The exact locations and layout of the residential and commercial pieces will be detailed out in the Final Development Plan.

IV AMENITIES, LANDSCAPING, BUFFERS

The proposed development will have approximately 57.4% (10.9 acres) of common areas and open space that will be dispersed throughout the site (not including detention pond). A minimum 25' building setback will be established along all exterior property lines. However, where the commercial parcel adjoins Hwy 76 a 50' minimum setback will be established consistent with Anderson County requirements for nonresidential use along Arterial Roads. The residential amenity components may consist of a clubhouse, private pool, playground, dog park, fire pit, walking trail, and open space for the residents.

a Pond Maintenance and Landscaping – The detention pond serving the development will be in the far south end of the property and will not be visible from Hwy 76 due to topography. Only two sides of the pond will actually "front" the interior of the development and the exterior facing sides will be buffered per Section 38-122 Anderson County Ordinance. The entire pond will be fenced and screened with sufficient landscaping to reduce the overall visual impact to residents and commercial visitors to the site. Landscaping will blend with the overall theme of the development and provide a positive visual appearance. Pond inspection and maintenance will be conducted routinely and as required by the Anderson County Permanent Stormwater System Maintenance and Responsibility Agreement to ensure that the facilities are in good working order and performing their design functions.

V PUBLIC UTILITIES

Water – The site is under the jurisdiction of Sandy Springs Water District. Chris Brown with SSWD has confirmed that there is a 12" water main along Hwy 76 (same side as subject parcel) with available and adequate capacity to serve the proposed development. All new water mains built within the project will be built to SSWD (public) standards and turned over to Sandy Springs Water District to own and maintain.

Sewer - The site is under the jurisdiction of Anderson County Wastewater
Department. Tim Haynes, Wastewater Department Engineer, has confirmed that a
sewer extension will be required for the development to connect to their system.
Mr. Haynes further indicated that the system currently has available and adequate
capacity to accept the flow from the development. The developer plans to construct
the required extension concurrent with the overall development project. Once
completed, inspected, and accepted by the AHJ, the developer will convey ownership
of the extension to Anderson County. A Flow Request Application along with
engineer sealed flow calculations has been submitted for review and formal approval
by Anderson County Wastewater Department.

Natural Gas – The development would be served by Fort Hill Natural Gas. Kayla Ward, Business Development Assistant with FHNG, has confirmed that there is a 4" natural gas distribution main along Hwy 76 with sufficient volume and pressure to support the proposed development.

Fire – The site is in the jurisdiction of the Anderson County Fire Protection Commission and within the coverage area of the Sandy Springs Station #26. Preliminary Site Plans for the proposed development have been reviewed by Fire Marshal Duffie Cochran. Marshal Cochran has confirmed that they can and will provide fire protection and emergency service to the site and that existing hydrants in the area should be sufficient to the proposed project. Final layout regarding fire lane access will be coordinated through the Fire Marshal's office for review and formal approval.

Solid Waste – the residential section will have a designated garbage coral that will fenced in and not visible from the road or interior of the development. Garbage collection for the proposed development will be handled by private hauler. The development will contract with Waste Management for weekly pickup and hauling to the Starr C&D Landfill.

Stormwater – The stormwater management system for the site will treat for both water quantity and water quality and meet all requirements of Anderson County and SCDHEC to satisfy the appropriate standards of the Clean Water Act. Pre vs. Post

runoff will be managed through onsite detention consisting of a dry pond system. All stormwater BMP's will be inspected and maintained routinely.

Roads – US Hwy 76 is under SCDOT jurisdiction. Applications for driveway and utility encroachment permits will be submitted for review and approval by SCDOT The proposed development will have (2) access points to Hwy 76. A traffic study will be submitted to SCDOT to determine potential impact to Hwy 76 traffic flow and to ensure proper design of access and egress.

VI DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS

- VI.1 Permitted Uses: This project will consist of residential and commercial utilization
- VI.2 Maximum Number of Units: Residential 200 to 250 units and Commercial TBD to fit area needs and surrounding businesses
- VI.3 Building Setbacks:



- Where the commercial parcel adjoins Hwy 76 a 50' minimum setback will be established consistent with Anderson County requirements for nonresidential use along Arterial Roads.
- The closest apartment building will be approximately 100 feet from the commercial lot line.
- 4. Residential Construction and Maintenance: No mobile homes, trailers, campers, or tents shall be permitted as permanent dwellings.
 - VI.4 Public Improvements: No existing sidewalks are located along Hwy 76 a state-maintained road. The proposed project should have no impacts to the roads service level.



AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT THE OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGETS OF ANDERSON COUNTY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2023, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2024, AND TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS FOR SUCH ANDERSON COUNTY BUDGETS FOR COUNTY ORDINARY PURPOSES AND FOR OTHER COUNTY PURPOSES FOR WHICH THE COUNTY MAY LEVY A TAX OTHER THAN FOR TRI-COUNTY TECHNICAL COLLEGE PURPOSES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY OF TAXES ON ALL TAXABLE PERSONAL AND REAL ESTATE PROPERTIES IN ANDERSON COUNTY FOR SUCH COUNTY ORDINARY PURPOSES, INCLUDING SUFFICIENT TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ON OUTSTANDING INDEBTEDNESS OF ANDERSON COUNTY MATURING DURING SAID FISCAL YEAR; TO ADOPT THE OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGETS OF ANDERSON COUNTY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2023, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2024, AND TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS FOR SUCH ANDERSON COUNTY BUDGETS, FOR TRI-COUNTY TECHNICAL COLLEGE; TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY OF TAXES ON ALL PERSONAL AND REAL PROPERTIES IN ANDERSON COUNTY ON WHICH SCHOOL TAXES MAY BE LEVIED FOR SUCH TRI-COUNTY TECHNICAL COLLEGE PURPOSES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY, ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF CERTAIN OTHER TAXES AND FEES: TO PROVIDE FOR EXPENDITURE OF SAID TAXES AND OTHER REVENUES COMING TO THE COUNTY DURING SAID FISCAL YEAR; AND TO PROVIDE FOR OTHER MATTERS RELATING TO ANDERSON COUNTY.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Council for Anderson County, South Carolina ("Anderson County"), as follows:

The following operating and capital budgets for Anderson County for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2024, are hereby adopted and directed to be implemented by the Anderson County Administrator and staff.

<u>SECTION I-ADOPTION OF OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGETS FOR COUNTY ORDINARY AND OTHER PURPOSES</u>

Pursuant to Section 4-9-140 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976, as amended (the "Code"), the operating and capital budgets of Anderson County (the "Anderson County Budgets"), for County ordinary purposes and for other County purposes for which the County may levy a tax other than for Tri-County Technical College purposes, as hereinafter set forth, by reference and otherwise, are hereby adopted for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024.

SECTION II-LEVYING OF A SUFFICIENT TAX FOR COUNTY ORDINARY AND OTHER PURPOSES

A tax of sufficient millage to fund the appropriations for the Anderson County Budgets, herein made, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024, after crediting against such appropriations all other revenue anticipated to accrue to Anderson County during said fiscal year, not designated for any other specific purpose, is hereby directed to be levied upon all taxable property of Anderson County upon which the County may levy County ordinary taxes, for County ordinary purposes and for other County purposes for which the County may levy a tax, other than for the Anderson County Library, Tri-County Technical College purposes, County sewer, Solid Waste fees, Sewer fees, Civic Center fees, Animal Shelter fees, 9-1-1 tariffs, and road encroachment fees, all as separately levied in this Ordinance, such tax to fund the following amounts or millage, which shall be separately identified, levied, collected, and accounted for, as millage, for the purposes shown, as required by subsequent sections of this Ordinance (excluding Fee-In-Lieu of Taxes), with the total millage so levied, exclusive of debt service millage to be set by the Anderson County Auditor, not to exceed 83.5 mills. This Ordinance shall serve as Anderson County Council's written certification to the Anderson County Auditor required under Section 12-43-285 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (1976, as amended).

SECTION VIII-LEVYING OF A SUFFICIENT TAX FOR ANDERSON COUNTY LIBRARY PURPOSES

A tax of sufficient millage to fund the appropriations in the amount of \$5,330,000 (excluding delinquent taxes totaling approximately \$175,000, fee-in-lieu of taxes totaling approximately \$250,000, homestead exemption totaling approximately \$220,000, and fund balance totaling 502,430), for the Anderson County Library budgets, herein made, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024, is hereby directed to be levied on all personal and real property in Anderson County, and shall be identified as such on Anderson County tax bills. To the extent such levy results in excess revenues, above those stated above, all such revenues shall be placed and maintained in the Anderson County Library fund balance. Any funds in the Anderson County Library fund balance at any point in time in excess of those required for the Anderson County Library budgets herein made, may be utilized by the Anderson County Library Board of Trustees; provided, however, the expenditures of said surplus funds shall never exceed the amount of the most recent approved budget of the Library. There shall be credited against said appropriations all other revenues anticipated to accrue to Anderson County during said year for Anderson County Library. All such taxes and other revenues shall be levied, collected, deposited, disbursed and accounted for in the Anderson County Library Fund, with a specific levy and account for the library appropriation category listed herein.

SECTION IX-ANDERSON COUNTY LIBRARY FUND APPROPRIATIONS AND REVENUES

There is hereby appropriated, with the detail and the provisos as so stated in the Anderson County Budget Book, hereby incorporated by reference as a part of this Ordinance as fully as if set forth verbatim herein, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024, the following sums of money in the amounts and for the purposes set forth as follows, with the anticipated revenues to be applied thereto as reflected herein:

The Anderson County Auditor is hereby directed to levy as separately identified County ordinary millage and the Anderson County Treasurer hereby directed to collect, disburse monthly (if funds are available), and account for as a separate fund the sums identified herein for the Anderson County Library Fund.

SECTION X-ADOPTION OF OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGETS FOR TRI-COUNTY TECHNICAL COLLEGE PURPOSES

Pursuant to Section 4-9-70 of the Code, the operating and capital budgets of Anderson County specifically for Tri-County Technical College as hereinafter set forth, by reference and otherwise, are hereby adopted for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024.

SECTION XI-LEVYING OF A SUFFICIENT TAX FOR TRI-COUNTY TECHNICAL COLLEGE PURPOSES

A tax of sufficient millage to fund the appropriations in the amount of \$2,290,000 (excluding delinquent taxes totaling approximately \$45,000, fee-in-lieu of payments totaling approximately \$105,000, merchants inventory payments totaling \$10,000, homestead exemption payments totaling \$93,000, and usage of fund balance totaling approximately \$761,400) for the Tri-County Technical College Budgets, herein made, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024, is hereby directed to be levied on all personal and real property in Anderson County on which school taxes may be levied, and shall be identified as such on Anderson County tax bills. To the extent such levy results in excess revenues, above those stated above, all such revenues shall be placed and maintained in the Tri-County Technical College fund balance. There shall be credited against said appropriations all other revenues anticipated to accrue to Anderson County during said year for Tri-County Technical College. All such taxes and other revenues shall be levied, collected, deposited, disbursed and accounted for in the Tri-County Technical College Fund, with a specific levy and account for the special education appropriation category listed herein.

<u>SECTION XII TRI-COUNTY TECHNICAL COLLEGE FUND APPROPRIATIONS</u> <u>AND REVENUES</u>

There is hereby appropriated, with the detail and the provisos as so stated in the Anderson County Budget Book, hereby incorporated by reference as a part of this Ordinance as fully as if set forth verbatim herein, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024, the following sums of money in the amounts and for the purposes set forth as follows, with the anticipated revenues to be applied thereto as reflected herein:

SECTION XIII-TAX FOR ANDERSON COUNTY SEWER

There is hereby directed to be levied a tax of three (3) mills on all county ordinary taxable and

real property in all unincorporated areas of Anderson County, pursuant to Anderson County Ordinance Number 164 of 1986, to provide sewer service in the County.

SECTION XIV-SOLID WASTE/RECYCLING FEES

There shall be a uniform \$75.00 Residential Solid Waste/Recycling Fee annually imposed upon the owner of record of each residence in the County, including all single and multi-family homes, mobile homes, and all lease and rental properties, and a uniform Commercial \$85.81 Solid Waste/Recycling Fee annually imposed upon every business, excepting industries, located in a municipality in the County, and to be collected by such municipality not less frequently than annually and remitted to the County within thirty (30) days from the deadline imposed by the municipality for such collections. Together, these fees, plus the Starr C&D Landfill usage fee of \$28/ton and revenues received from the sale of recycled materials, interest income, state grant and tire revenue are currently estimated to produce approximately \$8,733,010 for this fiscal year, and constitute the total anticipated fiscal year 2023-2024 revenues of the Solid Waste and Recycling Department.

The residential Solid Waste and Recycling Fees shall be levied as a uniform assessment by the Anderson County Auditor and placed upon the annual real estate tax notice and collected by the Anderson County Treasurer, pursuant to state law. The fiscal officers of the County shall have the authority to nulla bona or abate these fees to the same extent and under the same conditions as they do for a comparable tax.

Further, there shall be imposed a late fee and supplemental processing charge of \$6.00, for all Solid Waste/Recycling Fees not timely remitted to the County Treasurer by March 16 of the year when due. For all past due accounts in excess of one year, the County shall impose an additional annual penalty of \$12.00. The County shall pursue all legal remedies available to it to recover past due amounts, and shall hold the property owner responsible for all costs of collection, including reasonable attorney fees, as a part of such collection efforts and as a part of the fees imposed by County Council pursuant to state law, in order that lawful tax-paying citizens not be forced to subsidize those taxpayers who do not pay this lawful fee in a timely manner. Failure by a municipality to collect the uniform Commercial Solid Waste/Recycling Fee or to remit such collected fees to the County in accordance with this section may result in the County terminating solid waste disposal privileges for such municipality until all such collections and/or remittances are made current.

All proceeds collected from these fees shall be accounted for in a separate fund to be used solely to account for solid waste operations in the County, including but not limited to, the collection, disposal, transfer, and recycling of solid waste, including, without limitation, the purchase or construction of machinery, equipment, and facilities for such operations, as well as the administrative expenses incurred in the operation of the Anderson County Solid Waste and Recycling Department and collection of the annual solid waste/recycling fee. The County is authorized to issue appropriate legal obligations, including bonds, as appropriately authorized by normal County processes to pay for all of the foregoing costs, utilizing the proceeds from these fees to pay for such costs, including, without limitations, to pay the debt service for such bond obligations. The fees addressed in this section may be set or changed by simple vote of County Council, and will be adjusted by the County Administrator and the Public Works Division Director of the County accordingly to reflect these changes by County Council. The provisions of this Section shall be codified in a separate ordinance of the County pertaining to Solid Waste/Recycling

Fees, which shall include provisions for enforcement, including civil and criminal penalties for non-payment.

Because empirical evidence indicates that senior citizens generate less Solid Waste, by consuming less, than younger residents, the Anderson County Auditor shall only levy and collect a \$40 Residential Solid Waste/Recycling Fee for every household which qualifies for and is granted the State Homestead Exemption.

SECTION XV-SEWER FEES

The County is party to multiple agreements with the City of Anderson, South Carolina (the "City"), which have been in effect for many years and are of indefinite duration. Those agreements require the County to pay a pro rata share of the cost of certain upgrades to the City's sewer system, based on the volume of discharge and the nature of the discharge. Because the County does not set the amount of such costs and because the costs are based on actual use by customers using the system, the only equitable method to use for paying the cost of increase charged by the City, pursuant to contractual agreements of long standing, is to increase the County sewer use charges affected, by the respective percentage or amount of increase charged by the City, i.e., to treat the amount charged by the City as a "pass-through" charge to the system users. In addition, the County has certain debt instruments in effect, with the South Carolina State Revolving Fund and others, which require the County to set sewer user charges in such an amount as will generate sufficient funds to pay all debt service on such debt instruments. The County Administrator and the Public Works Division Director may effect such "pass-through" charges by insuring that amounts charged by the City are correct and then passing those charges along, pro rata, to the users of the County sewer system impacted by the City charges, in the form of adjusted sewer use charges, based on the same cost increase factors utilized by the City, and may otherwise adjust such sewer use charges as required to adequately meet all debt service requirements of sewer system debt instruments and obligations duly authorized by County Council. For new users of the County sewer system, a capacity fee payment is required for connection to the system.

SECTION XVI-STORMWATER REQUIREMENTS AND PERSONNEL

Federal and state law mandates the management of stormwater runoff by Anderson County. Accordingly, certain Public Works employees have been assigned to the management of Anderson County's Stormwater Runoff management program. Anderson County Council may utilize funds from the Sewer Fund for the Stormwater Runoff management program, to the extent such funds are available and sufficient for that purpose and exceed stormwater fees collected for that purpose, rather than impose additional federally and state mandate-created fees for such purposes.

SECTION XVII-CREATION AND APPROPRIATION OF PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

There has heretofore been established, and shall be maintained as a separate budgetary and operational fund of the County, the Anderson County Public Infrastructure Fund (the "Fund"). The County shall deposit into such Fund those revenues of the County derived from fee-in-lieu-of-tax ("FILOT") payments from the several joint county industrial and business parks of the County ("multi-county parks" or "MCIPs"), which are designated to be so deposited by this Ordinance or other ordinances of Anderson County, including, without limitation, Ordinance #2004-041, as amended from time to time ("Ordinance #2004-041"). Moneys deposited into the Fund shall be

utilized for the costs of infrastructure serving economic development purposes in Anderson County ("Infrastructure") in accordance with the provisions of 4-1-170, et seq., Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, and as directed by Anderson County Administrator. Such expenditures are hereby authorized by Anderson County Council. Deposits into such Fund shall include, without limitation, those revenues from the Anderson County-Greenville County multi-county park which are allocated to that purpose by Ordinance #2004-041, (exclusive of such revenues as are being utilized for separate special source revenue bonds issued to fund Infrastructure). Moreover, Anderson County Council affirms that distribution of the FILOT revenues received by Anderson County pursuant to the multi-county park agreements with Clarendon County and with Abbeville/McCormick Counties for park premises under those two agreements which are located in Anderson County shall be distributed in the same manner and pursuant to the same allocation methodology as set forth in Ordinance #2004-041. All monies and revenues received by Anderson County pursuant to Ordinance #2004-041 and this Section shall be accumulated in, accounted for, and distributed from such Fund as provided in such Ordinance and in this Section. Expenditures may be made from such Fund to pay the cost of such Infrastructure directly or to make debt service payments on bonds or notes payable issued by the County to fund such Infrastructure.

There is hereby created a Capital Renewal and Replacement Fund that is to be funded in accordance with the wishes of Anderson County Council.

SECTION XVIII-SPECIAL TAX DISTRICT REVENUES AND APPROPRIATIONS

The County Finance Department shall receive and account for those revenues of the County levied and collected for the special tax districts of the county, as authorized, required, and levied by the County ordinances creating such special tax districts. The County Finance Department will disburse moneys from such funds in accordance with the County ordinances creating the special tax districts, including, without limitation, for reimbursements of the County Public Works Division in accordance with such ordinances. Such monies are hereby appropriated for those purposes.

SECTION XIX-FUNDING OF COUNTY ORGANIZATIONS

All dependent boards, agencies, commissions, and organizations of the County, funded by these budgets, shall be disbursed funds on a quarterly basis upon a letter of request to the County Administrator any time after the beginning of the first month of the quarter. A brief report shall be submitted along with the letter of request, detailing how County funds were expended in the previous quarter. An audit report shall be presented to the County Administrator within six months following the end of the respective fiscal year for each organization addressed by this Section following receipt of request by the County Administrator.

SECTION XX-SETTING OF A MILLAGE RATE

The Anderson County Council, working in cooperation with the Anderson County Auditor and Treasurer and in accordance with the laws and Constitution of the State of South Carolina, shall calculate and fix the amount of the millage necessary, not to exceed 83.5 mills total, exclusive of debt service millage to be set by the Anderson County Auditor, as set forth herein, to support the appropriations herein made, with the exception of those appropriations and portions thereof supported by revenues other than property taxes, and shall so advise the Auditor and Treasurer of Anderson County who shall levy and collect said millage, respectively, as hereby directed by the County Council, in addition to any millage (for debt service or otherwise) for which the statutory authority to

determine and levy is granted to the Anderson County Auditor and the authority to collect is given to the Anderson County Treasurer. All such levies of taxes authorized herein by Anderson County Council for County of Anderson purposes shall be set forth, stated, and mailed to the taxpayers of Anderson County on a tax notice showing such levies separate and independent of levies of taxes by any other legal entity or political subdivision of the State of South Carolina, whether on a two-sided tax notice or a multi-page tax notice or any other form of tax notice accomplishing the purpose set forth in this paragraph. Anderson County Council will provide forms for such tax notices and no funds appropriated by this budget ordinance are authorized for the procurement or preparation of any other form of tax notice.

SECTION XXI-COMPLIANCE WITH COUNTY CODE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

All funds for County ordinary purchases and procurements shall be obligated in accordance with the County Code through the County Central Purchasing Department and will be disbursed by the Finance Department to provide for necessary auditing, unless specifically exempted by County Council in public session.

All State and Federal Grants will be administered, coordinated, and accounted for by the Anderson County Finance Department.

Use of funds appropriated by County Council district or otherwise, to reimburse members of County Council for reimbursable expenses (that is, for lodging, travel, registration fees, training, meals, and telephone usage) incurred in the discharge of their official duties shall be in accordance with the terms and provisions of the County Code.

SECTION XXII-DEPOSITS

All service charges, reimbursements, fees, fines, other funds received by county departments shall be deposited with the County Treasurer as soon as possible after collection; but in no case shall the time lapse between collection and deposit with the Treasurer exceed thirty (30) days. The Treasurer is authorized and directed to deposit all funds received into the appropriate interest-bearing accounts, and any surplus funds and all accumulative interest shall be deposited into the General Fund of Anderson County.

SECTION XXIII-SURPLUS FUNDS

Except as otherwise noted herein, any surplus in the General Fund of the County or any moneys accruing therefrom shall be used as a contingency fund and shall be spent as authorized and directed by the Anderson County Council during the fiscal year addressed by this Ordinance, only. At the end of such fiscal year those funds shall be accounted for as addressed in the next succeeding Section. Any surplus in other funds of the County or any monies accruing therefrom shall be retained and accounted for in such other fund or funds and shall be carried forward from year to year as fund balances in such funds.

SECTION XXIV-END OF FISCAL YEAR ACCOUNTING

All appropriations made by this Ordinance for which monies have not been obligated or encumbered by the end of June 30, 2024, shall lapse and expire at that time. All appropriations made by this Ordinance for which the funding monies have been obligated or encumbered by June 30, 2024 shall remain on the books of Anderson County at June 30, 2024 for matching of the applicable expenditure for year-end accrual purposes. Once the ledgers are closed for year-end accrual purposes,

the unused encumbrance amount will be removed from the encumbrance system. Unobligated General Fund budgetary appropriations and monies received by County departments and existing without obligation at the close of the fiscal year addressed by this Ordinance shall revert to the General Fund of Anderson County to be accounted for as fund balance; no existing appropriation or actual revenues on hand at the end of the fiscal year may be expended by any department during the succeeding fiscal year without new appropriation by County Council. Any surplus in other funds of the County or any moneys accruing therefrom shall be retained and accounted for in such other fund or funds and shall be carried forward from year to year as fund balances in such funds.

SECTION XXV-TRANSFERRING OF FUNDS

The Administrator may approve changes in a department budget from one line item to another in an amount up to and including \$10,000 at any one time; provided, however, the total department budget shall not increase, no new positions may be created, or capital expenses, may be accomplished by such a transfer without County Council approval. No transfer for any one type of good or services may be subdivided, split or "stacked" for purposes of evading the requirements of this section.

Aggregate transfers within the fiscal year within a department which exceed \$20,000 shall require County Council approval thereafter. All transfers shall be included in the "Administrator's Report" section of the County Council agenda for Council's review.

SECTION XXVI-DISBURSEMENTS

The County Administrator, based on financial conditions and cash-flow considerations, shall determine the proper rate of disbursement of the above-enumerated appropriations during the fiscal year. Transfers from fund to fund in order to properly account for and manage County funds and appropriations in accordance with generally accepted accounting standards continue to be explicitly approved notwithstanding any other language of this Ordinance, subject always to the reporting requirements of this Ordinance. All out of state travel for official County government business shall be approved in advance by the County Administrator to include any lodging, registration fees or meals associated with the trip. The County Administrator and the County Treasurer are hereby granted authority to enter into agreements with the Anderson County Board of Education and the School Districts of Anderson County, consistent with this Ordinance, to make accelerated disbursements of Anderson County school tax receipts to the School Districts of Anderson County and to the Anderson County Board of Education.

SECTION XXVII-PAUPER BURIALS

Pauper burials shall be funded in the budget of the Coroner (5131) at the rate established by sealed bid. Documentation for each such burial will be maintained at the Coroner's Office and, as further, the Coroner is hereby authorized to arrange for the disposition of deceased indigent persons in accordance with state law including, but not limited to, Title 32, Chapter 8 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (1976, as amended).

SECTION XXVIII-RETIREMENT OF AUTOMOTIVE AND HEAVY EQUIPMENT

Unless otherwise directed by County Council, automotive and heavy equipment will be retired from service by any department receiving replacement equipment on a one for one basis as the replacement equipment is received. Retired equipment will be appropriately evaluated for

reassignment or disposition by the Public Works Division Director and the County Administrator for those departments under the director of the County Administrator and the Sheriff for those vehicles used by those departments reporting to this elected official.

SECTION XXIX-TAX ANTICIPATION NOTES

As permitted by Article X, Section 14, of the Constitution of the State of South Carolina, 1895, as amended and Section 11-27-40, Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, County Council is hereby empowered to authorize the issuance of tax anticipation notes in the aggregate principal amount of not exceeding \$10,000,000 (the "TANS") in anticipation of the collection of taxes imposed and levied by this Ordinance. The TANS may be issued at any time or from time to time during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2024; shall be issued pursuant to a Resolution adopted by County Council; may be issued in bearer form or fully registered upon terms and conditions prescribed in such Resolution; shall be issued in the principal amounts, mature and bear interest as prescribed in such Resolution; may be sold by negotiated or public sale upon such terms and conditions as County Council prescribes in the Resolution.

SECTION XXX-CREDIT CARD PAYMENTS

To the maximum extent authorized by and in accordance with law, and in accordance with County procurement policies, all Anderson County offices, including those of elected officials, are authorized to adopt and implement uniform procedures, through the Treasurer's Office, to accept credit card payments for all payments due to the County or processed by County offices.

SECTION XXXI-CREDIT CARD POLICY

All Anderson County credit card charges and purchases made utilizing an Anderson County credit card, to include purchasing cards, are to be reported to the Finance Office, and accompanied by a detailed receipt and a written report, the format of which is to be designed and determined by the County Administrator or his designee. The written report shall contain sufficient detail to show who made the charge, what the charge was for, when the charge was made, where the charge was made, and why the charge was incurred. Charges incurred for or associated with economic development projects must still be reported, as addressed above, and accompanied by the receipt and report described above, but may be reported by project codename, until such time as the project is publicly announced or finally terminated.

SECTION XXXII-GRANTS AND GRANT MATCHING FUNDS

The Anderson County Administrator, or his duly authorized representative, is hereby authorized to apply for all grants of any nature whatsoever where no County matching funds are required, or for those grants for which County matching funds are required when all necessary County matching funds have been made available by Anderson County Council through the annual Anderson County operating and capital budgets or are available in applicable County enterprise fund balances, for County Council authorized programs, institutions, and facilities of Anderson County, and to receive and expend such grant funds for the purposes authorized in the respective grant applications. Notwithstanding the foregoing, County staff shall conduct an analysis identifying any recurring expense or monetary obligation for which the County may be responsible in the future where said expense or obligation will be payable from funding sources other than the grant being applied for. Any grant opportunity which involves such expenses or obligations shall require County Council approval prior to the submission of the grant application.

No funds appropriated by this Ordinance may be utilized as matching funds for any parks and recreation grant, including, without limitation, grants received from the South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation, and Tourism, except for Anderson County Council District Recreation Funds appropriated hereby, except as otherwise provided herein.

SECTION XXXIII-APPLICABLE CIVIC CENTER RATES

Rates as set forth on rate sheets as may be in effect during the fiscal year (subject to amendment) shall be applied by the Civic Center of Anderson for all rental contracts entered into between July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

SECTION XXXIV-APPLICABLE ANIMAL SHELTER RATES

Rates as set forth on Animal Shelter rate sheets dated July 1, 2023 shall be applied by the Anderson County Animal Shelter for all services rendered between July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

SECTION XXXV-APPLICABLE JUROR REIMBURSEMENT RATES

There shall be paid unto the Grand Jurors in Circuit Court the sum of \$20 per diem and Petit Jurors shall be paid the sum of \$12 per diem. There shall be paid unto Jurors in Summary Court the sum of \$10 per diem Jurors. In addition to the aforesaid sum, jurors shall be reimbursed twenty-five, \$.25, cents per mile per day from their home to the Anderson County Courthouse for the term for which they are drawn to serve. These rates shall be effective for all services rendered between July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

SECTION XXXVI-FUNDING OF E-911 SERVICES

In order to provide all citizens of Anderson County with the best emergency dispatch services available and to fund those services in the most effective, efficient manner possible, the County Administrator is hereby directed to utilize and apply the maximum E-9-1-1 tariff funds available by current South Carolina law to the County's E-9-1-1 system, in accordance with County procurement policies and state law.

SECTION XXXVII-ROAD ENCROACHMENT PERMITS

The Anderson County Public Works Division is authorized to charge fees for encroachments on County roads and rights-of-way and for encroachment permits for such encroachments in accordance with an encroachment fee schedule prepared, from time to time, by the Anderson County Public Works Division, and approved by Anderson County Council by appropriate Council action. Such fees for encroachments on Anderson County roads and rights-of-way and for encroachment permits for such fees shall be sufficient to fully reimburse the County for all costs of supervising, inspecting, and repairing, as necessary, all damage to County roads and rights-of-way caused by such encroachments.

SECTION XXXVIII-REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION POLICY

Anderson County is a participant in the Federal Community Development Block Grant Program for the purpose of undertaking various important community and economic development activities throughout the County. The Community Development Block Grant Program requires a reasonable accommodations policy for Section 504 regulations. Anderson County, acting by and through the Anderson County Council, desires to comply with all necessary Grant requirements. Anderson County, acting by and through the Anderson County Council, is hereby willing to make

reasonable accommodations for the known physical or mental impairments of an otherwise qualified participant, applicant or employee, providing it does not cause undue financial or administrative burden on the County or cause a fundamental alteration of the County's program. Anderson County Council hereby recognizes that the policy created hereunder includes employees, applicants for employment, and the public when the public is involved in County activities. The Anderson County Administrator, for and on behalf of the County, is hereby authorized and directed to do any and all things necessary or appropriate in connection with this Policy.

SECTION XXXIX-SMALL, WOMEN-OWNED AND MINORITY-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES

To promote free competition and equal opportunity, Anderson County is committed, within the parameters of the County procurement code, to assisting small, minority-owned and womanowned businesses in becoming active vendors with the County. Anderson County encourages and invites small, woman, and/or minority owned businesses located inside and outside of the County to participate in the County's procurement process. It is the policy of the County to prohibit discrimination against any person or business in pursuit of procurement opportunities on the basis of race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, disability, political affiliation or gender.

SECTION XL-SOLICITOR CASE FACILITATOR

Funding for the temporary Case Facilitator in the Solicitor's Office is budgeted for an additional year and is intended to provide representation for Anderson County in the Magistrates Courts of Anderson County. This is a temporary position only. In order for this position to be considered in future budget years, the Solicitor's Office must provide the Administrator with quarterly reports indicating the number of new cases referred each quarter, the number of court appearances each quarter, and a certification from the Solicitor that this position was only used for representation in Magistrate Court on Anderson County cases during the quarter.

SECTION XLI-SEVERABILITY

If any clause, phrase, sentence, paragraph, appropriation, or section of this Ordinance shall be held invalid for any reason, it shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or the remaining clauses, phrases, sentences, paragraphs, appropriations, or sections hereof, which are hereby declared separable.

SECTION XLII-EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall become effective and enforced from and after July 1, 2023.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-018

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF AN AMENDMENT TO FEE IN LIEU OF TAX AND SPECIAL SOURCE CREDIT AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN ANDERSON COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA AND GRAY INDUSTRIAL REALTY 7, LLC FOR THE PURPOSE OF MODIFYING THE SPECIAL SOURCE CREDITS TO BE PROVIDED THEREUNDER; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

WHEREAS, ANDERSON COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA (the "County"), acting by and through its County Council (the "County Council"), is authorized and empowered under and pursuant to the provisions of Title 12, Chapter 44 (the "FILOT Act"), Title 4, Chapter 1 (the "Multi-County Park Act"), and Title 4, Chapter 29, of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended, to enter into agreements with industry whereby the industry would pay fees-in-lieu-of taxes with respect to qualified projects; to provide infrastructure credits against payment in lieu of taxes for reimbursement in respect of investment in certain infrastructure enhancing the economic development of the County; through all such powers the industrial development of the State of South Carolina (the "State") will be promoted and trade developed by inducing manufacturing and commercial enterprises to locate or remain in the State and thus utilize and employ the manpower, products and resources of the State and benefit the general public welfare of the County by providing services, employment, recreation or other public benefits not otherwise provided locally; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the FILOT Act, and in order to induce investment in the County, the County did previously enter into an Inducement Agreement dated as of August 16, 2022 (the "Inducement Agreement") with Gray Industrial Realty 7, LLC, a Kentucky limited liability company authorized to transact business in the State (the "Company") (which was known to the County at the time as "Project Little Brother"), with respect to the acquisition, construction, and installation of land, buildings, improvements, fixtures, machinery, equipment, furnishings and other real and/or tangible personal property to constitute a new industrial (light manufacturing and/or distribution) facility in the County (collectively, the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Inducement Agreement, and Ordinance No. 2022-037 enacted by County Council of the County on October 18, 2022, the County and the Company entered into a Fee in Lieu of Tax and Special Source Credit Agreement (the "Fee Agreement") dated as of October 18, 2022, whereby the County agreed to receive and the Company agreed to pay fees-in-lieu-of taxes ("FILOT Payments") by the Company with respect to the Project, and the County agreed to provide certain special source credits (the "Special Source Credits") to be claimed by the Company against its FILOT Payments with respect to the Project pursuant to Section 4-1-175 of the Multi-County Park Act to support the project by offsetting related infrastructure costs to be incurred by the Company; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authority of Section 4-1-170 of the Multi-County Park Act and Article VIII, Section 13 of the South Carolina Constitution, the County intends to cause the Project, to the extent not already therein located, to be placed in a joint county industrial and business park (the "Multi-County Park") such that the Project will receive the benefits of the Special Source Credits under the Multi-County Park Act; and

WHEREAS, the Company has informed the County that the infrastructure costs associated with the project exceed those originally anticipated, and the County wishes to modify the Special Source Credits provided under the Fee Agreement so as to increase the successive annual FILOT Payments which will be subject to a Special Source Credit equal to 85% of such FILOT Payments from for one additional FILOT

Payment (i.e., the 85% Special Source Credit will apply to the first six (6) FILOT Payments instead of the first five (5) FILOT Payments) to support the Project and help offset the increased infrastructure cost; and

WHEREAS, the County Council has caused to be prepared and presented to this meeting the form of the Amendment to Fee in Lieu of Tax and Special Source Credit Agreement (the "Amendment") which the County and the Company propose to execute and deliver; and

WHEREAS, it appears that the Amendment attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u>, is in appropriate form and is an appropriate instrument to be executed and delivered or approved by the County for the purposes intended;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the County Council as follows:

Section 1. The form, terms and provisions of the Amendment attached hereto as Exhibit A are hereby approved. The Chairman of County Council is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Amendment in the name of and on behalf of the County, and the County Administrator and Clerk to County Council are hereby authorized and directed to attest the same, and thereupon to cause the Amendment to be delivered to the Company and cause a copy of the same to be delivered to the Anderson County Auditor, Assessor and Treasurer. The Amendment is to be in substantially the form now before this meeting and hereby approved, or with such minor changes therein as shall be approved by the Chairman of County Council, upon advice of counsel, execution thereof by such signatories to constitute conclusive evidence of approval of any and all changes or revisions therein from the form of Amendment now before this meeting.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Chairman of County Council, the County Administrator and the Clerk to County Council, for and on behalf of the County, are hereby authorized and directed to do any and all things necessary to effect the execution and delivery of the Amendment and the performance of all obligations of the County under the Fee Agreement, as amended.

<u>Section 3.</u> The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, phrase or provisions shall for any reason be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the sections, phrases and provisions hereunder.

Section 4. All ordinances, resolutions, and parts thereof in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage by the County Council.

AMENDMENT TO FEE IN LIEU OF TAX AND SPECIAL SOURCE CREDIT AGREEMENT

THIS AMENDMENT TO FEE IN LIEU OF TAX AGREEMENT (this "Amendment") is dated as of _______, 2023 by and between ANDERSON COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA (the "County"), a body politic and corporate and a political subdivision of the State of South Carolina, and GRAY INDUSTRIAL REALTY 7. LLC (the "Company"), a limited liability company organized and existing under the laws of the State of Kentucky and authorized to do business in the State of South Carolina, for the purpose of amending that certain Fee in Lieu of Tax and Special Source Credit Agreement by and between the County and the Company dated as of October 18, 2022 (the "Fee Agreement").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, (the "Code"), and particularly Title 12, Chapter 44 thereof (as amended through the date hereof, the "Act"), in order to create jobs and promote prosperity within the State of South Carolina, empowers the several counties of the State of South Carolina to induce investors ("Project Sponsors") to acquire, enlarge, improve, and expand certain types of industrial and commercial property ("Economic Development Property") within their jurisdictional limits and thereafter operate, maintain and improve such Economic Development Property by, among other things, entering into agreements providing for payments with respect to Economic Development Property by Project Sponsors in lieu of *ad valorem* taxes at favorable rates ("FILOT Payments"); and

WHEREAS, the County, acting by and through its County Council (the "County Council") is authorized by Titles 4 and 12 of the Code to provide special source revenue financing by providing a credit against or payment derived from FILOT Payments due from a Project Sponsor pursuant to Article VIII, Section 13 of the South Carolina Constitution, Section 4-1-170 of the Code, and the Act, for the purpose of defraying the cost of designing, acquiring, constructing, improving, or expanding the infrastructure serving the County or the project, and for improved or unimproved real estate used in the operation of a manufacturing or commercial enterprise in order to enhance the economic development of the County; and

WHEREAS, the Company has acquired and is acquiring by construction and purchase certain facilities, consisting of land (if any), buildings, apparati, machinery, equipment, furnishings, fixtures, and materials in the County (the "Project"), to be used primarily for the purpose of distribution or light manufacturing operations; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance No. 2022-037 of the County enacted on October 18, 2022, the County and the Company executed and entered into: (i) the Fee Agreement dated as of October 18, 2022 under which the Company agreed, among other things, to make FILOT Payments to the County, subject to certain Special Source Credits (as such term is defined in the FILOT Agreement) to be applied to reduce such FILOT Payments to help offset the cost of infrastructure supporting the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Company has indicated to the County that the cost of infrastructure serving the Project which the Company must incur is higher than originally anticipated, and requested that the Special Source Credits to be provided under the Fee Agreement be adjusted to help offset such increased cost; and

WHEREAS, the Company and the County now wish to amend the Fee Agreement for the purposes of adjusting the Special Source Credits provided thereunder as set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the respective representations and agreements hereinafter contained, and the sum of \$10.00 in hand, duly paid by the Company to the County, the

receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the County and the Company agree as follows:

ARTICLE I DEFINITIONS

SECTION 1.01. Definitions. Each capitalized term used in this Amendment shall have the definition given for such term herein or in the preamble hereto, or, if no definition is given herein, the definition(s) given for such term in the Fee Agreement.

SECTION 1.02. References to Amendment. The words "hereof", "herein", "hereunder", and other words of similar import refer to this Amendment as a whole, unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

ARTICLE II AMENDMENTS

SECTION 2.01. Amendments to Fee Agreement. The terms and provisions of the Fee Agreement shall be and hereby are amended as follows:

- (a) Section 3 of the Summary of Contents of the Fee Agreement is amended to refer to a Special Source Credit of 85% for the first six (6) FILOT Payments, and 35% for the next twenty-four (24) FILOT Payments.
- (b) Section 4.02(a) of the Fee Agreement is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following quoted language:
 - "(a) In accordance with and pursuant to Section 12-44-70 of the FILOT Act and Section 4-1-175 of the MCIP Act, in order to reimburse the Company for qualifying capital expenditures incurred for costs of the Infrastructure during the Investment Period, the Company shall be entitled to receive, and the County agrees to provide, annual Special Source Credits against the Company's first six (6) consecutive FILOT Payments in an amount equal to eighty-five percent (85%), and the Company's next twenty-four (24) consecutive FILOT Payments thereafter in an amount equal to thirty-five percent (35%), of that portion of FILOT Payments payable by the Company with respect to the Project (that is, with respect to investment made by the Company in the Project during the Investment Period), calculated and applied after payment of the amount due the non-host county under the MCIP Agreement."

SECTION 2.02. Conflict with Inducement Agreement. To the extent the terms and provisions of the Fee Agreement, as amended by this Amendment (the "Amended Fee Agreement") conflict with the terms and provisions of the Inducement Agreement, the terms and provisions of the Amended Fee Agreement shall control.

SECTION 2.03. No Further Amendment. Except for the amendments to the Fee Agreement expressly set forth in this Amendment, all terms and provisions of the Fee Agreement remain unchanged and in full force and effect between the parties thereto.

ARTICLE III MISCELLANEOUS

SECTION 3.01. Entire Understanding. This Amendment expresses the entire understanding and all agreements of the parties hereto with each other as to the amendments to the Fee Agreement set forth herein, and neither party hereto has made or shall be bound by any agreement or any representation to the other party with respect to such amendments which is not expressly set forth herein.

SECTION 3.02. Severability. In the event that any clause or provision of this Amendment shall be held to be invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity of such clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions hereof.

SECTION 3.03. Headings and Table of Contents; References. The headings of this Amendment are for convenience of reference only and shall not define or limit the provisions of this Amendment or the Amended Fee Agreement or affect the meaning or interpretation hereof or thereof. All references in this Amendment to particular Articles or Sections or subdivisions of this Amendment or of the Fee Agreement are references to the designated Articles or Sections or subdivisions of this Amendment or the Fee Agreement, as applicable.

SECTION 3.04. Multiple Counterparts. This Amendment may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be an original but all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. Facsimile signatures may be relied upon as if originals.


